Prayer for the Ascension of Our Lord

Lord God, heavenly Father, we thank and praise You that You raised Your Son from the dead, seated Him at Your right hand, and placed all things under His feet that He might rule in majesty. You have crowned Him with glory as our King of kings and Lord of lords. Fulfill for us His promise that He would be with us always, even to the end of the world. Fill us with His Spirit to carry out His commission to make disciples of all nations as You have made us His disciples. Even as You have drawn Him to Yourself, so draw us to Him. As He returned to You to prepare a place for us, so take us to Yourself at His coming again. We come to You boldly in prayer, as He invited us to do when He ascended on high. Amen.



The Lord's Supper is celebrated at this congregation in the confession and glad confidence that, as He says, our Lord gives into our mouths not only bread and wine but His very body and blood to eat and to drink

for the forgiveness of sins and to strengthen our union with Him and with one another. Our Lord invites to His table those who trust in His words, repent of all sin, and set aside any refusal to forgive and love as He forgives and loves us, that they may show forth His death until He comes.

Because those who eat and drink our Lord's body and blood unworthily do so to their great harm (1 Cor. 11:17-34), and because Holy Communion is a confession of the faith which is confessed at this altar, any who are not yet instructed, or who hold a confession differing from that of this congregation and The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, and yet desire to receive the Sacrament, are asked to speak with the Pastor prior to communing with us for the first time. We thank you for respecting our belief and practice regarding the Lord's Supper.

First Reading: Acts 1:1-11

In the first book, O Theophilus, I have dealt with all that Jesus began to do and teach, until the day when he was taken up, after he had given commands through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. To them he presented himself alive after his

suffering by many proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God.

And while staying with them he ordered them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for the promise of the Father, which, he said, "you heard from me; for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now."

So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, will you at this time restore the kingdom to Israel?" He said to them, "It is not for you to know times or seasons that the Father has fixed by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." And when he had said these things, as they were looking on, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. And while they were gazing into heaven as he went, behold, two men stood by them in white robes, and said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking into heaven? This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."







The Importance of the Ascension of Jesus



From a scriptural point of view, Ascension Day is no less important than Christmas Day. Why should the return of Christ to glory be of less importance to us than His coming to us from glory?

"The third day [Jesus] rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven and sits at the right hand of God the Father Almighty" (the Apostles' Creed).

The benefits of the ascension of Jesus are among the most precious gifts of our

Savior to His Church. Indeed, if He had not returned to His Father after His resurrection, we would have <u>none</u> of these blessings.

"Christ Jesus is the one who died—more than that, who was raised—who is at the right hand of God, who indeed is interceding for us" (Romans 8:34). The perfect merits of Christ's sacrifice on the cross must be presented to the Father so that we can and should lay claim to what Jesus has done for us. Since we can be declared righteous before God only through Christ, His ceaseless intercession remains necessary because we are by nature sinners and cannot approach God on our own merits.

One of the most beautiful of Jesus' promises that He gave us was recorded by Matthew in his last chapter in verse 20, "And behold, I am with You always, to the end of the age." Two benefits accrue from this promise. The first is given to us in John 14:26 where Jesus says, "the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, he will teach you all things and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you." Christ's promise to send them the Helper is a comfort to His disciples (and to us) because the Holy Spirit, among other blessings, will guide us into a deeper understanding of God's Word.

Mistakenly, we sometimes think that Jesus' physical absence places us at a disadvantage. In fact, Jesus is present

with us through the witness of the Spirit, who works among us through God's Word and the Sacraments.

The second result of Jesus being with us as He promised in Matthew 28:20 is that when He ascended into heaven and disappeared from the sight of His disciples (Acts 1:9), He did not discard His human nature. Jesus still retains both His divine nature and His human nature. Christ, as our ascended Lord, is still bodily with us: His power and blessings now come to us in a special and miraculous way as His Real Presence in the Holy Supper.

Jesus at the Passover Meal with His disciples was telling them what would happen in the next days. He then stated, "no one comes to the Father except through Me" (John 14:6b). Our only access to God is though Jesus. He had entered "into heaven itself ... to appear in the presence of God on our behalf" (Hebrews 9:24). Christ did not enter heaven to sacrifice for us daily but to pray for us. Now we too can come before God in prayer, knowing that Jesus is there interceding for us.


In this same passage in John 14, Jesus tells His disciples that "I go to prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also" (John 14:3). Through His death, resurrection, and ascension, Christ went to prepare a place for us in heaven, where we will dwell with God forever. Because of Christ's work, we know that we can one day enter the eternal presence of the Father.

The return of Christ into heaven was not, after all, a sad event. In Luke 24, when Jesus departed from His disciples and was carried into heaven, they returned to Jerusalem with great joy. We too, can experience great joy as we ponder the events resulting from His ascension: Jesus is ever interceding for us with our Father; He sent the Holy Comforter "to teach us all things;" He is present in His Supper; we can approach our Father in prayer; and we can look forward to being in our "Father's house," where there "are many rooms."

In the sacrament of the Holy Supper, Jesus is bodily present in a way that He is nowhere else, hence it is His sacramental presence. In His sacramental presence our Lord Jesus, who is present everywhere as our Creator, now stoops to touch us in His wondrous Meal.
