Christ is Risen; we too shall be raised! Alleluia!

¹²Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead,

how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead?

¹³But if there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised.

¹⁴ And if Christ has not been raised,

then our preaching is in vain

and your faith is in vain.

¹⁵We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified about God that he raised Christ, whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised.

¹⁶For if the dead are not raised, not even Christ has been raised.

¹⁷And if Christ has not been raised,

your faith is futile

and you are still in your sins.

¹⁸Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished.

¹⁹If in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied.

Having already laid out his case for Christ's resurrection on the basis of eyewitness testimony (1Cor.15:3-8), Paul responded to the skepticism of some Corinthian Christians concerning the resurrection of the dead, whether, in general, the dead will be raised and, specifically, whether they themselves would be raised from the dead as promised by the Lord and preached by Paul. (1)

Paul approached their skepticism by working backwards, answering a not asked by the Corinthians but which is raised by any denial of resurrection through faith in Christ: "If there is no resurrection of the dead, what would that say about Jesus' resurrection?" Since the Lord promised resurrection (John 11:25-26) for us and our resurrection is the result of and guaranteed by His resurrection, then saying that we will not be raised from the dead is saying that Christ Himself has not been raised, (2) which would have dire consequences.

If Christ has not been raised, His death was for nothing, our preaching of Christ is useless, our faith is in vain, we are false witnesses because we continue to preach Christ's resurrection as truth and history, our dead in Christ are forever lost, as we will be, and we are of all people most to be pitied, because Christ's resurrection is the basis for our hope in our own resurrection; and if Christ has not been raised, then He is still dead and we are trusting, following, worshiping some dead guy.

Christ's resurrection is a settled issue because Christ has been raised, people's skepticism notwithstanding; so is the certainty of our own resurrection through faith in Jesus as Savior, into whose death and resurrection we have been baptized. (3) However, it is almost a certainty that there will be attempts to refute the resurrection of Jesus Christ around Easter; it happens almost every year. New Testament scholars will try to cast doubts on the resurrection; others will appeal to "lost gospels" to ask Christ in fact was raised from the dead.


Paul answers skeptics then and now and he assures us: ²⁰But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. ²¹For as by a man came death, by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead. ²²For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive!

Because Christ has been raised, our faith is not in vain and our proclamation of Christ crucified and risen is not useless but is the power of God to give spiritual, eternal, and resurrection life by creating faith to trust Jesus Christ as Savior and follow and worship Him as God and Lord.

(1Corinthians 15:20-23)
- (3) ³Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? ⁴We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life. ⁵For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. (Romans 6:3-5)





New Holy Cross Budget Includes Facility Reserves

It's a good thing we had an extra leap day in February because we have been busy at Holy Cross! In addition to the start of the Lenten season, bible studies, Women of Holy Cross sponsored events and other activities, we completed our Voter's Assembly meeting on February 7 with the important business of approving our 2016 operating budget.

Some highlights of the February 7 meeting include: - A recap of our 2015 operating results. We beat our budget projections thanks in large part to great managing of expenses by Allen B. and the Trustee team. - Overview and approval of the 2016 operating budget. As was the case for 2015, we have budgeted income conservatively while anticipating operating and maintenance expenses that project a negative cash flow of (-\$5,559). Mike L. discussed our reliance on members and volunteers to share time, talent and treasures in the stewardship of our church, both physical structures and our worship activities, evangelism, outreach and fellowship. He encouraged all of us to prayerfully consider the many blessings we have received as we contribute in many ways here at Holy Cross. Continued attention to our expenses and a very small increase in contributions will easily continue our mission and also result in another year of positive cash flow

- Two changes with the 2016 budget are establishing a new restricted fund account for facilities maintenance, with the first \$10,000 accrued earmarked for our anticipated preventive maintenance for the new parking lot; and a new "Summary Balance Sheet Comparison" to illustrate ongoing cash and assets, in addition to operations.
- One large facility project for this year is re-roofing of our Parish Hall using planned funds from our CEF

loan.

- We celebrated our long-anticipated and major achievement of a newly renovated parking lot! And again acknowledged the continuing efforts of Joe O. and the parking lot committee in wrapping up final touches on this milestone project, made possible by the contributions of many persons, and "parking lot fund"-raisers.
- We approved the addition of a gate that will keep vehicle traffic out of our main parking lot during hours when Holy Cross is not occupied. This step was taken to reduce nuisance activities such as dumping. Guidelines for the gate were discussed with the assurance that all persons associated with Holy Cross will be able to open the gate. And the gate will be open every Sunday, during our office hours, and anytime there are activities at Holy Cross.

All materials and reports from the Voter's Assembly meeting are available for those who were not able to attend.

And our Holy Cross Council meets each 3rd Monday evening at 6:30. You are invited and welcome to attend.

A final word from our sponsor – We are blessed with a beautiful church facility that requires both ongoing care and preventive maintenance as it continues to age. We rely on our Trustees and other volunteers to perform most of our facilities needs that do not require a licensed vendor, and they continue to allow us to operate cost effectively through their dedicated efforts. In particular, Allen B. has diligently served as Head Trustee for many years and it is time for us to lighten the load. Please share your ideas with Mike L. about how we can complete our Trustee work and let Allen be at least semi-retired. Mike Liebe
