The Greatest Generation, Baby Boomers, Gen-X (also Baby Busters), Gen-Y (born ~mid/

late 1970s to ~mid-1990s, also Millennials) and *Gen-Z* (born mid-1990s to present and counting)... Experts quibble over the dates and names but generally agree on the values that define each generation, particularly up through the Boomers and perhaps Gen-X (though there are regional differences). The later generations, especially Gen Z, are less well defined for obvious reasons; even the oldest of Gen-Z are not out of their teen years.

As a "Boomer" with 2 Gen Y kids, I've wondered what these demographics mean not just for my kids but also for kids in general and kids in our church. Sociologists, demographers and other researchers develop profiles that characterize the likes and dislikes of each generation, how they view their world, and what is most important to them. Implicit in all this research is that parents, educators, and even churches could use such data to develop new methodology or adapt old ones to teaching and raising Gen Y and Z kids.

These profiles provide helpful lenses and paradigms through which we can view and perhaps

understand better the Gen-Y and -Z cultures. Perhaps they are even useful in helping us define how we ought to "do church and worship" and best relate to members of these generations in our churches. To be sure, we should avail ourselves of various helps as we fulfill the Lord's Great Commission to us of making "disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father. and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you" (Matthew 28:19-20). However, just because our kids fall into a particular demographic category does not mean they are slaves to what that particular profile or paradigm says they are.

Parents are the primary and most important influence on their kids. Demographers may define their generation by a particular set of values, mores, music genre, or way of "doing church," etc., but that doesn't mean that my Gen-Y kids must be that way. For example, many people think we ought to get rid of traditional hymns or liturgy because they use outdated language and music and our young people cannot relate to them, yet my kids (17 and 20) love the traditional hymns as well as contemporary Christian songs. If we shouldn't "force" our kids to worship, read the Scriptures, or participate in

fellowship groups when they find these "boring," why don't we apply the same reasoning and standard to school work, chores, or anything else we think is important (of course, this assumes we think God, faithful worship, hearing and reading of the Scriptures really are important).

Our kids are pressured by many influences from the media, educators, fellow students, and friends that will challenge their faith and encourage them to question God and the Bible. Neither faithful worship nor attending a "Christian" immunizes them from such attacks on their faith in Christ. However, we can equip our kids to

September 27, 2009, We (Holy Cross) drove down Port Chicago Hwy./Arnold Industrial the Shelter in North Concord to feed needy/homeless; (less than 150 people) that leaves many, many, more on the streets. is the only shelter Concord has, contrary to what many people think.

In order to stay (& be fed) at the Shelter, they have to be a registered resident there. must be drug free & attend drug abuse classes every day throughout the week they leave & have their own place. can take up to a year or more. is a slow process & doesn't leave many openings for more needy people to get into the program. The residents are on a waiting list for their apartments; & when one becomes available they move with only the clothes on their backs. must find their own furniture, linens, beds, etc. this point only men & women are allowed to stay at the Concord Shelter. Families & Children must to city get help & register for a place; they are then put on a waiting list.

When you see homeless/hungry people on the streets it's because most of them have no place to go. great majority of the homeless are **Veterans with PTS** from past conflicts, But, they are becoming & more prevalent to the fact so many have been returning home from lrag!

Loaves & Fishes no longer feed in city of Concord, because they lost their 20 yr. lease next to Baldwin Park; continue to check buildings-looking for place to serve food to the needy.

Dear Families and

This is why doctors and researchers keep sharing the importance of staying hydrated.
