"Come, Holy Ghost, God and Lord"

The Day of Pentecost serves as the proper conclusion to the Easter season. Easter Sunday itself is the "eighth day" of Holy Week. It's the day of new creation begun by the resurrection of our Lord

Jesus Christ. We then celebrate Easter for "a week of Sundays"—a whole seven weeks. The Day of Pentecost, then, comes as the "eighth Sunday" of the Easter season. On Pentecost Day, the Holy Spirit comes and inaugurates the "new creation" of the Church through the preaching of the Gospel.

The Hymn of the Day for the Day of Pentecost is "Come, Holy Ghost, God and Lord" (LSB 497). This hymn draws our attention and our praise to the works of the Holy Spirit.

Background

As he did with several hymns, Martin Luther began with an existing song or chant and then added more stanzas to sing the Gospel into people's hearts and minds. For "Come, Holy Ghost, God and Lord," Luther began with this antiphon for the Vigil of Pentecost:

Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful people, and kindle in them the fire of your love, you who through manifold tongues have gathered the peoples into the unity of the faith.¹

Luther was very fond of this verse, even saying: "The hymn 'Come, Holy Spirit Lord and God' was

composed by the Holy Ghost himself, both words and music."² In 1524, Luther improved the German version of the antiphon and added stanzas two and three. Lutherans have been joyously singing of the works of the Third Person of the Holy Trinity since that time.



So Many Ongoing Works

We commonly and rightly attribute the work of conversion to the Holy Spirit. When a person is made a Christian—both by hearing the Word of God and by being baptized—the Holy Spirit gets all the credit. As Luther said

in the Small Catechism on the Third Article: "the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith."

That is not the *only* work of the Holy Spirit, though. He accomplishes so much more in the Church and the world, as the stanzas to our hymn show.

Come, Holy Ghost, God and Lord, With all Your graces now outpoured

On each believer's mind and heart; Your fervent love to them impart. Lord, by the brightness of Your light In holy faith Your Church unite; From ev'ry land and ev'ry tongue This to Your praise, O Lord, our God, be sung: Alleluia, alleluia! (LSB 497:1)

The Third Person of the Trinity continues to bestow His gifts—"graces"—upon our minds and hearts. These gifts of forgiveness, life, and salvation come to every Christian by means of Baptism, the Word of God, and the Lord's Supper. As a fruits of these gifts, the Holy Spirit also imparts "fervent love" and grants unity in faith to all who believe in and confess Jesus Christ crucified and risen. Our Savior Jesus is the "light of the world" who shines the brightness of life and hope in the world darkened by sin and death.

Come, holy Light, guide divine,
Now cause the Word of life to shine.
Teach us to know our God aright
And call Him Father with delight.
From ev'ry error keep us free;
Let none but Christ our master be
That we in living faith abide,
In Him, our Lord, with all our might confide.
Alleluia, alleluia! (LSB 497:2)

The Holy Spirit is our greatest and best educator, our "guide divine." He teaches us to know both the Father and the Son, as well as the life we receive from them. By His work, we treasure both our created physical life and our new spiritual life of faith in Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. By guiding us in learning God's Word of truth, the Spirit keeps us from error by guiding us to Jesus Christ, "the way, and the truth, and the life" (John 14:6). The Holy Spirit keeps us and the whole Christian Church "with Jesus Christ in the one true faith" (Small Catechism, Third Article).

Come, holy Fire, comfort true, Grant us the will Your work to do And in Your service to abide; Let trials turn us not aside. Lord, by Your pow'r prepare each heart, And to our weakness strength impart That bravely here we may contend, Through life and death to You, our Lord, ascend. Alleluia, alleluia! (LSB 497:3)³

In stanza 3, we call the Spirit "holy Fire, comfort true." The "holy Fire" name reminds us of the tongues of fire at the first Pentecost (Acts 2:1-3). The Spirit is also our true comfort, both as He calms our fears and as He strengthens us in the Christian life. The rest of stanza 3 highlights that Christian life. We pray for the will to abide in His service all our days, to remain steadfast in time of trial, and to be strengthened in heart at all times. While we know and admit our weaknesses, we rely on the Spirit to give us strength and bravery in remaining faithful to our Lord Jesus.

To sum it up, the Holy Spirit first makes us Christians and then He keeps us Christians. He also leads and enables us to:

"Share life and hope in our Savior Jesus."

