Stick your nose in the Bible

"Stick your nose in the Bible" was arguably the most valuable but certainly one of the notable and memorable sound bites from the 69th convention of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LC-MS) in April 2012, as LC-MS President Matthew Harrison encouraged the convention to read and study the Word of God.

To fully appreciate the impact of that statement, one had to see President Harrison standing at the lectern speaking on the Synod's theme, "Witness, Mercy, Life Together," with his frayed and worn-from-use Greek New Testament in hand, repeatedly urging pastors and laity, "*Stick your nose in the Bible!*"

It was obvious from the physical condition of his Greek New Testament that President Harrison had had his nose in that Bible innumerable times — reading it, studying it, learning it. If President Harrison had used a new copy of the Greek New Testament, some of the impact of his statement would have been lost on me; in contrast to his Greek New Testament, my copy sits on my shelf, almost in mint condition from lack of use.

I'm guessing that a number of you have a primary Bible (the copy of the Bible that you normally use) that is in "like new" condition because it has not seen much use (assuming it's not a recent purchase). If this is true of you, I encourage you with President Harri-

son's words: "*Stick your nose in the Bible.*" Read the Word of God. Hear it. Study it. Learn it.

We all stick our nose (to continue with the metaphor) into all kinds of business and places where it doesn't belong. In the Word of God is one place where our nose — and our heart and mind — does belong. The Word of God gives life — life in the full / spiritual and eternal life — by giving faith in Jesus Christ for salvation, and, as does the Lord's Supper, it enables our life in Christ by sustaining and strengthening our faith in Christ.

"Stick your nose in the Bible" is not just some notable, memorable and valuable sound bite from some convention that will soon be forgotten were it not for the convention minutes recorded for posterity. "*Stick your nose in the Bible*" are words to live by daily, for when we stick our nose — and our heart and mind — into the Word of God, there we find Jesus, the Word of Life made flesh, along with God's revealed will for our life in Christ.

St. Paul writes in 2Timothy 3, the Scriptures ¹⁵...are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. ¹⁶All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, ¹⁷that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work — what more reason do we need to "*Stick our nose in the Bible?*"

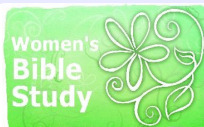

NIFTY FIFTY SENIORS CORNER

Black Diamond Mines Saturday June 9th

The Nifty Fifty main outing for June will be to the Black Diamond Mines located at 5175 Somersville Road Antioch Ca. 94509. The main underground Great House Visitor Center, which closed in 2007 is open, but only on Saturday and Sunday from 10:00 AM till 4:30 PM and is free. Parking is \$5.00 and cost of entering the Mine is \$5.00. It's about ¼ mile from the parking area to the Mine Entrance. They have a van that will take people up, but reservations must be made for the ride.. Docent led tours (10 or more) are at 1:00PM and 2:00PM and Drop in tours (less than 10) are at 12:00 and 3:00PM From the 1860s Through the turn of the last century nearly four million tons of coal (black Diamonds) was removed from the earth . The mine we will visit is the Hazel- Atlas Mine that produced silica sand to make jars, bottles and other glass items. Besides the Mine there is the Rose Hill Cemetery, which serves as a monument to the lives of the former residents. Buried here are children who died in epidemics women who died in childbirth and men who died in mining disasters and of other things. The park, which is over 6,000 acres, is an ideal location for hiking, picnicking and nature study... For a real view of local history visit this park. We should car pool as parking is \$5.00. We should plan on being at the park at 11:00AM if less then 10 sign up and 12:00 if we have enough for a Docent. Those that want to go can decide if they want to pack a lunch, or eat out then we can plan accordingly. Signup sheet will be in the social hall. I know this sound a little mixed up but we can work it out when we know who is going...Should be a great outing, so bring a friend...

MAC'S OLD HOUSE Wednesday June 20th
