# At The Shelter



It was the first place winner out of thousands of entries in the magazine's "My Most Moving Holiday Tradition" contest in which readers were asked to share their favorite holiday tradition and the story behind it.

# "For the Man Who Hated Christmas" by Nancy W. Gavin

It's just a small, white envelope stuck among the branches of our Christmas tree. No name, no identification, no inscription. It has peeked through the branches of our tree for the past ten years or so.

It all began because my husband Mike hated Christmas--oh, not the true meaning of Christmas, but the commercial aspects of it--overspending... the frantic running around at the last minute to get a tie for Uncle Harry & the dusting powder for Grandma---the gifts given in desperation because you couldn't think of anything else.

Knowing he felt this way, I decided one year to bypass the usual shirts, sweaters, ties & so forth. I reached for something special just for Mike. The inspiration came in an unusual way.

Our son Kevin, who was 12 that year, was wrestling at the junior level at the school he attended; & shortly before Christmas, there was a non-league match against a team sponsored by an inner-city church. These youngsters, dressed in sneakers so ragged that shoestrings seemed to be the only thing holding them together, presented a sharp contrast to our boys in their spiffy blue & gold uniforms & sparkling new wrestling shoes. As the match began, I was alarmed to see that the other team was wrestling without headgear, a kind of light helmet designed to protect a wrestler's ears. It was a luxury the ragtag team obviously could not afford. Well, we ended up walloping them. We took every weight class. As each of their boys got up from the mat, he swaggered around in his tatters with false bravado, a kind of street pride that couldn't acknowledge defeat.

Mike, seated beside me, shook his head sadly, "I wish just one of them could have won," he said. "They have a lot of potential, but losing like this could take the heart right out of them." Mike loved kids - all kids - & he knew them, having coached little league football, baseball & lacrosse. That's when the idea for his present came to me.

That afternoon, I went to a local sporting goods store & bought an assortment of wrestling headgear & shoes & sent them anonymously to the inner-city church. On Christmas Eve, I placed the envelope on the tree, a note inside telling Mike what I had done & that this was his gift from me. His smile was the brightest thing about

Christmas that year & in succeeding years.

For each Christmas, I followed the tradition--one year sending a group of youngsters with handicaps to a hockey game, another year a check to a pair of elderly brothers whose home had burned to the ground the week before Christmas, & on & on. The envelope became the highlight of our Christmas. It was always the last thing opened on Christmas morning & our children, ignoring their new toys, would stand with wide-eyed anticipation as their dad lifted the envelope from the tree to reveal its contents

As the children grew, the toys gave way to more practical presents, but the envelope never lost its allure. The story doesn't end there. You see, we lost Mike last year due to dreaded cancer. When Christmas rolled around, I was still so wrapped in grief that I barely got the tree up. But Christmas Eve found me placing an envelope on the tree, & in the morning, it was joined by three more.

Each of our children, unbeknownst to the others, had placed an envelope on the tree for their dad. The tradition has grown & someday will expand even further with our grandchildren standing to take down the envelope.

Mike's spirit, like the Christmas spirit will always be with us.

What made this story even more special is that it inspired a family in Atlanta, Georgia to start The White Envelope Project & Giving101, a nonprofit organization dedicated to educating youth about the importance of giving.

Part of the reason Jesus was so feared by the leaders of the church was the fact that they were unable to disprove these miracles. Jesus said while I am here in this world, I am the light of the world. Then he gave sight back to a man that had been blind from birth. When he raised Lazarus from the tomb after he had been dead for four days. No one has ever disproven this. These and many more events are actual fact. On a lighter side Grace read a Christmas letter that Wilma Burch had given her and then I read a true story of how Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer was created. Starting with a down and out man with a little girl that he had nothing to give her for Christmas except a book of a character he had created. Rudolph a Reindeer with a Shiny Red Nose. He worked for Montgomery Wards and they used the little storybook he had created to give to children visiting Santa Claus at their many stores. Ward gave all the rights back to Bob May and music was created and he became as wealthy man because like Rudolph he was a misfit outcast which goes to show you it's not so bad to be a misfit. I had put the words to the song in the back of the song book so we all sang Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer. What fun. 




