GIFTS FOR THE COMMON GOOD

As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace.

This passage from 1Peter 4:10 is printed in each week's worship service bulletin to remind us that God has given us gifts and the reason He gave those gifts and to encourage us to use them in a God-pleasing manner.

After telling us how God's people, as "good stewards," use their God-given gifts to serve one another, meaning the gifts belong to God and are "given" to us to be used according to His purpose, Peter reminds us in verse 11 of that same chapter that the ultimate goal is to glorify God in the use of those gifts to serve one another: Whoever speaks, as one who speaks oracles of God; whoever serves, as one who serves by the strength that God supplies—in order that in everything God may be glorified through Jesus Christ. To him belong glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen.

Can you think of ways in which we can serve the Lord without somehow serving people? Unless we count such things as spending "alone time" with God and reading Scripture, what service can we render to God that does not in some way touch the lives of others whether they be believers or unbelievers?

Paul, in Romans 12 and 1Corinthians 12, adds to the two gifts that St. Peter lists.

Romans 12:6-8

⁶Having gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us use them: if prophecy, in proportion to our faith; ⁷if service, in our serving; the one who teaches, in his teaching; ⁸the one who exhorts, in his exhortation; the one who contributes, in generosity; the one who leads, with zeal; the one who does acts of mercy, with cheerfulness.

1Corinthians 12:8-10

⁸For to one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, ⁹to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, ¹⁰to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the ability to distinguish between spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues.

Like Peter, Paul also tells the purpose for which God gives gifts to His people; they are given for the purpose of serving the good of the Church and the calling of the Church. As believers in Christ, we build up and encourage one another in the faith and share the Gospel with those who not yet know Jesus as Savior:

⁷To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. (1Corinthians 12:7).

Like Peter, who reminds us that we are stewards of God's gives, Paul reminds us of the attitude with which we use our God-given gifts:

³For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned. ⁴For as in one body we have many members, and the members do not all have the same function, ⁵so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another. (Romans 12:3-5)

Peter and Paul speak of God's gifts to His people in relationship to their use in service to others.

The gifts are not an end in themselves; they are a means to an end, the goal being to serve God by serving others within the Church and outside the Church.

God has given each of you gifts, skills, talents. To be sure, using them in the manner God intended will bring blessings to you. However, they are given to you so that you could be a blessing to one another and to those who do not yet know Jesus.

Use God's for the purpose God intended. Recognize that the gifts themselves or merely being in possession of those don't glorify God (they're from God anyway); using them as good, faithful, and humble stewards to serve God by serving others glorifies God.

So by the grace of God, as each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace.




To the Members of Holy Cross

Long Range Planning and Call Committee Update Mike Liebe

Our <u>Long Range Planning and Call Committee</u> continues to meet each Sunday morning, although we changed our start time to 8:30 to avoid schedule conflicts with bible study and other meetings. The core Committee includes Cherylene B., Pat K., Eric R., John C., Mike V., and Mike L., and we have room for other interested persons to participate.

Since our last update the committee has reached out to sister congregations and District resources as we continue with our planning and call process. Mike L. spoke with Jeff McKenzie of First Lutheran who leads their Call Committee. Jeff shared cost of housing, cost of living, traffic, and perceptions of California are factors that present challenges to call candidates from out of state. First has been working with the District to receive a seminary candidate, and expected to hear the outcome April 24.

The Committee completed a tool that involves priority ranking of attributes for our new pastor based on our perceived needs of Holy Cross. More to follow on that below...

A group of twenty members were able to meet with Pastor Ted Hartman, a District representative who works with congregations that are in transition, on the evening of April 16 to discuss the state of church participation both nationally and specific to California, and how churches are making changes to better serve current church families and their communities.

The averaged results of the attribute rankings were shared with the attendees. While all of the attributes were considered important and the difference between some rankings and order was very small, the top 11 include:

- Gospel oriented and scripturally sound.
- People skills/people person.
- Counseling skills.
- Visitation skills with compassion.
- Equip and motivate the lay ministry.
- Good experience and performance in previous congregation (as applicable).
- Strong Evangelism and mission orientation.
- Nurture growth with Outreach and emphasis on local community.
- Nurture the needs of senior membership.
- Team builder.
- Good track record with youth.

In discussing with Pastor Ted, six of the above attributes fit with churches that are evolving to better serve current membership and their communities, so it appears we are taking a balanced approach. Let the Committee know what you think.

Next steps for the Committee include preparing a vision to share with you for review and input by mid May, and completing a draft of the call package by April 30 to continue preparation for the call process. Our Committee has been considering the hurdles we will likely face with housing in Concord for our called candidate. And we are discussing creative and mutually beneficial stewardship methods to solve the problem. You are welcome to share your ideas as we continue in the planning and call process. Please continue to pray that we receive and follow the Holy Spirit's guidance in all matters of our planning, calling and welcoming our new pastor.
