## The Season of Advent and the Battle of Gettysburg


One of my favorite movies growing up was the 1993 American war epic, Gettysburg. When my family and I visited that great historical site on a family vacation my one souvenir was a copy of this great historical film and I probably watch it at least once a year if not more. As far as war movies go there really are none like it. What makes this movie unique is that the National Park Service (for the first time ever) allowed the motion picture industry to recreate and film battle scenes directly on the Gettysburg Battlefield which added an authentic feel to the whole experience. As I pondered on this advent season, I was reminded of a scene from this movie which perfectly depicted what the season of advent was truly about.

On the morning of July 1, 1863, a small skirmish broke out on the outskirts of Gettysburg between dismounted union cavalry soldiers led by General Buford and Confederate soldiers led by General Heth. Buford and his men (around 2000 in total ) had the daunting task of holding off the advancing Confederate army (at that point there were 7,000 fighting with several divisions making their way towards Gettysburg). Buford knew the importance of maintaining the high ground and delaying the Confederate advance until the Army of the Potomac could arrive to relieve him and his men.

The fighting was fierce but Burbord's men held strong as he waited for General Reynolds and the Iron Brigade to arrive and reinforce him. As the battle

continued and the Union troops held off several confederate advancements it was apparent that they could not hold for much longer without reinforcements.

In the movie Gen. Burford is played by Sam Elliot, who stands in the tower of the Lutheran Seminary observing the battle below. Frequently he turns behind him and looks through binoculars at the horizon hoping to see Gen. Reynolds and the Iron Brigade marching towards him. You can see the anxiety and fear on his face as the battle continues without reinforcement yet he is always hopeful that he and his men will be delivered. In the meantime he will do all that he can to hold his position.

Finally one of his fellow officers looks out into the distance and see's four officers riding on horses carrying the flag of the Iron Brigade (the main theme of the movie starts playing at this point). The officer cries out with excitement, "Sir, it's General Renyolds!". Buford quickly turns around, grabs the binoculars, and watches as Reynolds rides up in the distance. Burford then puts down the binoculars, smiles, and wipes tears from his eyes. The wait is over, help has finally arrived.

When I watch this scene I cannot help but think of the struggles that Christians face in the world we anxiously await that day when Christ returns to deliver His people. We are in our own battle against sin, death, and the world, and it doesn't seem like we can hold out for much longer. The battle is fierce and the warfare is long yet we keep on fighting. Like General Buford, we must always keep watch for our Savior who promises that He will come again for us. We cannot lose hope as the battle rages on besides us.

The season of Advent is that time in the church year where we stand on top of the tower and watch patiently for



our Champion to ride forth to our aid. On that day we will experience a joy far greater than Gen. Buford did at Gettysburg. Until then we prepare ourselves (or rather Christ prepares us) with His Word and sacraments which strengthen us in the fight. Advent is not just a season where we look forward, it is a season where we look at what Christ has done in the past, what He is doing right now in the present, and what He will do when He comes again!

The author of Hebrews sums up what the reason of Advent is about perfectly when he writes, "O come, let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God.'

Let us shift our gaze towards Christ wherever he promises to be found. Let us look at all that He has done in the past for us which has been recorded by the patriarchs, kings and prophets, and the apostles. Let us look at what He does now for us as He comes to us through the preaching of His death and resurrection and the eating and drinking of His body and blood. And finally let us keep watch for that day when He will come in his full glory to deliver us and bring us with Him into His kingdom for all eternity.

Keep watch, dear brothers and sisters in Christ, for your champion will come to relieve you from this long and weary battle! In the meantime, look towards Him in the present to prepare yourselves for that day when He will come in full glory. He will not let you face the threats of this world alone! In fact, we know that He has overcome the world through His death and resurrection and for that very reason it will not overcome us. So let us fix our eyes on Jesus this Advent season!






