Downward Trend of Christianity

The recent "Religious Landscape the Study" by the Pew Research Center based on polling data from 35,000 Americans in the summer of 2014 found that Americans have been moving away from Christianity since 2007, particularly from mainline Protestant denominations and the Catholic church: this trend is reflected in both total number and as a percentage of the U.S. population (the study counts Mormons as Christians). Concurrently, the "nones" (atheists, agnostics, or no particular religious affiliation) have upward. (http:// trended www.pewforum.org/2015/05/12/ americas-changing-religiouslandscape/)

Trends can come and go. For example, what's trendy today in clothing, hairstyle, social network sites, gadgets, health food, etc. might not be so a year from now; however, I suspect that the trend noted in the Pew study is not likely to reverse any time soon.

Caution is warranted when dealing with poll numbers. The size and demographics of the sample and the way questions are worded are worth noting. There's also the question of what to do with the results, e.g., how should they be interpreted and to what extent do we use them to guide what we do?

The downward trend revealed in the enslave ourselves to polls and trends; study confirms what many know anecotherwise, we might be tempted to addotally, that church membership and just constantly our worship, liturgy, attendance in this country have been on

he decline.



Our own congregation's worship attendance has decreased during the same period covered by the study. We can point to a number of factors to explain the trend but more important is, "What do we do about with this information and about the trend?"

Let me offer some thoughts and perspectives:

- 1. You are no less the body of Christ, no less the people of God, no less loved by Your Heavenly Father than when your numbers were significantly greater, nor are you any less worthy and in need of Word and Sacrament ministry than a larger congregation.
- 2. The Holy Spirit works in you through the means of grace without regard to numbers to feed, sustain, and strengthen your faith, empower you for your life of faithfulness as children of God and followers of Jesus and for the Gospel ministry He has entrusted to you to proclaim Christ incarnate, crucified, risen, ascended, and soon-to-come again for our life now and life in the resurrection to come.
- 3. We can and should use studies and polls such as the Pew Research Center's Religious Landscape Study to inform our ministry but we should not enslave ourselves to polls and trends; otherwise, we might be tempted to adjust constantly our worship, liturgy,

music, message, and even beliefs so that we can keep up with, and be "relevant" to, the spirit of the time (zeitgeist) — its ideas, beliefs, attitudes.

- 4. God works through His Word, and His Word of Law and Gospel transcends time, culture, and trends. His Word is active, powerful, and efficacious and will always accomplish His will and purpose.
- 5. The zeitgeist of our culture reflect the populace but it does not necessarily define us as individuals unless we let it, i.e., just because polls show a particular trend, that doesn't necessarily describes us or that we have to be that way. (Cf. Jesus' questions to his disciples in Matthew 16: "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" and "But who do you say that I am?"—Matthew 16:13,15)
- 6. What defines you as Christians is who you are in light of who Christ is, what He has done, and what and who He declares you to be by virtue of your baptism and faith in Him as Savior.
- 7. What defines truth for us as Christians is not the prevailing beliefs and attitudes of our culture or world but the Word of God that alone is normative for faith and life.
- 8. Within the contexts of the new that is Christ crucified and risen for the salvation of the world, not for the sake of numbers but for the purpose of building up and caring for each other as fellow believers and bringing the Savior in words and deeds to those who do not yet know and trust

9. Whatever the trend(s) of the day, let the Holy Spirit distinguish you as the body of Christ and as a son or daughter of God in what you believe, confess, and live by — namely, the Word of God — so that your witness as Christ's disciple and as His Church along with your fellow believers would be confident and unchanging in lifting high the cross and pointing people to Jesus in our constantly changing world with its constantly changing mores and norms. \$\P\$

Kevin Liebe





Nifty Fifty two activities in June

We again plan two activities for the month of June. The first is a trip on June 10 to the Presidio in San Francisco, the one that many of you have been talking about. Frankly I had no Idea how large and area the Presidio covers. Did you know that the Presidio was a military post for more than 200 years - first for Spain in 1776, than Mexico in 1822 and finally for the united States Army from 1846 to 1994. Today the Presidio is both a National Historic Landmark District and a new kind of national park site. Thousands of people visit every year to enjoy a vibrant mix of museums, restaurants, events, trails and recreational destinations.

We plan on meeting at Church at 8:15 AM and leaving at 8:30 which should allow us to miss some of the commute traffic. Our leader is our own retired lieutenant Colonel Bill Luker who visits there almost every week. We plan on meeting at the entrance to the Presidio just off Lombard St., then follow Bill to Fort Point National Historic Site just below the Golden Gate Bridge Fort Scott, Crissy Field then to Baker Beach inspiration Point Officers Club etc... When we first get there we have to decide if we want to travel in our cars or take the buses (free) that really don't stop for anytime at popular Destination. The Crissy Field Route serves the northern Presidio including the Main Post, Golden Gate Bridge Fort Scott and Letterman district. The Presidio Hills Route serves the Main Post, Inspiration Point, Baker Beach etc... They overlap in some cases and both originate at the Presidio Transit Center. Each bus continually circles which takes 30 minutes, so if you take the bus and get off you have to wait (site see) until it comes around again. We plan on eating at the Presidio Social Club then decide if we want to return

home or continue sightseeing. We can play it a little at a time...It takes about 1 to 1 1/2 hours to drive there. No there really isn't a way to use BART. Sign up in the Social Hall. Sounds really interesting Bring a Friend...and don't try going alone. We need to car pool as it is some distance Those riding should pay bridge tolls and chip in on the gas..Or pay for lunch....

Our second outing, on June 26, is to the New Mecca Mexican Restaurant located at 324 Railroad Ave Pittsburg CA at our usual time of 1:00PM. The Mecca Restaurant has been a favorite place for Mexican food since early in the 1960's. One of my favorite places for Mexican food was the Acapulco located in Alameda, in fact, Ed and Muriel Strieter always wanted to go to the Acapulco whenever we had an outing near Oakland. They closed after some 50 years and I've been looking for a comparable restaurant until our lunch outing at The New Mecca Restaurant last year which was recommended by Mike Liebe. I liked having a Chile Verde Burrito with just pork in the burrito which is what you get at Mecca's, not a lot of rice and beans. When you first sit down, they bring you a bowl of Bean Dip and a bowl of Salsa along with a big bowl of chips. It really sets the stage for a great meal.

The restaurant has a warm atmosphere and the food is great. I usually have the Marcela Special (\$9.75) which is a Beef Enchilada and a Pork Burrito along with refried beans with cheese and rice. I don't care that much for a lot of rice so I asked and received two helpings of refried beans. NFS Activities Recap



houses to the disposal plant. She assured me that with all the lines they have pumps moving the waste and that it wouldn't be a problem. She covered pretreatment of sewage, incineration of sludge, hazardous waste collection and a host of other interesting subjects. It's hard to believe that the plant handles the waste for 144 square miles consisting of 13 cities, towns and unincorporated areas or some 467,500 residents and thousands of businesses. I always wondered about where the water along the roadway at the turnoff to Martinez, came from. It seems it is the discharged of reclaimed water after all the solid waste has been removed by the Contra Costa Sanitary District (Wastewater Treatment Plant). After the presentation we went to Mimi's on Willow Pass Rd in Concord and as usual we had a delicious lunch...I had the Onion Soup which is excellent and loaded with cheese. —Mary Kreitz
