

The Church's Relevancy: Proclaiming the Word of God



Some churches explore different ways to reach people with the Gospel of Christ crucified and risen for the salvation of the world without any compromise of Law and Gospel. They lift high the cross. They greet people who the Spirit brings through their church doors with the Word of God front and center. They avoid the "bait-and-switch" tactic that veils God's Word so that "seekers" are not "turned off" but will come for the activities, programs, and music (bait) until they deem the people ready for a healthy dose of the truth of the Scriptures (switch).

Many, if not most churches, however, in attempting to repackage or rebrand Christianity to make it relevant (read "tolerable" or "palatable") to the world compromise and sacrifice God's Word at the altar of relevancy. Sin is redefined so that it is no longer what God, in His Word, says it is but what we think it is, which often translates to defining sin based on contemporary cultural values

and societal

norms, whether these contradict God's Word or not. The Gospel of salvation by God's grace through faith in Jesus apart from works (Ephesians 2:8-9) is watered down and lost. The cross is stripped of its meaning in the context of Law and Gospel so that it is no longer a stumbling block or foolishness to the world (1Corinthians 1:23), and believers and unbelievers alike are 'misled' by what Paul calls "another gospel" in Galatians 1:6-9. The result? — Seeking to be "relevant," these churches become irrelevant with respect to God's Word.

One can find countless examples of how churches and pastors seeking to be relevant would rather offend God by teaching in His name but contrary to His Word than to be seen as "irrelevant" by unbelievers.


Rob Bell's recent endorsement of gay marriage is a prime example. Responding to a question while speaking at San Francisco's Grace Cathedral on March 17, 2013, the founder and former pastor of (megachurch) Mars Hill Bible Church in Grandville, Mich., Bell answered: "I am for marriage. I am for fidelity. I am for love, whether it's a man and woman, a woman and a woman, a man and a man. I think the ship has sailed and I think the church needs — I think this is the world we are living in and we need to affirm people wherever they are." To affirm people as they are, biblically,

is to affirm that without faith in the crucified and risen Christ, sinners will go to hell because there is salvation in no name other than the name of Jesus (Acts 4:11-12), who died on the cross to atone for the sins of the world, but that whoever believes in Jesus as Savior has eternal life (John 3:16). To "affirm" people in their sins as if God were okay with anything and everything is an affront to Jesus who died on the cross to save the world from sin.

To be sure, the church — Christians — should do what we can to make visitors, seekers, or however people categorize themselves, welcome in the name of Jesus but without compromising God's Word. We should see, treat, and love each person as a sinner for whom Christ died and whom God so loved that He gave His Son for them just as He did for us. And the relevant way to love them is to tell them what God did for them in Christ and why.

No doubt we can be more friendly, more welcoming, more loving toward each other as fellow believers and toward those who do not yet know Christ. If we are not relevant as God's people or church to unbelievers, and to each other, perhaps it's because we are not faithfully and without apology teaching, preaching, and sharing His Word of Law and Gospel and living by His grace through faith in Jesus, but the Word of God is in and of itself relevant.

What can be more relevant to our world and to us than Jesus Christ and His Word? What "gospel" can save sinners from eternal death other than the Good News that Jesus died and was raised from the dead for our salvation?

The church doesn't need to repackage Good Friday to be relevant; we need to lift high the cross. The church doesn't need to rebrand Easter to be relevant; we need to proclaim that the tomb is empty, that Jesus is risen and ascended, and that when He returns we too will be raised physically from the dead. The church doesn't need to redefine the Law or water down the Gospel to be relevant; we need to preach, teach, and live God's Word faithfully, unabashedly, and unapologetically by His grace, because God's Word doesn't need to be made relevant by us; it is relevant because it is God's Word and He will accomplish what He sends it to do. \$\Pi\$



Galindo House and Gardens April 11, 2013

We again plan on two outings for April: the first is to the Galindo House and Gardens locate at 1721 Amador Ave. Concord, 94520



on April 11 with lunch at the Spaghetti Factory located at 1955 Mt. Diablo Street, concord 94520. We have eaten there many times and have always been pleased with the portions and the food. Oakland Zoo ~ April 24, 2013



The zoo is located at 9777 Golf Links Road, Oakland...right off highway 580 and is home to more than 660 native and exotic animals. Visitors are encouraged to explore the zoo's many biomes (geographically defined areas) and learn about animals that live in particular regions.



The Network of Care

A representative from The Network of Care was the speaker at the March 11th meeting of the Women of Holy Cross. The Network of Care is a registered nonprofit that provides snack and meal bags for parents of hospitalized children. It was born in the midst of the founders' family tragedy –parents driving over an hour to a hospital

where their two daughters were being cared for after a tragic automobile accident that took one daughter

from them and left the other daughter in serious condition. Having hastily left home with only the clothes on their backs, and not wanting to leave the bedside of their surviving daughter, Janet and Jim Frazier were befriended by a kind nurse who shared her sandwich with them when Janet nearly fainted. The cafeteria was closed, and the Frazier's did not know when they had last eaten.

The Network of Care now supplies their purple gift bags to 53 hospitals, mostly in California. Children's Hospital Oakland receives 150 bags every two weeks. Nurses distribute the bags to families as needed. Through February 2013, 125,000 families have been the recipients of these gifts of love. The Network of Care hosts an annual crab feed as their

primary fundraiser, and many donations. Shopping for the supplies and stuffing/distributing bags is all done by volunteers. The Women of Holy Cross helped stuff over 150 bags at our meeting.
