Easter 6

ASK AND YOU WILL RECEIVE

The words of Jesus from our Gospel reading remind us that because we have been baptized into Christ, we may approach our heavenly Father with all boldness and confidence. From the Large Catechism on the Lord's Prayer (III:26-27):

But where there is to be true prayer, there must be utter earnestness. We must feel our need, the distress that drives and impels us to cry out. Then prayer will come spontaneously, as it should, and no one will need to be taught how to prepare for it or how to create the proper devotion. This need, however, that ought to concern us—ours and everyone else's—is something you will find richly enough in the Lord's Prayer. Therefore it may serve to remind us and impress upon our hearts that we not neglect to pray. For we are all lacking plenty of things: all that is missing is that we do not feel or see them. God therefore wants you to lament and express your needs and concerns, not because he is unaware of them, but in order that you may kindle your heart to stronger and greater desires and open and spread your apron wide to receive many things.

LOOKING FORWARD TO NEXT WEEK'S DIVINE SERVICE

The Ascension of Our Lord (Thursday)

21 May 2020

This "mini-Bible study" is included for your use in personal devotions or with friends during the coming week as you prepare to hear God's Word next Sunday. The questions provided after each of the Scripture texts are intended for your thought and reflection.

OLD TESTAMENT – **2 Kings 2:5-15**

1. What did the sons of the prophets ask Elisha?
2. What did Elijah do before he and Elisha could cross the Jordan? Of what great events of salvation does this remind us? See Exodus 14:21-22, 30-31 and Joshua 3:14-17.
3. For what did Elisha ask his mentor, Elijah? What was Elijah's response?
4. How was Elijah taken up to heaven? How does this prepare us for Christ's ascension?
5. How did the work of Elijah continue on in the prophet Elisha?

PSALMODY – **Psalm 47**

1. This Psalm is about the kingship of God. How does it apply to Christ as we celebrate His ascension? See also Ephesians 1:15-23 and Philippians 2:9-11.

EPISTLE – **Acts 1:1-11**

1. Verses 1-3 refer back to the whole Gospel according to St. Luke. What did St. Luke set out to do in his "former account"? See Luke 1:1-4.
2. When Jesus was with His gathered disciples, what did *promise* them? How would Jesus fulfill this promise? See Acts 2:1-11.
3. The disciples wanted to see an earthly kingdom. How do we try to *see* the same thing in our time? What is Jesus' response to them and to us (verses 7-8)?
4. How was Jesus taken up to heaven? What is important about the cloud? See Exodus 24:15-28; 40:34-38; 1 Kings 8:10-12; and Luke 9:28-36.
5. Why is it important that the cloud received (or hid) Jesus out of sight? See Matthew 28:18-20; Romans 10:17; 2 Corinthians 5:7; and Hebrews 11:1.

HOLY GOSPEL – **Mark 16:14-20**

1. What command does Jesus give to His Church? That is, what is His Church supposed to be doing now that He is ascended? See also Matthew 28:18-20; Luke 24:46-47; and John 20:21-23.
