Making peace by the blood of his cross – Colossians 1:15-20

Grace, peace, and mercy to you from our Lord and Savior, Emmanuel!

Our theme for this Advent is the image of God. Centuries before Jesus' birth, the Bible's teaching about our creation in God's image was groundbreaking. Gentiles with ears to hear recognized a foundation for true justice in Moses' teachings. Who could imagine the fulfillment of creation in God's image? With Jesus, God took on our flesh. Now, God is truly imaged as one of us. The ground once broken to hide seeds now erupts with new life.

Genesis 1:26-27 describes the Creator's fashioning of humanity. "God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them." How much is contained in these brief words! We are not accidents but made with purpose. God's image is not solitary, and neither can we be; family is in our DNA. Whether Jew or Gentile, male or female, rich or poor, all share the dignity of God's image. No human accomplishment or work will ever surpass the holiness of our creation; I cannot do something that renders me better than a being made in the image of God.

There are fireworks of glorious implications here. "God is love" erupts from this teaching. Racism and sexism are debarred by this doctrine. Though death will enter the world with sin and degrade our bodies, alienation from our own flesh cannot have the final or defining word. When our works cannot surpass our created stature, salvation can only come by grace through a faith that restores our relationship with our Creator.

Most wonderful of all, the promise of incarnation follows. The Father made us in the Divine image, preparing us for His Son to become one of us. The Word made flesh recreates us, restores what was sullied by sin. "To all who did receive Him, who believed in His name, He gave the right to become children of God, who were born not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God" (John 1:12-13).

Join us this Advent to meditate on and grow in this theme. We will have vespers services on Wednesdays at both 5 PM and 7 PM. A fellowship meal will be held between the two services. Join with your church in watching and waiting.

The restoration of the image of God does not happen in a small or lonely way but with the Shepherd regathering His flock from all peoples. The lonely part of this work happened on the cross, when Jesus was abandoned, the image of God denied in every way. "But I am a worm and not a man, scorned by mankind and despised by the people" (Psalm 22:6). Now He is risen, sending His followers to every tribe and nation (Matthew 28:19-20). Indeed, His first coming, which we celebrate on Christmas, called for that community from the beginning, gathering both shepherd and Magi, Jew and Gentile, poor and rich. The "family portrait" of the Nativity cannot be just one blood family, but those who were once strangers made into the new community of the Christ.

That family portrait, first in David's city with shepherds and foreign rulers, is still being drawn and expanded. We, who gather around the Christ and His gifts, are drawn into this eternal family, the image of God being restored in His holy community. O Come, o come, Emmanuel, who ransoms captive Israel!



And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying:

Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will towards men.



And it came to pass, as the angels were gone away from them into heaven, the shepherds said to one another,

Let us go even unto Bethlehem, and see this thing that has come to pass, which the Lord has made known to us.

And they came with haste, and found, Mary, Joseph and the babe lying in a manger. And when they had seen it, they made known abroad the saying which was told them concerning this child. And all they that heard it wondered at those things which were told them by the shepherds. But Mary kept all these things, and pondered them in her heart. And the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things that they had heard and seen, as it was told unto them.

THE MEASURE OF OUR GENEROSITY

If you open up the Small Catechism, you'll find a shortened version of the Third Commandment: "Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy." But if you look up the list of the Ten Commandments in Exodus, you'll find the full version:

Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor, and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, you, or your son, or your daughter, your male servant, or your female servant, or your livestock, or the sojourner who is within your gates. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested on the seventh day. Therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy. (Ex. 20:8–11)

Why did Luther shorten this commandment for the Small Catechism? Was it so that the kids wouldn't have so much to memorize? No, it was because Luther knew that all the details of the Third Commandment were part of the "shadow" of the Old Testament (Col. 2:16). Or as St. Paul puts it, there is "letter" in the Old Testament law and "spirit" (2 Cor. 3:6). The details of not working on Saturday were fulfilled by Christ. That part of the Sabbath regulation no longer applies. But the spirit of the law does remain: We need to dedicate sufficient time each week to hearing God's Word and giving it honor and respect. Or as Luther sums it up in the Small Catechism's explanation to the Third Commandment: "We should fear and love God so that we do not despise preaching and His Word but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it."

The same sort of analysis applies to our giving. In the Old Testament, God commanded the Israelites to give a tenth of their income to the Levites so that those men could dedicate their lives to serving in God's house, teaching the people, conducting worship, etc. In the New Testament, there is a rigid requirement listed about handing in your tax forms to church to make sure you've given enough. But the mandate to have a full-time ministry, which is the spirit of that law concerning tithing to the Levites, is right there in 1 Corinthians 9:14: "The Lord has ordained that those who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel."

The New Testament church's job is significantly larger than the job of Old Testament Israel. We are commanded to preach the Gospel to all nations. There was only the temple to maintain in the Old Testament, but we have churches, schools, universities and seminaries, plus missionaries everywhere. So you tell me: Can we really undertake the work of the ministry if our giving doesn't even measure up to Old Testament levels of generosity?
