GOD'S WILL IS DONE

We cannot fully see the joy that God has in store for us in Christ Jesus, because the devil still opposes and seeks to destroy the Christian. This from the Large Catechism on the Third Petition of the Lord's Prayer (III:65-67):

Therefore we who would be Christians must surely expect to have the devil with all his angels and the world as our enemies and must expect that they will inflict every possible misfortune and grief upon us. For where God's Word is preached, accepted, or believed, and bears fruit, there the holy and precious cross will also not be far behind. And let no one think that we will have peace; rather, we must sacrifice all we have on earth – possessions, honor, house and farm, spouse and children, body and life. Now, this grieves our flesh and the old creature, for it means that we must remain steadfast, suffer patiently whatever befalls us, and let go whatever is taken from us.

Therefore, there is just as much need here as in every other case to ask without ceasing: "Dear Father, your will be done and not the will of the devil or of our enemies, nor of those who would persecute and suppress your holy Word or prevent your kingdom from coming; and grant that we may bear patiently and overcome whatever we must suffer on its account, so that our poor flesh may not yield or fall away through weakness or sloth."

LOOKING FORWARD TO NEXT WEEK'S DIVINE SERVICE

Fifth Sunday of Easter

10 May 2020

This “mini-Bible study” is included for your use in personal devotions or with friends during the coming week as you prepare to hear God’s Word next Sunday. The questions provided after each of the Scripture texts are intended for your thought and reflection.

OLD TESTAMENT – **Isaiah 12:1-6**

1. Of what deeds of the Lord does Isaiah sing in verses 1-2? How does Christ fulfill these deeds of God’s salvation?
2. Here Isaiah teaches us how best to sing in the Church: we sing of the Lord’s deeds, not our own. How does our liturgy sing the Lord’s deeds of salvation? How do our hymns sing the Lord’s deeds?
3. What qualities of water are also good qualities of salvation? (For example, refreshing, abundant, etc.) How does God’s salvation in Christ provide abundant refreshment for you?
4. In verses 4-6, Isaiah sings of making known God’s deeds of salvation. How does this take place in our Sunday worship? How does it take place in your daily vocation (place in life)?

PSALMODY – **Psalms 66**

1. How does this Psalm express the deeds of the Lord’s salvation?
2. What comfort do you find in singing the Lord’s salvation? How can you bring other people in your life to sing the Lord’s saving deeds?

EPISTLE – **James 1:16-21**

1. Where does *every* good gift come from? How do you show that you do *not* believe this as you should? What is God’s most perfect gift to you? (See John 3:16-17 & Ephesians 2:1-10).
2. What does James exhort you to do as holy people recreated and enlivened in Christ? How do you fail at these things? How does Christ give you forgiveness and then strengthen you to live as James exhorts?

HOLY GOSPEL – **John 16:5-15**

1. As Jesus promises to leave His disciples, He also promises to send someone. Whom will He send? See also Acts 2:1-4.
2. According to Jesus, what is the Holy Spirit’s “job description”? (Hint: there are three parts to it.)
3. According to Jesus, how does the Holy Spirit work in His Church? See also 1 Corinthians 12:3; Titus 3:5-8; Acts 2:11; and Romans 10:17.
