Making peace by the blood of his cross – Colossians 1:15-20

Grace, peace, and mercy to you from the Savior of the Nations, Jesus Christ!

I heard the bells on Christmas day Their old familiar carols play And mild and sweet their songs repeat Of peace on Earth, good will to men

And in despair I bowed my head "There is no peace on Earth" I said For hate is strong and mocks the song Of peace on Earth, good will to men.

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow penned these words in 1863. It was the middle of the Civil War, a hopeless time for warring states. For Longfellow, personally, grief held a tight grip. Eighteen months prior, his wife died. She was attempting to seal with hot wax an envelope containing locks of their children's hair. She accidentally lit her dress on fire. Waking from a nap to her screams, Longfellow rushed to her, covering her with a rug. The rug was too small, feeding the fire instead of staunching it. He tried to quench the flames with his own body. He could not save her. He could not save her with his own body. Longfellow's burns were so severe, he was unable to attend his wife's funeral. Grief devouring him, he worried he might go insane, pleading not to be sent to an asylum. Then, Longfellow's son joined the army and was severely wounded. That Christmas, it is understandable, his thoughts dwelt on death.

Then from each black, accursed mouth The cannon thundered in the South, And with the sound the carols drowned Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

Grief tells a hard story: "What you loved is gone. What you love and have not yet lost may soon be taken away. Be not at peace, for loss is not only present but future, too."

The Gospel tells another story. The Son of God did not spurn or avoid this waning world. He became one of us, from the beginning of our story. From the fragile moments in the womb to the frustrating inabilities of the first years toddling, Jesus embraced our life. He didn't just appear on stage, a full-grown man, do His thing, and run back to heaven.

The Gospel tells us there is so much more story after death. Jesus' story wouldn't still be told today if, after He was crucified, His corpse stayed moldering in the grave. He rose from the dead. He promised us we're coming with Him. The Gospel tells us what we lose is not lost. "Truly, I say to you, there is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or lands, for my sake and for the gospel, who will not receive a hundredfold now in this time, houses and brothers and sisters and

mothers and children and lands, with persecutions, and in the age to come eternal life" (Mark 10:29-30).

Longfellow heard that story growing up. He knew the songs of Christmas.

No more let sins and sorrows grow Nor thorns infest the ground; He comes to make His blessings flow Far as the curse is found.

And

Hail, the heav'n-born Prince of Peace!
Hail, the Sun of Righteousness!
Light and life to all He brings,
Ris'n with healing in His wings.

When the church bells played the tunes, Longfellow knew the words. The Gospel echoed throughout even the war-torn land. Hearing that Gospel allowed Longfellow to end his poem in hope.

Did you hear Christmas bells this year? In fact, many churches stay closed on Christmas day. Sure, there may be "Christmas music" playing through December. But how much of that music tells a different story? Think about how Longfellow might hear music telling him it's too cold outside to cut a romantic night short, that the meaning of the holidays revolves around family, about chestnuts and open fires! So much of our holiday "magic" is cold comfort for the grieving. Jesus, however, promised, "Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted" (Matthew 5:4).

Our church building does not have bells. Brothers and sisters, you are the bells of Holy Cross. You are the ones who can tell the Gospel to those in need. It is a beautiful song, from generation to generation!

Then pealed the bells more loud and deep: "God is not dead, nor doth He sleep; The Wrong shall fail, the Right prevail With peace on earth, good-will to men."







The Chief Stewards of Humanity: Mom and Dad

St. Paul tells the Ephesians that the first commandment with a specific promise attached to it is, "Honor your father and mother so that it may go well with you, and you may live long in the land" (Eph. 6:2). This promise is one indication of the importance of this commandment. The other thing that highlights the special nature of this commandment is its placement within the Ten Commandments.

The Ten Commandments are clearly organized in two big categories. The first three commandments deal with our relationship with God. This category is called the First Table of the Law. The last seven commandments, the Second Table of the Law, tell us how we should relate to other people. These two tables correspond to what Jesus calls the two greatest commandments: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind," and "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matt. 22:37–39).

The order of the Second Table of the Law is also important. Murder is a greater sin than adultery, which is a greater sin that stealing, or lying, or coveting. But why is the Fourth Commandment first in the Second Table, ahead of "you shall not murder"? Is disobeying your parents really worse than murder? Or maybe we should give up on thinking these commandments are ordered?


The overall effect of this order is to get us to see our parents as a connection point between our neighbors and our God. Throughout our upbringing our father and mother stand between us and God and deliver His gifts to us: God clothes us, feeds us, protects us and teaches His Word to us through our parents.

So, parents have a very high calling from God. They are called to be stewards of the greatest gift: the gift of life.

Parenting thus gives us a keen insight into all our stewardship. Parents know that they have been given a great treasure in their children, a treasure that does not belong to them, yet for which they feel a great deal of responsibility. Truth be told, every gift we have been given is like this, because everything we have — whether our own personal skills and powers or our wealth and time — is all from God. He entrusts it all to us so that we can use it all and take care of it all for His great purposes.
