Pastor's Page...

What are the two kingdoms?

I was recently at the district convention where representatives from all churches in Central Illinois meet so we can move forward in agreement with our fellow believers. One of the results from this time is that all pastors were encouraged to teach about the Lutheran concept that we call the Two Kingdoms. Have I even mentioned that at Immanuel yet?

The concept of the two kingdoms is equally simple and complicated. The simple part is that we remember the prayer Jesus Christ made for His believers in John 17. We are to be in this world, but not a part of this world. In other words, we interact with those around us whether they are believers or not, yet we always act as God calls us to act: as obedient believers in Jesus Christ. This first part of our life is called the left-handed kingdom.

The other simple part is that there is also an aspect of our life that is just between us (the church) and our God. This is the life that we anticipate living for eternity and there are glimpses of it here, right now! When we pray, when we are in worship, when we forgive others (and many other times as well), we witness those glorious glimpses! This second part of our life is called the right-handed kingdom.

Now for the complicated part. We live in both kingdoms at the same time. Living in the right-handed kingdom is not a break from the left-handed kingdom. Living in the left-handed kingdom does not separate us from the right-handed kingdom.

I absolutely know that this will seem complicated to a majority of you. Yet, it's the truth of how we live. It's also what The Father and Son tell us to expect and what the holy Spirit prepares and strengthens us for. The best part of all, comes when you understand what it means to live in both kingdoms at the same and what God calls us to do with this reality. You might catch yourself saying, "Wow! I understand life now!"

I'll keep this article short. There is already a lot to process and hopefully you'll be looking forward to more teaching on the Two Kingdoms!

The one thing you can count on for certain is that I, as a disciple of Christ like you, and I as a pastor for you, love you no matter what. There is no kingdom where I'm not called to love you. In John, we hear that all disciples are to be known because of their love for each other (this most frequently takes place in the left-handed kingdom). Then in His commission for us to act in His name (which means it takes place in the right-handed kingdom), I speak His very own love to you!



Go and Bear Fruit

Fruit trees are one of the many wonders of God's creation. To see the beauty of the tree and its fruit, to enjoy its taste, and to realize that it all came from a tiny seed is beyond our comprehension. An apple seed is planted in the ground, and, with water and sun as nourishment, miraculously a seedling surfaces that develops into a fruit tree. After a period of time, the apple tree fulfills its mission by bearing apples.

We, as Christians, are like that apple tree. We, too, have been fed and nourished by God so we can bear fruit. "You did not choose Me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit and that your fruit should abide..." (John 15:16). Jesus tells us "I am the Vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in Me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from Me you can do nothing" (John 15:5). The life and power of any plant is found in its vine. The vine uses the branches to produce its fruit. The branch is simply a growth of the vine, produced by it and appointed to bear fruit. The branch exists only because the vine makes it possible.

Fruit characterizes the life of the Christian steward. When we stay connected to Jesus, we are told that we "will bear much fruit." Christ has given us the task of ministering to the needs of others and spreading the Gospel. As we stay connected to Him through His Word and Sacraments, we discover God's perfect will for us, and we are empowered to please Him by bearing fruit (Colossians 1:9-10). God has created us to bear fruit (Ephesians 2:10), but only through Christ is it possible for us to do so.

"If we live by the Spirit," Paul exhorted, "let us also keep in step with the Spirit. Let us not become conceited, provoking one another, envying one another" (Galatians 5:25-26). As children of God, we have this fruit because His Spirit lives in us, not as a result of our own efforts. We do cease to bear fruit when we give in to our sinful natures, becoming, in Paul's words, "Conceited, provoking one another." We are to "Have nothing to do with the fruitless deeds of darkness" (Ephesians 5:11a), but are to "Walk as children of light (for the fruit of light is found in all that is good and right and true), and try to discern what is pleasing to the Lord" (Ephesians 5:8b-10).

Go and bear fruit!

Antidote for Ingratitude

What happens to the desire of a person to continue giving when there is no response from the recipients? The grandmother who sends a check every birthday and every Christmas and never receives a phone call or a thank you note starts rethinking her habit of giving. The donor who never receives a letter of appreciation from the charity he faithfully supports starts researching other charities that might be more worthy of his financial gifts.

God isn't like this. He continues to give to us even though we are ungrateful and even unheeding of His goodness to us. The sun shines, ripening the fruit on the vine; the rains fall, watering the earth; your Godgiven abilities enable you to perform the job you've chosen so that you can provide for your daily needs. Yes, God is faithful, even when we are not.

Certainly, as God's stewards, we know we bring grief to the heart of God by our ingratitude. The best antidote for ingratitude is to give. Giving gets our minds off ourselves and focuses our thoughts on our Creator and Provider. Giving brings home the realization of just how bountifully God has blessed us that we are able to give generously. Giving sacrificially reminds us of all that Jesus sacrificed in order to make us His own. Giving brings joy like the joy Jesus had when He endured the Cross for the joy of what that work would accomplish for those He loves.

The cure for ingratitude is to give. In our giving, we are merely returning to God a portion of what He has already given us. Let that act of giving, then, become a habit of giving. You will find your ingratitude turning to joy in giving and deep appreciation for your Savior.

The task of replacing this insulation will require ingenuity and creativity. In short, the total price will end up being much greater than relatively minor costs for materials.

Parking Lot Project

In September 2024, Immanuel took on a huge project by contracting with P.H. Broughton for a new parking lot. The total cost for this project was \$139,640.55. The original quote was much more but we saved a considerable amount of monies by the volunteering of some members who did the sidewalks.

The Council and our Voters decided to take monies out of our savings account to pay for this project, with the intent of paying the monies back. In September, 2024 we began to receive offerings, over and above our congregations giving, to pay for the parking lot. As of June, 2025, we have received \$47,340.96.

Thank you for your sacrificial giving. We still have a little over \$92,000.00 to receive. We know that with each of us working together God will bless us in this endeavor. To God Be the Glory!
