Making peace by the blood of his cross — Colossians 1:15-20

Grace, peace, and mercy to you from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Bill Murray, actor and Cubs fan, said that every Olympic competition should include one average person as a frame of reference for what these elite athletes are doing. Since, then, I've enjoyed picturing Bill Murray in Olympian wear in lane 9, still dog-paddling the 1500m while the next batch of swimmers wait impatiently to start their heats. Or Bill Murray trying to make one rotation on the high bar. Or Bill Murray cannonballing into the diving pool. It's been a fun diversion.

We sometimes lose track of the scale of greatness on display at the Olympics; on the other hand, we have a different reaction when we hear tales of how demanding the athletes' regimens are. These are athletes who have given up nearly all of what we consider regular life. Their time, diets, and body movements are minutely orchestrated for years to attain elite skill levels. When I hear that Katie Ledecky is not just eating oatmeal for the nutrition but also at a heat level designed to raise her body temperature, I never once think, "I should pattern my breakfasts off hers."

I think we fall into the same pattern when we talk about spiritual health. As a pastor, I have encouraged every member of the congregation to practice regular Bible reading, regular prayer, regular attendance at church and Bible studies, and regular home devotions. This does not come close to commandeering all free time. In general, I am speaking about activities that all together take less than the Sabbath's (1/7th) portion of a week once considered standard for all Jews. Yet the sinner within us always reacts rebelliously: "That's just for those super-Christians, and I'm no zealot."

Humility is healthy. If we all walked around thinking we were the best Christians, we'd be as insufferable as the Pharisees. But listen again to Jesus setting the bare requirement for everyday disciples: "If you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples" (John 8:31). Abiding in His Word is not eating Katie Ledecky's super-oatmeal; it's just eating breakfast. "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me shall not hunger, and whoever believes in me shall never thirst" (John 6:35). When we leave aside God's Word, prayer, and Christian fellowship, we are starving spiritually.

Americans who adopt children from international orphanages are sometimes shocked at what passes for acceptable nutrition. The bare wisps of meals given to those kids for months or years as they await their new families take a tremendous toll on all levels of development. It's when those kids are taken out of orphanages and integrated side-by-side with kids who have had proper nourishment that all the ways they have been held back becomes apparent.

Standards set by others can impact our expectations of ourselves. Sometimes those standards push athletes to their best. Sometimes those standards make us think, "I don't need nourishment if I look no more scrawny than the guy over there." Holy Cross congregation will be blessed if we start talking to one another about the blessings we receive in Christ's Word. We can encourage one another. We can stir ourselves up to goodness and life. Jesus died for us, after all. He suffered to be able to pour out these gifts, in order to rescue us from the world and our own sins. He gives us eternal health and life. He sets a baptismal baseline from which we can begin again, restored in Him.

As we head towards Rally Day, let's start again. Let's run in His Word, strong in his truth and love, for "if you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free."



When it comes to stewardship, a favorite Bible verse is the account of the widow's mite (Luke 21:1–4). It's a moving account. Our Lord praises the seemingly small gift of two copper coins given by a poor widow above the abundance of gifts given by the rich, saying, "Truly, I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all of them" (Luke 21:3). And that is usually where we stop. But the text goes on. "For they all contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on" (Luke 21:4).

"She ... put in all she had to live on." She gave everything. She held nothing back. She trusted that the Lord who made her and all creatures; who gave her everything she had; who redeemed her from her own sin, from death, and the power of the devil; who called her by the gospel and enlightened her with His gifts of Word and Sacrament; would continue to do this. He would provide her with all that she needed for this body and life because that is the character of the God she had.

But this is not why we give small gifts. Her gift, though it appeared small, was actually large. When we are tempted to give small gifts, it is precisely because we want them to be small! We don't trust the Lord to provide for us. We give small gifts because we lack faith in the One who created us, redeemed us, sanctifies and keeps us in the one true faith. We give small gifts because we doubt that God will really give us what we need and desire. We give small gifts because we are not content with what God has already given.

We are not slaves, children of the slave woman, under the Old Covenant (Galatians 4). We are adopted sons of the free woman. And since we are sons, we are also heirs. And heirs receive the inheritance. For everything is already ours in Christ. And thus, moved by the willing spirit of adoption, we do the will of God in financial matters far beyond all that done by those under the Old Covenant who were forced by legal demands.

So, what have you decided to give? How do I decide what to give? Let the Scriptures be your guide.

We are to give proportionally to what we have received from God's giving to us (Luke 12:48; 1 Corinthians 16:1–2, 2 Corinthians 8:12). But you have not been set free to give nothing. See that you excel in the grace of giving (2 Corinthians 8:7)!

We are not free to live selfishly outside the Gospel, without regard for God who gives us all good gifts, without generosity for our neighbor who needs us and our gifts, without supporting the community of faith in which we live, without care for our spiritual fathers and those who teach and help raise our children in the faith, and without resources for the poor and needy.

In short, we are not free to live unto ourselves, hoarding what God has given us only for us. For love is the fulfillment of the law (Romans 13:10). And the sum of the law is this: Love God and love your neighbor (Matthew 22:34–40). We love because He first loved us. We give because He has given to us.

Luther once said, "Possessions belong in your hands, not in your heart" (LW 14:240). There is a reason your 10 fingers spread apart. With your hands you catch God's gifts for what you need and let the rest fall through your fingers to your neighbors – your family, your friends, your community, your church.
