The Word of God? Or the priorities of the world?

During the Memorial Day weekend in which Harambe the gorilla was killed by Cincinnati Zoo staff in order to save the life of a child who had fallen into the gorilla enclosure, 69 people were shot in Chicago, 6 of whom died. (1)

If the disproportionate news coverage of these respective tragedies were an indication, our society values the life of one gorilla above the lives of 69 human beings and their families. Many people were more upset about the gorilla's death than about the loss of human lives. An analysis by the Media Research Center showed that the gorilla's death received 54 times more coverage than the violence and murders in Chicago. "ABC, CBS and NBC... dedicated 55 minutes and 7 seconds of coverage to the death of Harambe, but only 1 minute and 1 second to the Chicago shooting spree." (2)

Headlines and articles from just the first half of June hint at the absurdity and the suspension of reason, common sense, and truth toward which political correctness and tolerance of just-about-anything-except-Christianity have pushed and continue to push us. For starters:

- "Firefighters Called 'Terrorists' For Putting American Flag On Truck" (3)
- "Elementary School Calls Police on 7-Y-O Boy for Sharing Bible Verses" (4)
- "Transgender Track Athlete Makes History as Controversy Swirls Around Her" (5). Another headline on this same story clarifies the issue: "...Boy Wins Honors In Girls All State Track and Field" (6)
- Blaming Christians for the Orlando mass murder of 49 people by a Islamist / ISIS sympathizer while ignoring the murderer's self-professed religious affiliation and allegiance (7) (8)

The unbelieving world believes and does what it wills, but what will God's people believe and do? How we will we respond to what goes against God's Word or even just common sense?

We don't want to fall into the trap that Paul warns about in 2Timothy 4: 3For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, ⁴and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths.

But as Paul encourages, As for you, always be sober-minded, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill your ministry (2Timothy 4:5) and Do not be con-



Concord Shelter

The Concord Shelter used to be where the homeless could go and spend the night or a few days or more, and then be on their way again. The shelter has gone through several good changes. We've watched it go through many phases over the years. It is now up to the point where this shelters' homeless clients receive a paycheck for serving in the military, Social Security, disability, and so forth. They must save money for their first deposit on an apartment.

This is where the shelter comes in. It gives them a place to eat and sleep while the final paperwork is being done for them, and to move into their own apartment. This can take up to three months or more. Different churches and organizations have a certain Saturday or Sunday to feed at the shelter. Holy Cross' time is the 4th Sunday of each month when we feed them a complete meal at Noon .We plan for 100+ servings to be dished out

HC has been serving the homeless for over 20 years. We started serving at Baldwin Park and fed there about 10 years. We then moved on to the Shelter to serve, when the "City of Concord" passed a rule that there was no longer any feeding the homeless allowed at the parks.

We miss our park friends, but it's refreshing to see the homeless getting into their own apts.etc. We are blessed by God every time we serve the less fortunate. Anyone can join us on Outreach Sunday. Just show up in the kitchen after the church service and we'll take it from there.


