"Convert or die!" Christians have faced this ultimatum since the beginning of Christianity. Countless chose death rather than reject Christ by converting to whatever forces of evil were forcing them to make such a choice. Others denied Christ in order to save their lives. Though some of these might have been Christians in name only and did not believe in Christ, no doubt many trusted Jesus as Savior but verbally renounced Christ out of fear for their lives. Of these latter, let's not judge them too harshly; who knows how we would respond to such a threat.

We in America do not have to convert or die, whether we trust Jesus as Savior or not, and it is not likely that such a choice will be forced upon us, and Lord willing, it never will. However, many of our brothers and sisters in Christ in Iraq, Syria, and other countries, along with people of other faiths, are being forced to convert to Islam or be murdered subjected to and/or horrific crimes. Almost daily, new atrocities against Christians and people of other non-Islam faiths are reported. "Infidels," as they're called, are being shot, beheaded, and even buried alive. Women

and girls are kidnapped and violated as part of a "sexual holy war," which, as one kidnapped young woman described, is worse than death; "Let those (American) jets come to bomb us and save us... by killing all of us," she said.

It used to be that only once in awhile did we hear of Christians being persecuted. To be sure, persecution of Christians has always taken place; we just know it until the stories came out in newspapers, magazine, or television, which often had more "important" news to report. Now with such the Internet and nonstop cable news, there's no excuse for not knowing. Question is, what will we, as Christians, do?

Above all — and if nothing else — pray!

Pray for our President that he be given sound counsel by his military and civilian advisers so that he can make informed decisions. Pray that he, our leaders in this country, and the leaders of nations will do what is right and necessary to deliver and protect not just Christians but all who face atrocities that we can hardly even imagine.

PARKING LOT UPDATE AUGUST 27, 2014

There will be a special Voters Meeting September 14, 2014 for presenting information on the status of the parking lot project. The committee will be proposing two possible alignments as well as giving reports on one contractor's proposal and a second contractor's preliminary estimate for budgeting purposes. There will be an information and display area set up in the Parish Hall prior to the meeting. Please take the opportunity to study the display and ask questions.

We believe that the City of Concord and PG&E are close to an agreement on tree removal and that we should be at the top of the list to have trees removed that are located in the PG&E right of way.

We are anticipating there will be a member "work party" to remove the cubs and car stops.

Once the Voters' approve a course of action the committee will develop a "Scope of Work".

Because we are nearing the rainy season, it is possible the project may not be completed this year.

Mac's Old House Friday Sept 12th 2014

Our first outing for September is lunch at Mac's Old House located at 3100 18th St Antioch Ca. This is the second time we are going there all though I go there at least 3 or 4 times a month...the food is soooo good, the portions are Huge and the prices are even better. If you have never been there you are in for a treat. This is really an old house that was turned into a restaurant. Bar Drinks are \$2.50 for a single \$3.00 for a double and \$3.50 for a triple (and they say its really big). Lunch menus are on the place mats and run from Prime Rib for \$10.95, Calamari Steak (three large pieces) \$9.95, and my favorite is their Ground Round priced at \$6.95. Lunches are served with a big bowl of Minestrone soup, or salad, pasta and a vegetable along with a basket of sourdough bread. I usually get the Ground Round and for a buck more have their potato salad along with the soup...almost more than I can eat. Cash only! In order to eat in the front room, we should be there when it opens at 11:30 We still may have to sit at separate tables. Gratuity is 20%. Meet at Church at 10:45 Leave at 11:00, I usually eat breakfast around 9:00 AM so I'm just going to skip it or have some little thing. Sign up in the social hall as we do need to have an idea how many are going....Bring a friend!

Fort Bragg -Skunk Train Sept. 23rd - 25th 2014

The Nifty Fifty Seniors are for the first time planning a trip that entails staying overnight for two day in Fort Bragg California. We plan on leaving on Tue the 23rd of Sept driving up 101 to Willits and then cutting over on HI way 20 to Fort Brag on the Ocean. Fort Bragg was a

lumbering town with a Company Store and area of small houses where workers for the lumber mill lived. I don't believe there is any lumbering going on now. It's mostly a fishing community where the fishing fleet enters the Noyo Harbor to load and unload their catches.

We are staying at Harbor Lites Inn on the edge of Fort Bragg that looks down on the Novo River and the fishing fleet. We have (at this time) reserved 5 room with two Oueen beds in each, 1 extra large family room with a sink, chairs where we will meet for cocktails and general gathering before dinner on the 23rd and 24th. All rooms area view of the Harbor and will accommodate two people. I talked with the manager and he said the price of\$103 plus tax was for one or two, so if you have someone that you would like to bring and share????? They have a continental breakfast which includes Oat Meal Waffles toast juice, hard boiled eggs, etc. You won't leave hungry. It is 181 miles from Walnut Creek and takes around 4 + hours to drive and I don't plan on rushing to get there as I want to enjoy the drive.

The first night we plan on eating at the wharf and the 2nd night at one of the nicer places in Fort Bragg. On Wed at 10:00 AM we will take the Skunk Train (which costs \$54.00 plus tax) from Ft Bragg along the Noyo River to Northspur Station. This is a 3.5 to 4 hour round – trip and travels along the Pudding Creek estuary out to the city limits then passes tunnel No 1 then the train emerges into the Noyo River Canyon. Traveling at the base of the canyon, you are constantly looking up to see the tops of redwoods.

There is an open car that you can stand in as it passes under the trees. Food and beverages are available in the concession car with more options available at the Northspur station. It's a great way to see the redwood forest and I understand the engineers provide an enlightening fun filled commentary explaining how things work etc. and why the engineer blows the whistle off and on..

We leave the motel on Thursday morning; I plan on going south along HWY 1 which passes the Heritage House (where Ruth and spent time on our 50th wedding anniversary) one of our favorite places to stay. The drive along the coast is especially beautiful but windy and difficult to drive; we pass through Mendocino and turn off at Albion on 128 which brings us through Boonville and Anderson valley where some of the best Winery's in California are located. We may even stop for a sample. We plan on eating on the way home at winery just north of Healdsburg. As I remember it, it is very elegant and you dine out in a covered area next to the vineyards. White table cloths etc...I plan on checking it out on my way to Fort Bragg. We can adjust our plans as we go...Don't miss this outing Bring a friend!!

<u>Ingathering: Lutheran World Relief Fabric Kits (assembly instructions below)</u>

2 spools of matching or neutral colored general purpose threads (250-300 yd each)

2 pieces of cotton or cotton-blend fabrics (no knits or 100%)

Fabric should have no stains or holes and be cut into pieces measuring:

2 1/4 yards of 60" wide fabric OR 3 yards of 44" wide fabric OR 4 yards of 36" wide fabric

Wrap all sewing notions inside fabric and tie with string or yarn.
