Curse Reversed

A common objection to Christianity is the fact that the world is a mess. Genocide, child slavery, starvation, earthquakes, tsunamis, hurricanes, and terrorism—where did these evils come from? If God is so good and loving, how can he allow suffering and death?

The Bible answers the question this way:

In the beginning, God created a perfect world with no death or pain. He entrusted the care of the entire earth to Adam and Eve, the first humans, and gave them only one restriction: "of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall surely die."

Although they were warned of the consequences, Adam and Eve chose to rebel against God, which brought the curse of sin on the earth, introducing pain and death into God's originally perfect creation. Scripture tells us that "sin came into the world through one man, and death through sin, and death spread to all men because all sinned" (Romans 5:12). Now, the whole creation groans under the brokenness of sin (Romans 8:22).

But that's not the end of the story. God did not give up on His creation.

Already in Genesis (3:15), God promised to send a Deliverer, the "Seed of the woman," who would crush the head of the serpent (Satan). In the New Testament, we find out the identity of this Deliverer—he is Jesus, God's own Son, who gave his life to redeem us.

For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. (John 3:16)

Jesus died for the sins of the world. In Him, we have forgiveness and new life. On the third day, He rose from the grave in victory over death and hell – a victory He freely gives to those who trust in Him. In Christ, the curse has been reversed!

Therefore, God sends us out into this broken world to proclaim the Gospel message of repentance and faith in Jesus. And to live out that Gospel by our words and actions which bring the light of God's grace into the darkness of sin and suffering. By this Gospel, God is making all things new again (Revelation 21:5).

Isaac Watts said it this way in stanza 3 of *Joy to the World*:

No more let sins and sorrows grow, Nor thorns infest the ground; He comes to make his blessings flow Far as the curse is found.

So, we agree that the world is a mess. But we also know the curse of sin has been reversed through Jesus. Thanks be to God, who gives us the victory, through our Lord, Jesus Christ! (1 Corinthians 15:57)

Immanuel Lutheran Church **Church Council Meeting Minutes** July 10, 2025, 5:30 pm, Room 205

Call to Order: Chuck Peterson called the meeting to order at 5:30 pm.

Opening Prayer/Devotion: Pastor Wehling opened the meeting with a devotion from the Small Catechism about God's will.

The minutes from June 12, 2025, were distributed by Kristie Rock in advance via email and approved.

The Treasurer's Report - submitted by Roger Billings

- The monthly budget is on track.
- Pastor Radtke declined payment for his visiting Pastor services.
- Paper supply expenses have been allocated accurately to their proper funds in the report.
- The report reflects a memorial fund for Judy Weichman.
 She is not a member of the church, and she will decide on what to spend the \$1085.35 memorial.

Tammie moved to approve the treasurer's report. Pat seconded the motion. The motion passed.

- Concordia Plans provide health insurance, dental and vision premiums. There should be a drop in the price for 2026 as the self and spouse option will be used, instead of the family option.
- Hartford provides workers' compensation insurance.
 Estimated annual premiums should go down from \$2,375.52 for 2025 to \$1,803.00 for 2026.
- GuideOne Insurance provides insurance for the community auto, building insurance, and umbrella insurance.
 For 2026 the crime deductible will be raised to \$1,000, but premiums will not be raised. In 2026, GuideOne will exclude cyber incidents. Roger will check how much it would cost to cover cyber incidents.
- All insurance plans are automatically renewed.

Pastor's Report

- Average worship attendance is about the same.
- Pastor suggests that people leave a review of the church on Google, also to 'check in' on Facebook when attending church so that others will learn about Immanuel.

- The college outreach team will meet July 11 to discuss possibilities for training in outreach.
- The National Youth Gathering is July 19-23 in New Orleans. The prospective attendees will be commissioned during the July 12 worship service.
- There has been limited publicity for the youth coordinator position. Advertising in a different way will begin soon. The position requires a specific skills set.
- The next Fifth Sunday will be August 31, on Labor Day weekend. It was suggested that fellowship occur after the worship service.
- Pastor gave a big "thank you" to Dale and Kate Clemmons for organizing many fellowship activities this summer.

Property and Grounds Report – submitted by Tim Hetzler

 At the last meeting, \$6,000 to \$8,000 was approved to be spent on lower level door replacements, but the project may cost more than that.

Greg moved to increase the total amount approved for the lower-level door replacements up to \$10,000. Tammie seconded it. The motion passed.

- Ouotes for chemical washing of the church exterior were between \$2,800 and \$3,200. Property and Grounds recommended that it would not be worth the expense, but after discussion, Council decided to chemically wash the east side of the church to see how it would turn out, and how long it would last. After getting an actual cost, f it does not void the roof warranty, Council can vote on whether or not to chemically wash the east side.
- A sculptor made a presentation to property and grounds for installing his sculpture of a curtain of 800 spinning copper discs in the tower. After determining that the total cost would be \$20,000 to \$25,000, it was decided not to move forward with the sculpture. It was again suggested that the chimes be coated in a rubber-type material, and strung together so they do not swing around in the wind.
- Property and Grounds is considering stained glass windows in the south entrance. After discussion, Council did not think this would be a good idea as it would reduce light.
- Ocuncil discussed ideas for how the narthex could be renovated to be more welcoming and appealing by installing new furniture, carpet, a welcome desk, a coffee bar, and a cross, for example. The mailboxes could be moved to the coat rack area. A suggestion was made to utilize part of the music room for more area in the narthex. An organized capital campaign would be required to let the congregation decide how the church should look.

Emily had to leave the meeting.

Old Business

- Financial review committee Jason McCandless, Joel Thaemert, Greg Rahe: will schedule a meeting soon.
- Activity Center request for use The Council voted unanimously by email to not allow Anthony to use the facility
 (continued on page 3)

- for his business, for multiple reasons, such as being a non-church member with a key, and security issues.
- Mark Crabtree is updating the speaker system in the Activity Center utilizing approximately \$3,000 in funds from Easter lilies and Thrivent choice dollars. Installation will begin in late July.
- A district convention report by Laura Carson should be in an upcoming monthly newsletter.

New Business

- The office copier lease is going to expire. Since the copier works well, we would like to determine the buy-out cost.
- Committees for the 2026 60th anniversary of the building and the 2027 100th anniversary of Immanuel congregation will need to be formed. We will wait till next year to start planning for the 100th anniversary. There will be a notice in the bulletin regarding committees.
- The next Council meeting will be held on August 14 at 5:30 pm.

Closing Prayer Pastor Wehling closed with the Lord's Prayer.

Tammie moved to adjourn, and Roger seconded. The meeting adjourned at 6:55 pm.


