Making peace by the blood of his cross — Colossians 1:15-20

Grace, peace, and mercy to you from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

"So all Israel went to their tents" (1 Chronicles 10:16). After the wealth and glory of the monarchies of David and Solomon, when the people of Israel went home, they went to tents. David, we remember, made a point of building a stationery palace for the king, then beginning the work of a stationery temple. "See now, I dwell in a house of cedar, but the ark of God dwells in a tent" (2 Samuel 7:2). The people of Israel, it appears, took much longer to "put down roots."

The difference between a house and a tent is everything you cannot carry. People who carry their tent-homes on their backs think carefully about every ounce that comes for the journey. A cast-iron griddle is wonderful in a kitchen, but only makes sense at a campfire if you drove there. When you live in a tent, you know what you have. A house lets you collect things you forget you have.

In 2 Kings 22, renovations to the stationery temple led to the corners being cleaned, the dust cleared away, and a lost artifact being rediscovered. The book of the Law- Moses' teachings- were found. It was like the Reformation of the 16th century AD.

How can you lose the Bible? I like to imagine those first generations of priests who put that book in the corner did so because they knew it so well. They had the book in their minds and hearts and didn't think they needed to check it. But Deuteronomy had insisted we not just know it:

"You shall therefore lay up these words of mine in your heart and in your soul, and you shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. You shall teach them to your children, talking of them when you are sitting in your house, and when you are walking by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates, that your days and the days of your children may be multiplied in the land that the LORD swore to your fathers to give them, as long as the heavens are above the earth." (11:18-23)

However it happened, eventually one generation forgot the book was there. Do we blame stationery houses? No. There is a difference, all the same, between a culture of tent-carriers and those who are comfortable in this world.

The book of Hebrews is getting at this in the passages we have been hearing over the past weeks on Sundays. Hebrews 11 describes the great heroes of faith, saying they "acknowledged that they were strangers and exiles on the earth" (11:14). In other words, they weren't satisfied with what they had on earth. They hadn't made permanent homes here. They were looking for something better to come.

Describing that tent-dweller attitude, Hebrews encourages us: "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our

faith" (12:1-2). This always reminds me of accounts from through-hikers, who plan long journeys living by what they carry on their backs. They always overpack and start leaving things behind they'd rather not carry. The tent-dweller, the exile, knows what is worth its weight.

We're not talking about cleaning our houses. "Lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely." We're talking about cleaning our hearts. Is that entertainment news I watch worth the weight of wrathfulness and resentment? Are those tv shows worth the weight of lust? Are those grudges I carry

worth the numbness to mercy's freedom? What is holding me back from running this marathon? It is time to clean out the dusty corners and find the treasure of God's Word.

For the Biblical tent-dweller, the faithful exile, is not just living a simple life. The great cloud of witnesses lived the hopeful life. They looked ahead to foundations which could not be shaken, to eternal life in the house of God. We look to Jesus, the builder and the architect, because old King David was wrong. David didn't need to build a house for God. God builds the house for us. Jesus lived the perfect life in the tent of this body, died for us, and rose again, vindicating hope forevermore.



What is Stewardship?

What is a steward? Most people, when asked this question, will reply: "A manager." That is correct, but it is only half right. A steward is indeed a manager, but he is a manager of what does not belong to him. Someone else is the owner, and the steward manages the owner's property on the owner's behalf.

We are God's stewards. Our stewardship is that God has made us managers of what belongs to Him. For we have brought nothing into this world, and we can take nothing out of it (1 Tim. 6:7). Everything that we have and everything that we are comes from God's fatherly Divine goodness and mercy. God is the owner. Not only because, as the Creator, He created all things. But also, as the Redeemer, He has redeemed, that is, purchased and won all things. It all, therefore, belongs to Him.

We are simply managers of everything in this world. Like Joseph in Egypt, we are put in charge of managing what belongs to God. What a privilege. Think about that for a minute. The all-knowing, all-powerful, all-wise God has asked us to manage His possessions on His behalf here on earth. And by doing this, He invites us to take part in the allocation of His good gifts. He wants us to give our input and advise Him in where His gifts are to be used. What a privilege indeed.

