From the Editor:

He is "our refuge and strength,..."



If you've been on a cruise, you're familiar with the mandatory safety drill that teaches you how to put on your life vest properly and where you are to assemble with your life vest in case of emergency.

During the safety drill on a recent cruise, we were assured that should there be a need to abandon ship, trained crewmembers would be available to assist those who need help (e.g., those in wheel chairs) getting to the lifeboats.

As I attended this drill on Easter Sunday afternoon shortly before we sailed, I looked at the crew members stationed around the theater and wondered, "If the ship were to take on water, would they and the rest of the crew really risk and even sacrifice their lives to help/save passengers who cannot get to the lifeboats on their own?"

I had little doubt that many, if not most, of them would do everything they could — and some might even give up their lives — to save passengers. I also had little doubt that a few of them would abandon ship and passengers in order to save themselves, which was what the Captain and some crew members of the Costa Concordia, which ran aground and capsized in 2012, did; they abandoned ship and left passengers to fend for themselves, 32 of whom died. If we were crewmembers on a sinking ship, would we sacrifice ourselves to save people we don't even know? If we had been at the Boston marathon

bombing, would we have risked our-

selves to tend to the injured, knowing that other explosions might follow? Many first responders and runners risked their lives to help the injured. We pray that in such situations we would have the courage and resolve to help, even at risk to ourselves, but the only thing we can say with certainty is that we won't know for certain until we face such situations.

We thank God that Jesus willingly and willfully sacrificed Himself on the cross for us and for all people to save us, not from physical death, but from eternal, endless suffering and death — the certain fate of all sinners apart from faith in Jesus and His atoning death for salvation. Jesus died to save sinners! That was and is the Good News of Good Friday. The crucified Christ has been raised from the dead, and because He is risen and lives, we and all who trust in Him as Savior will also be raised from the dead and live with Him forever. That was and is the Good News of Easter.

And the Good News on top of this Good News is that this same Jesus, who died and has been raised for us, is with us. He is with us in good times and bad. He is with us always (Matthew 28:20) and will not abandon us (Deuteronomy 31:8). People often wonder during and after tragedies why God allows suffering. We know that all suffering is a result of sin, but we also know that God is God and

115:3; Matthew 19:26) and He is good (Psalm 136:1). So why does He allow suffering? He can avert natural disasters; why doesn't He do so more often? He could have stopped the bombers in Boston or the tornados in Oklahoma. Why didn't He? How are we to make sense of tragedies in view of the Almighty God who is Good?

Many answers will be offered. Some answers will comfort. Some answers might help us begin to make sense of tragedies and sufferings, to the extent that any sense can be made of tragedies at all. No answer can or will adequately plumb the wisdom of God.

What we know for certain is that whatever situation we find ourselves in, we are in the hands of the all-powerful, good, and gracious Savior who so loved us that He sacrificed himself to save us. It won't take away the pain or stop our tears. But God assures us that He, "the eternal God, is [our] dwelling place, and underneath are the everlasting arms" (Deuteronomy 33:27) and He is "our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble" (Psalm 46:10).
