^{3...}He who keeps you will not slumber. ⁴Behold, he who keeps Israel will neither slumber nor sleep.

Within Psalm 121 are these beautiful words of promise, that the God who watched over His people in the Old Testament and who watches over us does not fall asleep on the job. (The psalmist is using anthropomorphic language that is, ascribing human characteristics to God.)

Idiomatically, we refer to people who are inattentive or delinquent in their duties as "falling asleep on the job." People also can and do literally fall asleep on the job if overcome by fatigue of whatever source. Either way, falling asleep on the job — literally or figuratively — could result in tragic consequences.

A soldier who falls asleep at his post (or abandons his post) in time or war could be subject to the death penalty for obvious reason: he puts his fellow soldiers at risk. For example, Article 113 of the U.S. Uniformed Code of Military Justice states:

"Any sentinel or look-out who is found drunk or sleeping upon his post, or leaves it before he is regularly relieved, shall be punished, if the offense is committed in time of war, by death or such other punishment as a court-martial may direct, but if the offense is committed at any other time, by such punishment other than death as court-martial may direct." (www.ucmi.us/)

During the time of the psalmist, a watchman/sentinel who fell asleep on the job would have put the city at great risk; he would not have had the benefit of a court-martial; death would have been a foregone conclusion.

The One we — the people of God through faith in Jesus Christ — look to for help and trust to keep watch over us does not sleep, neither lightly nor deeply. He is the Almighty God who made heaven and earth; therefore we know that He has the power to help us. But will He help us? Will He guard us? Will He be vigilant in His watch over us? Psalm 121 answers with an unequivocal and unqualified "Yes!" —

11 lift up my eyes to the hills. From where does my help come?

²My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth.

³He will not let your foot be moved; he who keeps you will not slumber.

⁴Behold, he who keeps Israel will neither slumber nor sleep.


⁵The Lord is your keeper; the Lord is your shade on your right hand.

⁶The sun shall not strike you by day, nor the moon by night.

⁷The Lord will keep you from all evil; he will keep your life.

I encourage you to take time to read this psalm meditatively and devotionally; pray these promises back to God and boldly hold onto His Word!



We again plan on two outings for June!

The first is on Friday June 10th to Peter's Steak house located in Isleton CA. Isleton is an old town that was established during the gold rush period of 1849. Actually the town was at first just a part of the delta when the Chinese immigrants lured to CA for the gold stayed on to begin the hand task of dredging and constructing levees to hold back the water and when the water was pumped out there were islands formed one of which was what Isleton resident now call home. When you come off Highway 160 which followed the Sacramento River you go down into Isleton and are very much aware that you are going below the level of the river. I always have been fascinated by the Delta, especially after visiting Al the Wop's with Trina and Bill Godsey. Bill was as geologist and they lived in Rio Vista and he stated that the end of the Antioch Bridge was 20 feet below sea level and that the delta area had more natural gas than any area west of the Rocky Mountains. The town of Isleton consists of old building with metal siding as a precaution against fire much the same as in Lock. Peter's Steak House serves all lunches with a choice of green salad or steak fries, Fish and Chips, Prime Rib Steak of course, and a host of sandwiches. I'm looking forward to the drive through the delta and lunch at Peters Steak House. Lunch is planned at 1:00. Meet at church at 11:45 leave at 12:00. Sign up in the social hall so we know how many to plan on...Bring a friend.

The second outing for June is to the New Mecca Mexican Restaurant located at 324 Railroad Ave., Pittsburg CA on Friday June 24th at our usual time of 1:00. The Mecca Restaurant has been a favorite place for Mexican food since early in the 1960's and is a favorite for our president Mike Liebe as he was the one who suggested our going there to start with. Now it's where I go when I want good Mexican food at a reasonable price. I like having a Chile Verde Burrito with just pork in the burrito which is what you get at Mecca's, not a lot of rice and beans. When you first sit down they bring you a bowl of their famous bean dip and a bowl of salsa along with a big bowl of chips. It really sets the stage for a great meal. I usually have the Marcela Special (\$9.75) which is a Beef Enchilada and a Pork Burrito which comes with refried beans cheese and rice. I ask for a double refried beans as I don't care that much for rice with my Mexican meal. I do though like a beer which is \$3.50 for a total of \$13.75, so with tax and 20% tip it comes to about \$18.00. (I'm assuming we have more than 6 attending).
