Turn Your Eyes Upon Jesus

These lyrics from the early 1900s remind us that the proper focus of the Christian life is Jesus: when we focus on Jesus, the earthly things that we hold so dear even those things

that are gifts from God — fade into their proper place in light of Jesus' incompara-

ble glory and grace. When Jesus Christ is where He should be in our lives, we can enjoy God's gifts the way He intended for us to enjoy them.

So "turn your eyes upon Jesus" are words to live by. Problem is, the song does not tell us where to find Jesus so that we can look into His wonderful face. What often comes to mind when we think of Jesus' face is one of those Sunday school pictures of Jesus we grew up with. Those pictures are, of course, just artists' rendition of what they thought Jesus looked like and may or may not bear much semblance to Jesus' physical appearance at all. We might look for Jesus in other places.

Where we find Jesus, and see Jesus, and look into

His wonderful face that shines with the light of His glory and grace is in the Scriptures, the Word of God. In God's Word, we see Jesus, and not just His in our lives, when we turn face but also His nail-

wealth and luxuries, but even those can become "worthless" when we give into the temptation to let them usurp Jesus' priority our eyes, minds, and

pierced hands and feet, spear-riven side, and all that He did to save us from sin, rescue us from the just punishment for sin which is hell, and give us eternal life as a gift through faith in Him as Savior. We see Jesus also in a most special way in the Sacrament of Holy Sacrament, where He comes to us in His true body and blood given for the forgiveness of sins.

The psalmist prays in Psalm 119: "Turn my eyes from looking at worthless things; and give me life in your ways." "Worthless things" could be things that are inherently good but are worthless compared to the "surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:8).

We have been so blessed by God with material

hearts away from Jesus and turned them upon the gifts while neglecting the Giver of those gifts. This happens in the summer, when our vacations from work turn out to be vacations also from God and from worshiping God and hearing His Word. It also happens the rest of the year whenever we let God's Word grow strangely dim in our lives in light of the things of this world.

Let the psalmist's prayer be your prayer. Be turned to Jesus in His Word and the Sacrament, so that as you enjoy the blessings God has given you, your eyes, mind, and heart are ever on Jesus who gave you, for your salvation, the most precious gift of all: Himself. &

and removing whiteboards from the parish hall and returning them to the education building. This busy night concluded with a devotional about being a servant leader like Christ and then a game.




Thank you for all the youth, adult leaders, and Al Bruekner who spent the evening doing service around church. It has made it a better place. May God bless those who gave a hand to help.

Chicken Chili Lasagna By Cheryl Syrovatka

Ingredients:

2 pkgs (3oz each) cream cheese, sof-

tened

1 medium onion, chopped

8 green onions, chopped

2 cups (8 oz) shredded Mexican-

cheese blend, divided

2 garlic cloves, minced

3/4 teaspoon ground cumin, divided

1/2 teaspoon minced fresh cilantro or In a mixing bowl, combine cream

parsley

3 cups cubed cooked chicken

1/4 cup butter or margarine

1/4 cup all-purpose flour

1-1/2 cups chicken broth

1 cup (4oz) shredded Monterey Jack

cheese

1 cup (8 oz) sour cream

1 can (4 oz) chopped green chilies, drained

1/8 teaspoon dried thyme

1/8 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon pepper

Directions:

12 flour tortillas (6 inches), halved In a mixing bowl, combine cream cheese, onions, 1-1/2 cups Mexicancheese blend, garlic, 1/4 teaspoon cumin and cilantro. Stir in chicken: set aside. In a saucepan, melt butter. Stir in flour until smooth: gradually add broth. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened.

Remove from the heat. Stir in Monterey Jack cheese, sour cream, chilies, thyme, salt, pepper and remaining cumin. Spread 1/2 cup of the cheese sauce in a greased 13-in. x 9in. x 2-in baking dish. Top with six tortilla halves, a third of the chicken mixture and a fourth of the cheese sauce. Repeat tortilla, chicken and cheese sauce layers twice. Top with remaining tortillas, cheese sauce and Mexican cheese. Cover and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Uncover; bake 10 minutes longer or until heated through. Let stand 5 minutes before cutting. YIELD:12 servings.
