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150 Days in the Psalms

"Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever. Give thanks to the God of gods, for his steadfast love endures forever. Give thanks to the Lord of lords, for his steadfast love endures forever;" Psalm 136:1-3

Congratulations, dear friends, you have (almost) successfully made it to the new year! Soon 2020 will be over and we will be on to 2021. Out with the old and in with the new as they say. More importantly you have successfully made it through all 150 psalms, a feat that many people have not accomplished. Lutheran theologian and martyr Dietrich Bonhoeffer says that "Whenever the Psalter is abandoned, an incomparable treasure vanishes from the Christian church. With its recovery will come unsuspected power."

You have now found this incomparable treasure and I hope you will keep it in your heart and at your side at all times to use whenever the adversary rears his ugly head. Dietrich Bonhoeffer knew the power of these Psalms all too well, having been part of the Confessing Church which opposed the rise and reign of Nazism in Germany and eventually being sent to the Auschwitz concentration camp where he would later be killed by hanging. He and his unshakable faith are a testament to the power that the Psalms have in the life of Christian. Dietrich knew that these Psalms were given to him and to all Christians to pray as their own.

They are the Word of God and as such they have power through the Spirit to change the heart of the believer and comfort him when his life is at its worst. The psalms point us in our time of suffering to the suffering that our dear Savior endured on the cross for us. In this context we know for absolute certainty that God is merciful and loves us above all else because He sent His son to suffer for our sake. To quote Dietrich Bonhoeffer again, "With such a prayer we stand in the center of the New Testament, in the community of the cross of Jesus Christ."

Bonhoeffer wasn't the only Lutheran theologian who relied on the psalms for his comfort during the storms of life. Martin Luther absolutely loved the psalms, though you already know this after reading his commentary every single day for the last 150 days. When his father died in 1930, Luther fell into despair, writing to his friend Phillip Melactheon that the

death of his father Hans has "shaken me in the innermost parts of my being, so that seldom if ever have I despised death as much as I do now.". Another one of Luther's friends, Viet Dietrich, wrote that "After two days he had recovered although it was very hard. While reading the letter, he said to me, 'So my father is dead.' Then he promptly clutched his Psalter, went into his room, and wept so profusely that the next day his head hurt. "What more did Luther need then to turn to the psalms in his moment of pain? The psalms were a constant refuge for Luther during his life and they should be for us as well, for they point us to our dear and loving Savior.

I can't guarantee you that this coming new year will be a better year for us. I'm sure for a lot of people it will be but for others they may face unimaginable hardships and suffering. It is impossible for us to know what the future has in store for us. There are no constants in life except for our heavenly Father and what His Son did for us that first good Friday and the first easter morning. As Psalm 136 so rightfully tells us, "Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever."

Indeed, the world will eventually fade away, but God's love is steadfast, and it endures forever. The mountains may come crashing down, the seas may rise and cover the land, but none of that can take away from the love that God has for us in Christ Jesus. May we continually give thanks to the Lord by remaining in psalms daily. They are a great treasure and a sturdy weapon against the evil one. Use them! Pray them! Learn from them! God has given you a blueprint on how to pray; whether it be in joy or sadness, peace or anxiety, or in thanksgiving or in pain. The psalms were written for you to use in your daily lives as a constant reminder of the hope that we have in Jesus. I pray that you will find comfort and joy in them much like Bonhoeffer and Luther did in their lives. It has been a great pleasure to be able read through the psalms with you these past 150 days! I will leave you with a couple quotes from Martin Luther about the importance of the psalms in our daily lives as Christians.

"Every Christian who would abound in prayer and piety ought...to make the Psalter his manual... everything that a pious heart can desire to ask in prayer, it here finds Psalms and words to match, so aptly and sweetly, that no man...nor all the men in the world — shall be able to devise forms of words so good and devout...In my opinion, any man who will but make a trial in earnest of the Psalter...will very soon bid the other pious prayers adieu, and say, "Ah, they have not the sap, the strength, the heart, the fire, that I find in the Psalter; they are too cold, too hard, for my taste!"

"The Psalter should be precious to us if only because it most clearly promises the death and resurrection of Christ, and describes his kingdom, and the nature and standing of all Christian people. It could well be entitled a "Little Bible" since everything contained in the entire Bible is beautifully and briefly comprehended and compacted into...a Manual. It seems to me as if the Holy Ghost had been please to

take on himself the trouble of putting together a short Bible...touching the whole of Christianity...in order that they who are unable to read the whole Bible may nevertheless find almost the whole sum comprehended in one little book...the Psalter is the very paragon of books."

May you all have a very blessed New Year and may God continue to shower you with His grace and blessings in Christ Jesus our Lord.



No, in all these things we are more than Conquerors through him who loved us. Romans 8:37






THE NATIVITY OF OUR LORD (CHRISTMAS DAY)
