1Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth!

<sup>2</sup>Serve the Lord with gladness!

Come into his presence with singing!

<sup>3</sup>Know that the Lord, he is God!

It is he who made us, and we are his;

we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture.

<sup>4</sup>Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise!

Give thanks to him; bless his name!

<sup>5</sup>For the Lord is good;

his steadfast love endures forever,

and his faithfulness to all generations. (Psalm 100)

An Internet search for "things to be thankful for" yields endless pages with lists of things to be thankful for; some lists include as many 1000 items for which to be thankful. Many lists include what most people would give thanks for, e.g., family, good health, friends, food, water, jobs, and freedom, and of course, Christians give thanks to God for Jesus and all the spiritual blessings that are ours by God's grace through faith in Him as Savior and Lord.

Other lists include things that likely we have not thought of, e.g., crescent moons, opposable thumbs, aglets, even numbers, butternut squash, jeans. Perhaps we have not thought of these because we take them for granted (life would be a lot more difficult if we didn't have opposable thumbs) or we think them silly. However, if we were to give thanks for such things that we would usually not think of, perhaps that would help us to realize the many blessings God gives to us each day, countless more than we think. We enjoy so many blessings that we count among the necessities of life but which would be luxuries most people in the rest of the world could only dream of having.

As I'm writing this, I realize that I risk sounding trite to those who are experiencing tragedies: lives destroyed by devastating fires or hurricanes, wars and other forms of violence, inadequate food, water, shelter, or medicine, emotional upheavals, cancer or those debilitating and life-threatening illnesses and diseases. However, the reasons the psalmist gives for praise and thanksgiving are not luxuries, prosperity, or a life of ease that's free from struggles and difficulties. The

reasons in the psalm for praising and giving thanks to God are beyond our circumstances, even when those circumstances challenge our faith and faithfulness and move us to wonder why God doesn't intervene to bring about relief and restoration.

The psalmist calls us to praise God and give thanks to Him because of:

- Who we are We are God's, created and redeemed by Him. We are the people of God, sheep of the Good Shepherd who laid down His life for His sheep.
- 2. Who God is God is God. He is Lord of heaven and earth and He is Redeemer and Sanctifier, who is good and whose steadfast love and faithfulness endures for ever.

Giving thanks to God doesn't mean that our pains will suddenly disappear. It means that we can go through whatever difficulties we experience knowing that the God whom we trust is good and gracious and faithful and is worthy of our praise and thanksgiving.

Give thanks to him; bless his name! For the Lord is good; his steadfast love endures forever, and his faithfulness to all generations.

# **Upcoming WoHC activities:**



# Speiskammier German Restaurant Nov. 9th 2017

The first outing for the Nifty Fifty Seniors for November is lunch at Speiskammier, a German restaurant located at 2424 Lincoln Ave., Alameda, California 94501. We went there a couple of years ago and it was excellent. Some of their dinner entrees are Sauerbraten, cost \$19.50, half \$11.50 (Braised Beef Tri Tip aged and marinated in Red Wine & Secret Spices served with Red Cabbage and Spätzle). Wiener Schnitzel, cost \$17.75, half \$ 10.75 (2) Pork Cutlets, breaded & pan-fried served with roasted potatoes). Bratwurst, cost \$14.75, half \$9.00 (2 Grilled Lean Bratwurst with Cracked Spices served over Sauerkraut & Mashed Potatoes). They also have a lunch menu mostly of sandwiches on a toasted baguette for around \$9.50. It might be better to order half a dinner rather than a sandwich as the portions may be like D J Bistro in Concord. They have beer on tap (6 different kinds) available in ½ liter or bottles. We should plan on carpooling as it's quite a distances to Alameda and there is a real problem finding a place to park. Reservations have been made for 1:00 PM. Meet at church at 12:00 and leave at 12:15. This should be a fun outing so bring a friend. Marv Kreitz

### Riverview Lodge Nov. 20th 2017

One of my favorite places to eat is at the Riverview Lodge located at the foot of (I) Street in Antioch. What I like is their Daily Special lunch of some type of fish or meat dish for \$9.95. You can substitute cold slaw for the vegetable and along with the mashed potatoes and plenty of good bread and you have all you can eat. The Riverview first opened in 1947 and is right on the river, so you can enjoy watching the river traffic. It's not uncommon to have a large ship pass while eating, in fact, when Jack Mortenson was there years ago he told me he saw a large oil tanker on the river, just outside the Riverview Dock, reversed direction with the aid of tugs after unloading some oil in order to proceed up river. Evidently the river is wider and deeper in that area. I'm sure most of you have enjoyed eating there if you have lived in this area for any period of time.