What a responsibility. For to whom much is given, much shall be required (Luke 12:48). We are not the owners. And while He puts us as managers, we are still to do with His property what He wants done with it. That means we need to know what His desire and will for His property is.

How do we know this? How can we know the will and mind of God? We find the will of God in the Bible. There God tells us what His will for all His gifts are to be used. He tells us how we are to spend our time and use our talents and treasures. He instructs us in the use of our minds, bodies, and souls.

There is nothing that we have that doesn't belong to Him. "Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price" (1 Cor. 6:19–20). He informs us of the big picture, the overarching policy, of how we as His stewards – His managers and custodians – of His property are to do the managing.



As St. Paul said: "Do not present your members to sin as instruments for unrighteousness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and your members to God as instruments for righteousness" (Rom. 6:13). Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs)

When planning your IRA withdrawal strategy, you may want to consider making charitable donations through a QCD.

Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs)

When planning your IRA withdrawal strategy, you may want to consider making charitable donations through a QCD.

A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian, payable to a qualified charity. QCDs can be counted toward satisfying your required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year, as long as certain rules are met.

In addition to the benefits of giving to charity, a QCD excludes the amount donated from taxable income, which is unlike regular withdrawals from an IRA. Keeping your taxable income lower may reduce the impact to certain tax credits and deductions, including Social Security and Medicare.

Also, QCDs don't require that you itemize, which due to the recent tax law changes, means you may decide to take advantage of the higher standard deduction, but still use a QCD for charitable giving.

Can I make a QCD?

While many IRAs are eligible for QCDs—Traditional, Rollover, Inherited, SEP (inactive plans only), and SIMPLE (inactive plans only)* —there are requirements:

- You must be 70½ or older to be eligible to make a QCD.
- QCDs are limited to the amount that would otherwise be taxed as ordinary income.
 This excludes non-deductible contributions.
- The maximum annual amount that can qualify for a QCD is \$100,000. This applies to the sum of QCDs made to one or more charities in a calendar year. (If, however, you file taxes jointly, your spouse can also make a QCD from his or her own IRA within the same tax year for up to \$100,000.)
- For a QCD to count towards your current year's RMD, the funds must come out of your IRA by your RMD deadline, generally December 31.
- Contributing to an IRA may result in a reduction of the QCD amount you can deduct. (The aggregate amount of deductible IRA contributions you make to your IRA after you turn 70 1/2 will reduce the amount of the QCD that is not includible in your gross income.)

Any amount donated above your RMD does not count toward satisfying a future year's RMD.

Funds distributed directly to you, the IRA owner, and which you then give to charity do not qualify as a QCD.

Under certain circumstances, a QCD may be made from a Roth IRA. Roth IRAs are not subject to RMDs during your lifetime, and distributions are generally tax-free. Consult a tax advisor to determine if making a QCD from a Roth is appropriate for your situation.

What kind of charities qualify?

The charity must be a 501(c)(3) organization, eligible to receive tax-deductible contributions.

Some charities do not qualify for QCDs:

- Private foundations
- Supporting organizations: i.e., charities carrying out exempt purposes by supporting other exempt organizations, usually other public charities
- Donor-advised funds, which public charities manage on behalf of organizations, families, or individuals

Tax reporting

A QCD is reported as a normal distribution on IRS Form 1099-R for any non-Inherited IRAs. For Inherited IRAs or Inherited Roth IRAs, the QCD will be reported as a death distribution. Itemization is not required to make a QCD. While the QCD amount is not taxed, you may not then claim the distribution as a charitable tax deduction.

A QCD is not subject to withholding. State tax rules may vary, so for guidance, consult a tax advisor.

When making a QCD, you must receive the same type of acknowledgement of the donation that you would need to claim a deduction for a charitable contribution.

A tax advisor can help you determine if both your IRA and charity qualify for QCDs.
