Abortion is a Scriptural Matter

Racial tension. Terrorism. NSA invasion of privacy. Erosion of Christians' religious freedom and rights. Growing disconnect between politicians/ bureaucrats and the average person. Burgeoning national debt and uncontrolled spending. Illegal immigration. Assault on and erosion of Scripture's teaching of marriage. Unemployment. And the list can go on and on. There are also the crises beyond our borders, e.g., escalating Middle East violence and its toll on the lives of countless millions, atrocities in parts of Africa, imminent nuclear Iran, to name a few.

There is no shortage of issues and crises we face as a nation and as individuals and there is no consensus as to which is most pressing; how one ranks these issues depends on one's personal situation.

At or near the top of our list, however, ought to be the life of the unborn. To be sure, abortion is a political issue, but only because it has been co-opted for political purposes. For

Christians, abortion is a Scriptural matter; for all people and especially for babies in the womb, it is a matter of life and death. We can quibble about the actual number, but abortion has claimed the lives of 55-60 million babies since the January 22, 1973 Supreme Court Roe vs. Wade decision. For all the arguments each side of the issue adduce to support their view, the starting point and anchor for where Christians stand on this or any moral issue is the Word of God, and Scripture speaks clearly on the preciousness and sanctity of human life and that what is in the woman's womb is human life; Scripture also speaks clearly against the taking of human life (with few exceptions, e.g., capital punishment, selfdefense). (Genesis 1:27; Exodus 20:13; 23:7; Job 31:15; Psalm 22:9-10; 51:5: 127:3-5: 139:13-16: Isaiah 44:2; 49:5; Jeremiah 1:5; Luke 1:44) Let's be clear: Christ atoned for all sins on the cross, including the sin of abortion. All sins are forgiv-



able, except the sin of rejecting Jesus as Savior (which is to reject the only salvation from sin and eternal death that God offers as a gift of His grace because of Jesus' death for the sins of the world). Any woman who has had an abortion and anyone — man or woman who has been complicit in the taking of the life of that child can be and are forgiven through faith in Jesus.

However, let's not equate forgiveness with endorsement. God's forgiveness of our sins on account of Christ does not mean that He approves of our sins. That God forgives and remembers our sins no more (Jeremiah 31:34; cf. Hebrews 8:12, 10:17; Isaiah 43:25) on account of Christ does not make our sins acceptable to Him.

Since most of us have not been personally impacted by the issue of abortion, we're not likely to give it much attention, espe-

cially with all the other pressing national, international, and personal issues we face. However, for the sake of the babies in the womb as well as for mothers who have had or are considering abortion, we ought not to be silent or nonchalant. (Pro-life resources: www.lutheransforlife.org,

www.priestsforlife.org, www.liveaction.org)
To be silent on what Scriptures teaches
about the life in the womb is to leave the
unborn to fend for themselves. To be silent
on what Scriptures teaches about the sanctity of life, including the life of the unborn, is
to let people continue to sin without hearing
the truth of God's Word. And to be silent on
what Scripture teaches about God's forgiveness through Christ is to allow sinners to
carry their own guilt and face sin's conse-

On the sanctity of life and the abortion issue (and any issue), search the Scriptures (John 5:39), stand on and with the Word of God, and proclaim Christ and His Word of Law and Gospel.

quence without the forgiving, healing, and

restoring love of God for them in Christ.

This organization provides livestock and agricultural programs to people living in poverty in many countries worldwide.



After making contributions of their own, the Youth hosted a Bake Sale following the Worship Service on Sunday, December 15th to raise additional funds. The kids enjoyed making a variety of cookies, and other sweet treats.





These items (along with some Krispy Kreme donuts provided by Pastor Chu) were displayed in the Parish Hall, and members of the Congregation supported the cause by contributing to a free will offering. The donations towards the Bake Sale amounted to a total of \$300. We really enjoy worshipping at Holy Cross and meeting new people. In fact, we would love to get to know all of you better. Recently we met with Pastor Chu and told him of our idea of getting to know people on a one on one basis and then sharing our conversations in the Cross Currents,. Our column will be called *Getting to Know You, Getting to Know All About You*. Pastor gave us his counsel and blessing, and we set up our first conversation. We hope you will enjoy learning more about each other and find it a blessing. Our first conversation took place on Friday, January 17, 2014. Here are some of the highlights that we learned about this wonderful person:

- Born in Denver, Colorado
- Second of three daughters; Five years difference between her and oldest sister; 18 years difference between her and youngest sister.
- She has a vivid memory when she was 5 years old during WWII. She remembers how they would save a nickel

- so they could buy a Savings War Bond. Nothing could be wasted. They would save the tin foil wrapper from a stick of Nickel Gum. Sugar was rationed. There was a feeling that all Americans were united in the war effort. "We were poor, but I never knew how poor we were until I was invited to a birthday party at a friend's house. It was a ritzy neighborhood, but that was nothing compared to seeing the birthday girl ring a bell for the Maid to come and serve us."
- When she was 11 her Father was drafted, and he and his family were sent to Hahn AFB in Germany. While stationed at the American base, she met a young man who will one day be her future husband, but she didn't know it at the time.
- While living on the base in Germany, she and her family attended church services on the base. The Chaplain was Methodist. In Colorado, she and her family also attended

- She worked as an Accountant for a CPA firm for 19 years before retiring.

- Her passions are: serving the Lord in a number of capacities at Holy Cross, followed closely by her children, 7 grand-children, and 1 great grandchild (with another 1 on the way).

More Grants Funded Sharing God's Love

The Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) announces payments made to the following Mission Grants for the 2013-2015 biennium. Thanks be to God for the faithful prayers and mite giving of His children! Learn more about each grant at www.lwml.org.

Partial payment of \$8,000 for Lutheran Children's Books for Southeast Asia. This grant will allow the Lutheran Heritage Foundation to print and distribute approximately 9,000 copies of *Luther's Small Catechism* and 6,000 copies of *A Child's Garden of Bible Stories* into the languages of Southeast Asia. An additional \$64,000 is still needed to complete this grant.

Partial payment of \$25,000 for Rebuilding Nord Est Haiti Lutheran School. This grant will help to rebuild the Lutheran primary school in Haiti, and will meet current earthquake standards and serve the physical and spiritual needs of Haitian children. An additional \$75,000 is still needed to complete this grant.

Partial payment of \$20,000 for I CAN – Serving At-Risk Children With Learning Needs. This grant will help to bring the love of Christ to children who are at-risk and have special learning needs through Lutheran Special Education Ministries' after-school and summer programs. An additional \$79,000 is still to complete this grant.

Partial payment of \$5,000 for Support for Lutheran Public Radio. This grant will help allow the 2director of business operations to devote more time to development, so that the radio and internet show, "Issues, Etc.," can continue to proclaim the Gospel and provide a better understanding of contemporary social issues in a Christian context. An additional \$35,000 remains to be paid to complete this grant.

Partial payment of \$20,000 for Worship for Shut-ins. This grant will help to fund the production, marketing, and distribution of the weekly "Worship for Shut-ins" DVD program, produced by Lutheran Ministries Media. An additional \$60,000 remains to be paid to complete this grant. You may help fund the remaining mission grants of this biennium and meet our national goal of \$1.83 million. Each district also has their own mission grant goal. By God's grace, your mite offerings, along with the contributions of other LWML supporters, will help meet these mission goals. In addition to filling your Mite Box, you may also donate to the LWML through your local society. A portion of this donation is sent to national to support national mission grants.
