 16 All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, 17 that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work. - 2Timothy 3:16-17

In his 2004 article, <u>The Scandal of Biblical Illiteracy: It's Our Problem</u>, ¹ Dr. Albert Mohler² asserted: "While America's evangelical Christians are rightly concerned about the secular worldview's rejection of biblical Christianity, we ought to give some urgent attention to a problem much closer to home-biblical illiteracy in the church. This scandalous problem is our own, and it's up to us to fix it." The article was recently posted again on Dr. Mohler's website; it's safe to say that the problem Dr. Mohler highlighted in 2004 has likely worsened.

Dr. Mohler cited findings from various surveys (including George Barna) as evidence. For example:

- * 81% of born-again Christians believe that "God helps those who help themselves" is a Bible verse
- * Over 12% believe that Joan of Arc was Noah's wife
- * Over 50% of graduating high school seniors thought that Sodom and Gomorrah were husband and wife
- * A large number of people thought that Billy Graham preached the Sermon on the Mount

"Secularized Americans should not be expected to be knowledgeable about the Bible," Dr. Mohler said. "As the nation's civic conversation is stripped of all biblical references and content, Americans increasingly live in a Scripture-free public space. Confusion and ignorance of the Bible's content should be assumed in post-Christian America."

Then Dr. Mohler pinpointed the problem for Christians: "The larger scandal is biblical ignorance among Christians... America's Christians know less and less about the Bible... Many who identify themselves as Christians are similarly confused about the Gospel itself. An individual who believes that "God helps those who help themselves" will find salvation by grace and justification by faith to be alien concepts..."

Dr. Mohler pointed to what he believed to be the root of the problem: "Christians who lack biblical knowledge are the products of churches that marginalize biblical knowledge... How many local-church youth programs actually produce substantial Bible knowledge in young people? Even the pulpit has been sidelined in many congregations. Preaching has taken a back seat to other concerns in corporate worship. The

centrality of biblical preaching to the formation of disciples is lost, and Christian ignorance leads to Christian indolence and worse."

Dr. Mohler offered the following solutions:

- * Parents must diligently study and follow the Word of God and teach their children the Word of God; parents "cannot franchise [this] responsibility to the congregation."
- * "Churches must recover the centrality and urgency of biblical teaching and preaching, and refuse to sideline the teaching ministry of the preacher. Pastors and churches too busy — or too distracted — to make Biblical knowledge a central aim of ministry will produce believers who simply do not know enough to be faithful disciples."

"We will not believe more than we know," Dr. Mohler said, "and we will not live higher than our beliefs. The many fronts of Christian compromise in this generation can be directly traced to biblical illiteracy in the pews and the absence of biblical preaching and teaching in our homes and churches."

Dr. Mohler concluded with the following thought: "This generation must get deadly serious about the problem of biblical illiteracy, or a frighteningly large number of Americans — Christians included — will go on thinking that Sodom and Gomorrah lived happily ever after."

How is your Bible literacy? Perhaps we won't be Bible scholars, but we can and should be well-versed at least in the core teachings of Holy Scripture, beginning with what has been called the doctrine upon which the church stands or falls, namely that "God justifies (declares 'not guilty') sinners by grace, through faith on account of Christ."

I have quoted at length from Dr. Mohler's article; however, I encourage you to read his article in its entirety and critique his assessment of the problem as well as his proposed solutions:

- * Do you agree that there is a problem with Biblical ignorance among Christians?
- * What do you think of his solutions for reversing course?
- * What other solutions do you suggest?
- * What can we at Holy Cross do to increase our Biblical literacy?


