The season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 1, 2017.

A recent Pew study confirmed what many have suspected based on anecdotal evidence: the so-called "Ferguson Effect" (1) is real and police officers at times hesitate to engage in proactive policing or take actions that protect them for fear of undue and unfair scrutiny and accusations.

Since the confirmed-by-the Justice-Department-and grand-jury-to-have-been-a-justified shooting death of Michael Brown by Officer Darren Wilson on August 9, 2014, in Ferguson, Missouri, that led to wide-spread, violent protests, a number of incidents have been reported in which police officers were hesitant to draw, let alone fire, their weapons for fear of the almost-always-proven-to-be-unjustified criticism and charges of racism (where certain races are involved as victims) and/or police brutality that could ruin the officer's career and life, as it did Officer Wilson's.

One such incident occurred on October 5, 2016, in which a Chicago female police officer was severely beaten by a 28-year even though officers punched and shocked him with tasers in an attempt to free their fellow officer from his clutches. The female officer was hospitalized with shoulder, wrist, and neck injuries. Police Superintendent Johnson, discussing the incident the following night, that the officer feared for her life but did not draw her gun because "she didn't want her family or the department to go through the scrutiny the next day on the national news." "Murder Rate Spike Could Be 'Ferguson Effect,' DOJ Study Says" was a 2016 headline posted by npr.org. The study's author noted that in 2015, murder spiked in urban areas, homicides jumping 17% in the country's 56 biggest cities. "That's a far larger percentage increase than in nearly any other year we've seen over the last couple of decades," the author said. (3)

A study released on January 11, 2017 by the Pew Research Center (4) appears to confirm the DOJ study and provide evidence that the Chicago female officer's reason for not using her firearm even when it was appropriate and justifiable is as widespread among officers as many had feared. Based on a national, representative sample of 8000 male and female police officers from 54 police and sheriff's departments (each with at least 100 officers) across the country, the Pew study, conducting interviews between May 19 and Aug. 14, 2016, found that a large percentage of officers noted the following in their own departments because of high-profile incidents involving blacks and the police:

- * Officers have become more concerned about their safety (93%)
- * Officers have been reluctant to use force when it is appropriate (76%)
- * Interactions between police and blacks have become more intense (75%)
- Officers have become less willing to stop and question people who seem suspicious (72%)

These findings are instructive on the importance of truth and facts, especially for

Christians, no matter how emotionally charged an issue or incident might be.

When "Ferguson" happened, many, including many Christians, expressed outrage and — absent any substantiating evidence — leveled charges of racism and murder against officer Wilson and disparaged those who opted to wait for the fact before rendering judgment.

As I've written before, Christians ought to be concerned with truth. We need to be extra careful that we don't sacrifice truth and facts at the altar of political correctness or social activism. Christians who accused and convicted Officer Wilson of racism and murder in the courts of conventional (television, radio, newspaper) or social media (blogs, Facebook pages, YouTube postings, etc.) without factual basis at the very least flirted with breaking the 8th commandment ("Thou shalt not bear false witness"), which Martin Luther explains as including the protection of others' reputations. I have read or heard few apologies from Christians who prejudicially and publicly asserted or insinuated Officer Wilson.

If Christians demonstrate by our words a cavalier attitude toward truth and facts in such incidents as Ferguson or in Ferguson-related issues, why should unbelievers believe that we're not playing fast and loose with truth and facts when we proclaim the Gospel of Christ's incarnation, life, crucifixion, and resurrection and that "God so loved the world that He gave His Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16)?

Not only do our actions have consequences, so do our words. Christians know this as well as anyone since we believe in the God and Savior, Jesus Christ, who is the way, truth, and the life, and we believe and proclaim God's Word as truth, which matters and is a matter of eternal life by grace through faith in Jesus.

Peter's Steak House


