Making peace by the blood of his cross — Colossians 1:15-20

Grace, peace, and mercy to you from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

For much of John Milton's life, he worked in government in Britain. He helped steward England in that brief period of the Commonwealth when there was neither king nor queen. When the monarchy was restored in 1660, Milton was not just out of a job. He had lost his sight. He related to Samson from the book of Judges, a Jewish hero who also ended up blind and captive (Judges 16:23-31). In those last verses of Samson's history, Samson had been brought out to be mocked by the Philistine lords. Samson asked the Lord to return his strength to give him vengeance. When Samson's strength returned, he knocked over the pillars of the Philistine palace, collapsing the building. "So, the dead whom he killed at his death were more than those whom he had killed during his life" (Judges 16:30).

Thankfully, Milton's exile from public life was more productive. He finished many of his great works of poetry, including Paradise Lost, an epic poem. Where previous epics showed men waging war against other men with the help of the pagan gods, Milton depicted the rebellion of Satan and the fallen angels against the one, true God. Milton said he wanted to "justify the ways of God to men."

And yet, for many readers, the hero of Milton's poem is controversial. Milton's depiction of Satan is so vivid and compelling that more than a few have suggested the rebel angel is the real hero. To be sure, the Bible itself teaches the fallen angel to be attractive to men (2 Corinthians 11:14). But Milton seems to give all the best lines to Satan, like, "Better to reign in hell, than serve in heaven."

English scholars can patiently go through Milton's poem and point to how the poet depicts Satan as wrong, doubly wrong, damnably wrong. Satan says things that are internally inconsistent. He's proved a liar. His "reign" does no one any good. C.S. Lewis, who was an English scholar of renown before he was a Christian apologist and novelist of renown, even makes a compelling case that Milton intends for us to laugh at Satan's foolery.

Martin Luther, who lived through an uprising trying to overthrow the government, may explain this phenomenon. Luther had tried to reason with angry citizens to bring them to peaceful solutions. Even with Luther's heroic standing and rhetorical power, he could not move them. Later, he explained that once the spirit of rebellion overtakes us, there's no reasoning with it. In other words, Milton scholars can quote line after line, and it will not convince. It's like trying to reason with a wild bronco.

The point for us is not to talk through an old poem. The point is the spirit of rebellion is precisely what's attractive to us. We like spitting in the eye of someone we think is misusing authority. And when we're captivated by that rebellion, we're not interested in talking it out (Hebrews 3:15). When we catch wind of that spirit, may the Holy Spirit bring us directly to humble repentance.

The younger Samson was a romantic figure, one moment killing Philistines with a jawbone, the next moment drinking with them and telling tales. The older Samson, however, had been humbled. No longer depending on his own strength, he asks the Lord for strength. Vengeance belongs to the Lord.

The scene is instructive. While one defeated Samson is whispering his feeble prayer, he is surrounded by thousands chanting to the false Philistine god. The outnumbering of the worshippers did not count. Only the true God answered. He gave his wayward servant strength to finally accomplish the task Samson had long before been called and authorized to do.

There is no reigning in hell. Rebellion leads to Paradise being lost. Who in hell would submit to any authority? The Lord Almighty's reign is unlimited. He reigns even in Philistia's temples to Dagon. All authority in heaven and earth has been given to Him- not because He overthrew others to receive it. All authority in heaven and earth has been given to Jesus because He submitted to death, even death on a cross (Philippians 2:5-11). Finally, to Him, every knee will bow and tongue confess, "Jesus is Lord!"



Newsletter article – September 2021

At the end of the first of his chapters on the virtue of faith in *Mere Christianity*, C.S. Lewis provides a helpful reminder, by way of analogy, for the foundation of stewardship. He wrote:

"Every faculty you have, your power of thinking or of moving your limbs from moment to moment, is given you by God. If you devoted every moment of your whole life exclusively to His service you could not give Him anything that was not in a sense His own already. So then, when we talk of a man doing anything for God or giving anything to God, I will tell you what it is really like. It is like a small child going to its father and saying, 'Daddy, give me sixpence to buy you a birthday present.' Of course, the father does, and he is pleased with the child's present. It is all very nice and proper, but only an idiot would think that the father is sixpence to the good on the transaction. When a man has made these two discoveries God can really get to work. It is after this that real life begins. (128–129)."

This is the first thing we are given to confess about stewardship, and it has to do with ownership. God owns everything, and we are simply managers – stewards – acting on His behalf. This is true not only of all that we have in this life (Deut. 8:17–18) but also all that we are in this life (1 Cor. 6:20).

The rest flows from here. Since we are stewards, or managers, of what belongs to God, entrusted to make use of it according to His will, there is an expectation of responsibility and accountability. For the Lord said, "Everyone to whom much was given, of him much will be required, and from him to whom they entrusted much, they will demand the more" (Luke 12:48b). And from this comes blessing and reward: "Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master" (Matt. 25:21).

We have everything we need to support this body and life from our God's fatherly divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in us. We have everything we need for our spiritual life also from His merciful hands. On account of the sacrifice of His Son,
