CHRIST'S CHURCH

Jesus promised that His Church will remain and endure forever. She draws her life from her Lord and His life given in the Gospel and the Sacraments. This from the Augsburg Confession, Article VII:

[VII. Concerning the Church]

It is also taught that at all times there must be and remain one holy, Christian church. It is the assembly of all believers among whom the gospel is purely preached and the holy sacraments are administered according to the gospel.

For this is enough for the true unity of the Christian church that there the gospel is preached harmoniously according to a pure understanding and the sacraments are administered in conformity with the divine Word. It is not necessary for the true unity of the Christian church that uniform ceremonies, instituted by human beings, be observed everywhere. As Paul says in Ephesians 4[:4–5]: “There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism.”

LOOKING FORWARD TO NEXT WEEK'S DIVINE SERVICE

All Saints' Day

1 November 2020

This “mini-Bible study” is included for your use in personal devotions or with friends during the coming week as you prepare to hear God’s Word next Sunday. The questions provided after each of the Scripture texts are intended for your thought and reflection.

OLD TESTAMENT – Deuteronomy 33:1-3

1. As Moses gives his final blessing to the Israelites, he mentions Mt. Sinai. What is important about this place? Look up & read Exodus 19-20.
2. What does this blessing say about God?
3. What does this blessing teach us about saints? How, then, do you get to show that you are a saint?

PSALMODY – Psalm 16

1. According to the first two verses, what characterizes a saint?
2. According to the rest of the Psalm, how does God show His delight in His saints?
3. What comfort does the Psalm give you as a saint of God in Christ Jesus?

EPISTLE – Revelation 7:9-17

1. What kinds of people make up the “great multitude” of God’s saints?
2. Where are God’s saints located and what do they spend their time saying?
3. Out of what did the saints come? How are they made clean?
4. God dwells among His saints – both on earth and in heaven. How does He dwell among us here on earth? How does this comfort you? How does His presence for eternity give you hope in the face of trial?

HOLY GOSPEL – Matthew 5:1-12

1. How do these Beatitudes describe you? Can you pattern your life after them?
2. How do these Beatitudes describe your Lord Jesus Christ? How does He do, or fulfill, these things for you?
3. How does the fact that Jesus keeps these things (He is the poor, the merciful, the peacemaker, etc.) enable you to live as the poor, the mourners, the meek, the hungry and thirsty for rightness, the merciful, the pure in heart, and so on?
