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Who is the real St. Valentine?



There is a lot of mystery that surrounds Valentine's Day. Now I'm not talking about the Valentine's day that we all grew up celebrating where we had to give out cards and candy to all of our classmates. That celebration is pretty well understood. St. Valentine's Day was originally a church celebration remembering the Christian martyr St. Valentine, or rather, we remember two or three (depends on who you ask) different martyrs named St. Valentine. That's right, there were three Christian men who laid down their life for Christ and we as the church celebrate and remember them on February 14th; St. Valentine of Terni, St Valentine of Rome, and St. Valentine of Africa. There are actually around 30 different St Valentines that are commemorated throughout the year but these three are associated with February 14th. Who are these men and what do they have to do with our modern secular version of St. Valentine's Day?

Right off the bat you may be thinking that it's a weird coincidence that there are three separate martyrs named Valentine. Back in the Ancient Roman Empire the name Valentine was fairly common, sort of like John or Matthew are common names today. It's not a huge shocker to have over 30 men named Valentine who are remembered by the church. Let's take a closer look at the lives of these three men who are associated with St. Valentine's Day.

St. Valentine of Terni was born in 226 A.D. and he was either a priest or a bishop who preached and comforted persecuted Christians in the Roman Empire. He was martyred in the outskirts of Rome under the Emperor Claudius II and is recorded in ancient martyr lists that were compiled in the 5th century to assure that their names and deeds lived on in the church.

St Valentine of Rome was also martyred in Rome under Emperor Claudius II by beheading. It is recorded, "At Rome, on the Flaminian Way, in the time of Emperor Claudius, the birthday of St Valentine, priest and

martyr, who after having cured and instructed many persons, was beaten with clubs and beheaded." Like St. Valentine of Terni, he helped encourage his fellow Christians who were being persecuted.

Sadly, little is known about St. Valentine of Africa. He most likely was the earliest of the three Valentines but not much is known after that. All we know is that he was martyred for His faith in Christ somewhere in Africa and we will meet him and all the Martyrs one day in Paradise.

You may be wondering what do these three people have to do with our modern celebration of St. Valentine's day. Well, the answer is in reality not much. Pope Gelasius I officially made February 14th the feast day of St Valentine throughout the church in the 5th century but in reality, it has little to do with our modern celebration. You may hear of several church traditions which state that St. Valentine secretly married Christians couples which was forbidden by the Roman Empire or you may hear of the legend of St. Valentine sending a note to a woman who was in jail and signing it with "Your Valentine". These are fun little stories that helped shape the current celebration of St Valentine's but sadly these stories are most likely works of fiction which were written in the middle ages or later. The earliest writings we have which speaks of the stories other than the martyrdom of St. Valentine comes from the 13th century. While you can argue that our modern-day celebrations are based on these fictional stories of St. Valentine, the day really has little to do with the real men who died for the faith. In fact, the Roman Catholic church has a hard time keeping track of which story goes with which Valentine.

While the fictional stories associated with St. Valentines are nice and fun and they help us get into that St. Valentine's Day mood, I think the true stories of these men are even greater and show us a greater example of love. These men were shining examples of the Christian faith and should serve as encouragement for all of us. They selflessly served the church and her members even in the face of death. But most importantly we remember that God loved all three of these men and sent His Son Jesus to die for them on the cross. They were redeemed by the blood of Christ, victory over the grave was given to them at Jesus resurrection, and all this was sealed for them in the waters of Holy Baptism. They were willing to lay down their lives because Christ first laid down his so that even in death, they may truly live. Their faith laid hold of and clung tightly to the cross of Christ where the greatest act of love was shown to the world. Christ says in the Gospel of John, "Greater love has no one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends."


St. Valentine's Day was originally for the purpose of remembering the deaths of God's saints (these three men and really all the faithful) but more importantly it is about remembering all that Christ has done for His faithful; the very reason why they laid down their life. They never wavered even in the face of great storms. As the winds blew relentlessly, they held on even tighter to doctrine of Christ for the salvation of their souls, their examples of love for God and love for neighbor in spite of their own sinfulness in this sin-stained world.

Don't get me wrong, you can still celebrate St. Valentine's Day with the rest of our country. It is good and right to show our significant other unconditional love and this day helps us pause our busy lives and remember those whom God has placed in our lives and husband or wife. Just don't forget the original meaning of this day which has been forgotten by many. This is also a day to remember the love that God has for us through Christ Jesus! Out of love, Christ gave everything for us so that we might have everything, including His forgiveness of sins and eternal life with Him. The martyrdom of St. Valentine of Terni, St Valentine of Rome, and St. Valentine of Africa should help us remember that fact! Christ gave everything for them, and he has given everything for us so that we may live with him for all eternity when we go through the portal of death!

John 11:24-27, "Martha said to him, 'I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day.'
Jesus said to her, 'I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he
live, and everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die. Do you believe this?' She said to him,
'Yes, Lord; I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, who is coming into the world."'



Giving to Holy Cross with Your Bank's Online Bill Pay Feature is an Easy Process!



A quick and easy way to give electronically, with no worries about writing out a check, having an envelope, or even a stamp is to give electronically by using the "BillPay" feature on your bank's website. This service is usually provided free of charge to you as the customer. Each bank's website is a little different, but the typical process is the same.

- *Log onto your bank's website and click the link for "BillPay."
- *Add the church as payee- Holy Cross Lutheran Church 1092 Alberta Way, Concord, CA 94521
- *Set up a recurring payment to be sent to the church on a scheduled basis (weekly, monthly, or a one time gift)
- *If you don't want a recurring payment, then leave the amount blank and simply send an offering anytime you want and for any amount.
- *If the bill pay feature at your bank allows for a "Memo or Note" regarding the check, enter in your Holy Cross envelope number.