It is the Holy Spirit who has been leading us through our strategic planning here at Hope. As He blessed the saints of God on that first Pentecost Day, so has He blessed us these past months. He has poured out His "graces" (gifts) and caused the Word of life (Jesus) to shine so that we may confess the true Gospel for the life of the world. As we begin putting this plan into practice in our life together at Hope, let's also sing this hymn as our constant prayer.

"Alleluia. The Holy Spirit will teach you all things and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you. Alleluia. Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of the faithful, and kindle in them the fire of your love. Alleluia." (Verse for Pentecost Eve: John 14:26; Liturgical Text)⁴

Follow Him in Generosity

Our Savior calls us to follow Him in generosity. "For I have given you an example, that you also should do just as I have done to you" (John 13:15). We cannot give our lives for the salvation of the world, of course. Praise God, that job's already done! But with hearts full of thanksgiving for what Jesus has given us, we can follow His example of generous giving. And Jesus' generosity is not merely an example. Our Lord also commands us to act according to our gifts: "The one who contributes, [let him give] in generosity" (Rom. 12:8).

So, when we bring offerings to the Lord, we should strive to heed His command and follow the pattern He has established for us. Jesus did not give us leftovers. He gave His best. We should not give leftovers, either, but the first and best of what He has given us. Jesus did not give as an afterthought — He gave according to the plan of salvation God established from the foundation of the world. So, when it comes to our own offerings, we should make a thoughtful plan to give generously, in proportion to the way He has blessed us. Like the Macedonian Christians, who gave according to their ability, and even beyond their ability (2 Cor. 8:3), we should honor the Lord by giving a generous portion of the income that God provides us.

We should also give freely, just as Jesus gave freely for us. There is no compulsion involved in our works of love and our offerings to the Lord. We do not give grudgingly, but willingly and cheerfully, each "as he has decided in his heart," as the Lord says (2 Cor. 9:7). There is no New Testament ceremonial law involved here. Rather,

we are free to give as generously as our Savior has given for us!

In the same way, our Lord teaches us to give generously out of our love for Him and for our neighbor. Jesus shows us that genuine love is always love "in deed" (1 John 3:18). It is love that sees our neighbor in need and gives generously to help him. It is love that hears the Word of the Lord and does what it says. If we truly love, we give generously. If we give without love, our giving is not truly following Jesus.

Finally, we follow Jesus in generosity when we support His Gospel ministry and other works of mercy. The people of Israel gave generously to construct and support the operation of the tabernacle, for that was the place where the Lord received the Old Testament sacrifices, through which He bestowed the forgiveness of sins on His people. So, they gave abundantly, so abundantly they had to be told to stop giving! (Ex. 36:5–6). In the same way, we should bring generous offerings to support the Lord's work. We support our congregations in the preaching of His Word, Baptism and the Lord's Supper, which bestow His gifts of forgiveness, life and salvation, and we take care of those who are poor and needy.

Our Savior calls us to follow His example in generous giving. Let us then, with thankful hearts, rededicate ourselves to following Him in generosity.

BASEMENT RENOVATION UPDATE

The Basement Renovation Committee met with the architects and construction manager before Easter. The goal of that meeting was to review all feedback of the proposed designs, compare notes and bring clarity on a number of outstanding points. With this meeting we have entered a new phase of the project and have done so at the urging of congregational leadership.

An important step was to review and clarify the scope of the renovation project. We noted for the architects that both the Brannon Street door to the basement and the parking lot door would be included as we seek modernized doors that work with the security system. Additionally, we noted there will heating and cooling issues to address especially in the Sunday school room.

The main kitchen was a key area discussed with the architects. The committee has asked for a more detailed plan regarding the kitchen in line with the way the congregation uses that space, keeping functionality as a top priority. The next step will be to receive updated plans with greater detail about surfaces, fixtures, etc. and price estimates attached to those plans. We have stressed that the congregation will want choices and that we are making an investment for both the present and the future—we want materials that will last and which provide little effort to maintain and keep clean.

We've clarified with congregational leadership that any issues related to structure -

leaking walls - will be addressed outside the scope of the renovation project. Those issues are being actively addressed. This was a great concern for the committee, and we are very glad for the determination to fix the leaking walls once and for all.

As soon as we have updated drawings and dollar amounts attached to the plans we will share them with the congregation and seek feedback as we did in phase one. As always, please know that the committee desires to hear any concerns, feedback, ideas, etc.
