The Lord's Supper is celebrated at this congregation in the confession and glad confidence that, as He says, our Lord gives into our mouths not only bread and wine but His very body and blood to

eat and to drink for the forgiveness of sins and to strengthen our union with Him and with one another. Our Lord invites to His table those who trust in His words, repent of all sin, and set aside any refusal to forgive and love as He forgives and loves us, that they may show forth His death until He comes.

Because those who eat and drink our Lord's body and blood unworthily do so to their great harm (1 Cor. 11:17-34), and because Holy Communion is a confession of the faith which is confessed at this altar, any who are not yet instructed, or who hold a confession differing from that of this congregation and The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, and yet desire to receive the Sacrament, are asked to speak with the Pastor prior to communing with us for the first time. We thank you for respecting our belief and practice regarding the Lord's Supper.







Then what becomes of our boasting? It is excluded. By what kind of law? By a law of works? No, but by the law of faith. For we hold that one is justified by faith apart from works of the law.





The Beginnings of the Reformation

Reformation Day is a minor festival and is usually celebrated the last Sunday in October. Reformation Day is being celebrated today, October 30. On this day we recall the work of God in preserving and reforming the church in times of trial and for giving the church teachers and preachers of the truth. The color of the paraments used for Reformation is red, the color of zeal and martyrdom.

Lutherans commemorate October 31, 1517, as the beginning of the Reformation. On that date the Augustinian monk Martin Luther posted his ninety-five theses about forgiveness of sins and the abuse of the sale of indulgences on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. The first thesis reads: "Our Lord and Master, Jesus Christ, in saying 'repent' intended that the whole life of His believers on earth should be a constant penance."

Luther, as a doctor of theology and a professor, explained the Bible to his students and taught them how to explain its teachings to others. In his preaching and teaching he warned his hearers against trusting in good works and self-righteousness. Luther proclaimed that, based on various writings in the Scriptures, people will live eternally because they are justified, that is declared righteous, by God through faith (Habakkuk 2:4).

In April of 1521 Luther was requested to appear before the Diet (Council) of the city of Worms, Germany, to stand trial for his opposition to the teachings of the Catholic Church. Luther stated that he could do nothing against Scripture because God's Word has more authority than the Pope or the councils of the Church. Luther's words caused the Holy Roman Empire to be forever divided, the Lutheran Church to be launched, and annual Reformation services celebrated.

The major theme of the Reformation is that justification is by faith alone, not by works. Even though man is, by nature, sinful and unclean, justification means that we are declared righteous (right with God), our sins are forgiven because of Christ's payment on the cross, and we are given eternal life solely because Jesus rose from the dead to sit at our Father's right hand. All these blessings are given to us by or through faith, faith wrought in our hearts by the Holy Spirit.

Explanation of Luther's Rose



"Grace and peace from the Lord. As you desire to know whether my painted seal, which you sent to me, has hit the mark, I shall answer most amiably and tell you my original thoughts and reason about why my seal is a symbol of my theology.

The first should be a black cross in a heart, which retains its natural color, so that

I myself would be reminded that faith in the Crucified saves us. For one who believes from the heart will be justified (Rom. 10:10).

Although it is indeed a black cross, which mortifies and which should also cause pain, it leaves the heart in its natural color. It does not corrupt nature, that is, it does not kill but keeps alive. "The just shall live by faith" (Rom. 1:17) but by faith in the crucified.

Such a heart should stand in the middle of a white rose, to show that faith gives joy, comfort, and peace. In other words, it places the believer into a white, joyous rose, for this faith does not give peace and joy like the world gives (John 14:27). That is why the rose should be white and not red, for white is the color of the spirits and the angels (cf. Matthew 28:3; John 20:12).

Such a rose should stand in a sky-blue field, symbolizing that such joy in spirit and faith is a beginning of the heavenly future joy, which begins already, but is grasped in hope, not yet revealed.

And around this field is a golden ring, symbolizing that such blessedness in Heaven lasts forever and has no end. Such blessedness is exquisite, beyond all joy and goods, just as gold is the most valuable, most precious and best metal.

This is my *compendium theoligae* [summary of theology]. I have wanted to show it to you in good friendship, hoping for your appreciation.

May Christ, our beloved Lord, be with your spirit until the life hereafter. Amen."


Martin Luther, Letter to Lazarus Spengler, July 8, 1530.

After his excommunication at the Diet of Worms, Martin Luther was kidnapped and hidden in the Wartburg Castle in Eisenach from May 1521-March 1522, in order to avoid his most certain death. It is here that he translated the New Testament into German. Founded in 1067, the Wartburg is one of Germany's most important castles.
