"Ligonier Ministries sponsored its 2016 State of American Theology Study by Life-Way Research to measure the current theological awareness of adult Americans [survey of 3000 Americans]... identified specific doctrines and heresies they wanted to test... [and] focused on six key doctrinal areas [including]... specific areas where Americans differ from historic and orthodox views."

The six categories are: God, Goodness and Sin, Salvation and Religious Texts, Heaven and Hell, Church, Authority.

Some of the findings (shown in the table at the end of this article) should give us pause — especially the beliefs of some of those who claim to hold "Evangelical beliefs" — and remind us of the tremendous need for Christians to be vigilant and diligent in reading, hearing, and studying the Word of God in order that our faith in Christ might be fed, strengthened, and safeguarded against heresies.

Paul's warning in his second letter to Pastor Timothy in the first century warns and calls us to attend faithfully to the Word of God: ³For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths. (2Timothy 4:3-4).

Against such tendencies of the sinful and rebellious heart, Paul's command and encouragement to pastors today are the same as to Pastor Timothy: ¹I charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and by his appearing and his kingdom: ²preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching. (2Timothy 4:1-2)

As we start a new year, set aside time each day, even if only a few minutes, to read and, by its grace, trust and stand firm on God's Word and its power and efficacy to guard against and correct false teaching and false beliefs: ¹⁴But as for you, continue in what you have learned and have firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it ¹⁵and how from childhood you have been acquainted with the sacred writings, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. ¹⁶All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, ¹⁷that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work. (2Timothy 3:14-17)

Help a formerly homeless young person ages 18-24, or family move into an apartment. When our youth and families come to LSS, they often come with only a grocery bag full of possessions. They have renewed hope with their new housing, but are walking into an empty apartment with no income to buy household supplies. 30% of whatever income the client has –usually less than \$750 - must be paid out in rent. This leaves very little money left for food and basic needs – about \$17 per day. **Sweet Home Baskets** make them feel welcome and shows that others care.

NFS JANUARY OUTINGS

The first is on Thursday, January 5th to Peter's Steak House located in Isleton CA. Isleton is an old town that was established during the gold rush period of 1849. Actually the town was at first just a part of the Delta. When the Chinese immigrants lured to CA for the gold stayed on to begin the hand task of dredging and constructing levees to hold back the water and when the water was pumped out islands were formed, one of which was what an Isleton resident now call home. When you come off Highway 160 which follows the Sacramento River you go down into Isleton and are very much aware that you are going below the level of the river. I have always been fascinated by the Delta, coming from Minnesota where they have thousands of lakes and islands, but never build below the water level. The town of Isleton consists of old buildings with metal sidings as a precaution against fires much the same as Lock. Peter's Steak House serves all lunches with a choice of a green salad or steak fries. The fish and chips and Prime Rib are excellent and of course they have a host of sandwiches to choose from. I'm looking forward to the drive through the Delta and lunch at Peter's Steak House. Meet at Church at 11:45 leave at 12:00. Lunch is as always planned for 1:00 Sign up in the social hall so we know how many to plan on...Bring a Friend.

Our 2nd outing is again on a **Thursday**, **January** 19th to The New Mecca Mexican Restau-

rant located at 324 Railroad Ave. Pittsburg, CA and is at our usual time of 1:00. The Mecca Restaurant has been a favorite place for Mexican food since early in the 1960's. They say it has been remodeled but I can't say that it looks remodeled to me. But they do have excellent Mexican food. I like having a Chile Verde Burrito with just pork in the burrito which is what you get at Mecca's not with a lot of rice and beans. When you first sit down they bring you a bowl of their famous bean dip and a bowl of salsa along with a big bowl of chips. It really sets the stage for a great meal. I usually have the Marcela Special (\$9.75) which is a Beef Enchilada and a Pork Burrito which comes with refried beans cheese and rice. I ask for a double refried beans as I don't care that much for the rice with my Mexican meal. I do like a beer though and I get a Bud Light which is \$3.50 for a total of \$13.75. So with tax and 20% tip it comes to about \$18.00, really hard to beat in this day and economy. Meet at church at 12:00 leave at 12:15. Sign up in the Social Hall. 
