"Black Lives Matter" — That phrase might be eliciting strong reactions in many of you. Your response might be positive because you believe that black lives do matter -I dare say that no matter how many people you ask, there would be consensus or near consensus that black lives matter. Or your reaction to hearing/reading "Black Lives Matter" might be negative, not because you don't believe that black lives matter but because you believe that the movement has been built on lies. false narratives, baseless assumptions, and antipolice and racial politics.

Other "lives matter" phrases have been offered at least to stand alongside or at the same level as "Black Lives Matter": "Police Lives Matter," White Lives Matter, Asian Lives Matter, etc.; in fact, we can name any group of people in the phrase and most people would agree: those lives matter. Their lives certainly matter to God.

Black lives matter to God. So do police lives, white lives, and the lives of all people. All lives matter to God, and just their physical lives but also their spiritual

and eternal lives. That's why the Gospel. God so loved the world — all people — that He gave His only Son, that whoever believes in Him (Jesus Christ) should not perish but have everlasting life. (John 3:16) God desires all people to be saved from sin, death, and hell by coming to the knowledge of the truth of this Good News (1Timothy 2:4) — knowledge given in and through His Word (Romans 10:17).

There might be some, for example, those who commit what are by any reasonable standard heinous crimes, whose lives we don't think should matter to anyone, but even their eternal well-being matters to God and Christ died for them. As much as their lives offend us given the lives they've destroyed, each day God allows them to live is a gift of God's mercy: 9The Lord is not slow to fulfill his promise as some count slowness, but is patient toward you, not wishing that any should perish, but that all should reach repentance. (2Peter 3:9)

As we remember and celebrate the Reformation, we thank God for the Gospel and the reclamation of that Gospel from the false narratives, distortions, and heresies that had crept into the church by the time of Martin Luther, which robbed people of the certainty of salvation by God's grace through faith in Jesus — justification by faith, that is, God declares us "Not guilty" on account of Christ and His atoning death for the sins of the world.

The cross should remove any doubt that all lives matter to God: from those still in the womb to those on the doorsteps of death God, all lives matter to God. Because all lives matter to God, they matter to us too. And because all lives matter to God and to us, we use the material blessings God has given us to bless those in need, care for one another and all people in words and deeds as God gives us opportunities, and preach Law and Gospel and share the Good News of Jesus with those God puts in our lives.

For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son...



How Pat Easby & Joyce Liebe spent 1 weekend this summer (Joyce's perspective).

Pat & I attended the annual **LWML CNH** (CA, NV, & HI) **Retreat** the weekend of August 28-30. The theme was **A Strong Women of God**. It was at Silver Spurs Christian Retreat Center in Tuolumne. I agreed to drive as I have been the driver to other church events & we survived. It's about 120 miles one way, or about 2 ½ hours – unless you're driving early Friday afternoon, then plan on 4 hours.

It was worth all the traffic when we arrived – what a beautiful, peaceful setting. After checking in & putting our bags in our room (details later), we were just in time for an outdoor barbeque chicken dinner. Later we went to the chapel to listen to the key speaker, Cindy Steinbeck & to Sounds of Grace (from Benicia Lutheran). At 9pm we all met at the Amphitheatre for evening devotions & singing by the large campfire. The full moon looked down on us as we walked back to our rooms. Lynnette Campbell, CNH President, couldn't have ordered better weather for us!

After breakfast on Saturday we had 88 women attending 3 different workshops throughout the day. Marcia Houseworth & LaVada Terrell each led a workshop that discussed our prayer & devotional life.

Cindy Steinbeck also led a workshop. If you get a chance to hear her, please take it. Here's her condensed story:

"After 13 years in family life ministry, in 1997 I moved back home to help with the family's growing vineyard business. I serve as head of marketing, wine sales & public relations for our family business, Steinbeck Vineyards & Winery.

I travel throughout California & Alaska selling wine & telling our story, including guest speaking at Christian events around the country telling the story of <u>The Vine, Jesus Christ</u>. I've written a book, The Vine Speaks, which reflects my passion for the vineyards & The Vine.

Life IN Christ, The Vine, means growing. Growing isn't comfortable, but it is the way of the Vine. Christ calls us & Christ gives us courage & strength to follow His call. In Him we live & move & have our being. Christ works in us & Christ works through us. Our broken hearts & broken lives give the healing word & work of Christ rich soil from which to work. He brings comfort & healing for us, in us & through us. The Vine is always at work.

This was my first time meeting Cindy & I was left inspired, informed, & with much to ponder. I took many notes during her sessions, some which stand out:

We have beautiful hearts; Christ lives in our heart by faith.

God wants us to be beautiful, healed people.

Satan's greatest tool is isolation.

Am I a human <u>being</u> (who I am IN Christ) or a human <u>doing</u>? & what happens when I can't <u>do</u> anymore?

We all struggle, we have burdens: fear, guilt, anger, depression... that weigh us down. We need to understand that through God's roots we are strong/firmly held by Him.

We are rooted/grounded in Jesus. We are children of God, branches of the Vine.

We often think our value is in what we do, not who we are. God wants us to also rest in Him/have peace. Strength comes from who we are & where we abide.

Rest does not equal sleep. Instead of asking "how did you sleep?' ask "how did you rest?"

God is always at work in us – he gives us strength. It's not based on what we do.

After Sunday breakfast we cleaned our rooms & packed our bags. We then went to the chapel for Worship Service & Communion. Pastor Aaron Smith, St. Paul, Mt. View, led us in an uplifting & emotional service, complete with wonderful piano playing & singing.

Oakland Zoo Trip

It was a sparkling day as the Nifty Seniors made their way through the tunnel south on 13 till it ran into 580, then on to Golf Links Rd (98th Ave), and left up the hill to the Oakland Zoon nestled in the hills of the Knowland Park. We were met on the lower level by three docents with three golf carts. I could tell by their greetings that we were going to have an enjoyable time as they were very gracious and knowledgeable. I told them that we had several over 80 that would qualify for free entrance to the Zoo. The first thing they said was that the age to qualify was lowered to 75 and over, which meant that more than half our group qualified. As there was no charge for the carts or docents we really got a bargain. The tour was to last 50 Minutes and it lasted almost 90 minutes. We saw and visited all the animals of the zoo. Zebras, tigers and of course all of the monkeys and chimpanzees. The enclosure for the Elephants was being repaired so we missed them. Did you know that camels could go without food or water for days and that when they drink, they could drink like 23 gals of water and then when their stomach is checked, it is empty? All the water is spread throughout their body to be used as needed. Their hump is fat, again used as needed and that they have webbed feet that spread as they travel thorough the sand. Towards the end of our visit we went to the children's zoo which had a huge tortoise and several hands on experiences with animals, as well as the Fruit Bat exhibit which I found really interesting...
