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BOOK OF CONCORD READING

Trinity 20

FOOD OF THE SOUL

Jesus meal of Body and Blood nourishes us in His forgiveness. From the *Large Catechism* (V:23-27):

Therefore, [the Lord's Supper] is appropriately called food of the soul, for it nourishes and strengthens the new creature. For in the first instance, we are born anew through baptism. However, our human flesh and blood, as I have said, have not lost their old skin. There are so many hindrances and attacks of the devil and the world that we often grow weary and faint and at times even stumble. Therefore the Lord's Supper is given as a daily food and sustenance so that our faith may be refreshed and strengthened and that it may not succumb in the struggle but become stronger and stronger. For the new life should be one that continually develops and progresses. But it has to suffer a great deal of opposition. The devil is a furious enemy; when he sees that we resist him and attack the old creature, and when he cannot rout us by force, he sneaks and sulks about at every turn, trying all kinds of tricks, and does not stop until he has finally worn us out so that we either renounce our faith or lose heart and become indifferent or impatient. For times like these, when our heart feels too sorely pressed, this comfort of the Lord's Supper is given to bring us new strength and refreshment.

Reformation Sunday

29 October 2023

This "mini-Bible study" is included for your use in personal devotions or with friends during the coming week as you prepare to hear God's Word next Sunday. The questions provided after each of the Scripture texts are intended for your thought and reflection.

OLD TESTAMENT - Jeremiah 31:31-34

- 1. What kind of covenant did God promise to make? What went wrong with the "old covenant"?
- 2. What things will characterize God's "new covenant"?
- 3. When and in whom does God fulfill this promised "new covenant"? See Luke 22:19-22

PSALMODY - Psalm 46

- 1. In the words of the Psalm, in what ways does God show Himself to be our "refuge and strength"?
- 2. The Psalm says that God is in the midst of His people. How is He in our midst in our day? How does He help us as He comes into our midst?
- 3. Look up hymn #656 (or #657) in *Lutheran Service Book*. How does this hymn echo the image of Psalm 46? According to the hymn, what is our battle? And how does God show Himself to be our "refuge and strength"?

EPISTLE - Romans 3:21-28

- 1. According to St. Paul, what is our spiritual problem—that is, for all people?
- 2. How are we justified (made right with God)? Where does our redemption come from? What price was paid? See 1 Peter 1:18-19.

HOLY GOSPEL - John 8:31-36

- 1. According to Jesus, how do we know "the truth"? What is the result of knowing "the truth"?
- 2. What truth does Jesus tell you about yourself when you sin? See Matthew 15:16-20.
- 3. How does Jesus say the same thing in our reading from John?
- 4. What truth does Jesus tell you about His work on your behalf? See Romans 5:1-11.
- 5. How does Jesus say this in our reading from John?
- 6. When Jesus says, "the Son makes you free," from what does He make you free? See Romans 6:1-11.
