Before Newsweek magazine ended its eighty years of print publication with its December 31, 2012 edition, it tried to discredit Christianity with one of its last gasps. The cover of its December 10, 2012 issue asked, "Who Was Jesus?" The feature article, "What Do We Really Know About Jesus?" addressed the question to attack the historical accuracy of the four Gospels.

The author, Bart D. Ehrman, a University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, professor who specializes in the history of the New Testament, argued that the Gospels are fiction:

However valuable these writings may be for theological reflection on the meaning and importance of Jesus... they are not the sorts of historical sources that we might hope for if we are seriously engaged in trying to reconstruct the events of history. For some Christian believers that... is a liberation... from having to base faith on the uncertainties provided by the imperfect historical record...

These Gospel sources... are not historically reliable descriptions of what really happened when Jesus was born... The accounts of Jesus' life in the New Testament have never been called "histories"; instead, they have always been known as... "proclamations of the

good news"... meant to declare religious truths, not historical facts.

For believers who think that truth must, necessarily, be based on history, that probably will not be good news at all. But for those with a broader vision, a more generous appreciation of literature, and a fuller sense of theological meaning, the story of the Christ-child and his appearance in the world can be founded not on what really did happen, but on what really does happen, in the lives of those who believe that stories such as these can convey a greater truth.

In Ehrman's and Newsweek's history of the New Testament and their understanding of the value of the Gospels, it doesn't matter whether the Biblical accounts are factual; what matters is how the "fictional" stories can speak and apply to the lives of people: it's not what's true that's important but what people find meaningful, and it's not faith in Jesus, the incarnate, crucified, risen, and ascended Son of God, but faith in our faith.

It's as if Newsweek saw fit to mock Jesus, Christianity, and Christians by denying the historicity of the New Testament even as the magazine was going out of print; this is akin to a person who curses Jesus with his dying breath. Dr. Albert Mohler ends his critique of Ehrman's essay and Newsweek with this devastating comment:

"So, in the waning days of <u>Newsweek</u> as a print magazine, the editors decided to take on the New Testament. Readers should note carefully that it is <u>Newsweek</u>, and not the New Testament, that is going out of print."

Dr. Mohler rightly points out that "Christianity stands or falls on the truth concerning Jesus, and thus it also stands or falls on the authority and truthfulness of the Bible. What you believe about historical truth defines what you believe about Jesus Christ. Without the revealed truths of the New Testament, there is no Christianity, just superstitions and fantasies about Jesus."

As we move into Lent and on to Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter, it's a good bet that we will see articles attacking the Biblical accounts of Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection to try to destroy the Scriptural foundation of our faith in Christ — a faith rooted in the Jesus of the Scriptures — and move people to an individualized faith rooted in personal spirituality and sensitivities.

The proper, salutary, and salvific response to the Gospel (the Good News) that Jesus Christ was born as one of us to live the life we cannot live, offer His life as the atoning sacrifice for the sins of the world, and raised from the dead in victory over sin, death, and Satan, is faith created by the Holy Spirit through that Gospel. The proper, salutary, and salvific response to the Gospel is trust that Jesus did what the Gospels say He did for our salvation as a gift of God's grace, so that every day and, when the time comes, with our dying breath we will confess Jesus as Savior. \$\frac{1}{2}\$



Recycled Card Program



The LWML has already contributed almost \$1.5 million during the 2011-2013 biennium toward the mission goal established at \$1.825 million.
