

I read this story awhile back. Not sure of the author, but it makes a great point.

A member of a certain church, who previously had been attending services regularly, stopped going. After a few weeks, the pastor decided to visit him.

It was a chilly evening. The pastor found the man at home alone, sitting before a blazing fire. Guessing the reason for his pastor's visit, the man welcomed him, led him to a big chair near the fireplace and waited.

Stewardship Corner – Living Sacrifices

Stewardship is not just about giving money to the church. It includes this, to be sure, but it is not limited to it. Stewardship involves our whole life – everything we have and everything we are.

Let us not, though, fall into the trap of thinking that because we give of ourselves in one area then we can neglect giving in another. Stewardship is not stealing from Peter to pay Paul. It is not a game that we play whereby we justify ourselves in not giving a tenth of our income because we have given in some other way.

This is why our Lord warns: “Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you tithe mint and dill and cumin and have neglected the weightier matters of the law: justice and mercy and faithfulness. These you ought to have done, without neglecting the others.” (Matthew 23:23) We are given to do both – tithe of ourselves and what we have.

And so it is that St. Paul makes his appeal to us: “I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect.” (Romans 12:1–2)

We are to present our bodies as a living sacrifice to God. We are not to have the mind of the world, where we exchange equal weight of this for an equal weight of that and think that we have done what God has required. Our whole life is given over for service in and for the Church of God. This is to be done in thanksgiving for what God in Christ has accomplished for us. This is our spiritual worship, the reasonable response to what He has done for us. Not one for the other but all in all.

But what does this look like? St. Paul never lays down a general principle without also giving us some practical application of what shape that principle is to take concretely. He gives the general principle that our bodies are to be living sacrifices to God. And, after admonishing those who have been given particular gifts of grace to serve the church, St. Paul then speaks generally of what is expected of all. He says:

“Let love be genuine. Abhor what is evil; hold fast to what is good. Love one another with brotherly affection. Outdo one another in showing honor. Do not be slothful in zeal, be fervent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints and seek to show hospitality.” (Romans 12:9–13)

This is what it looks like to present your bodies as living sacrifices. This is how we live out the grace of God here in time.

Let us then heed the apostle’s teaching. Let us present our bodies – everything that we have and everything that we are – as living sacrifices to God, our reasonable response to what God in Christ Jesus accomplished for us by His death and resurrection. Through this, we have forgiveness of sins, a new life in Christ, and eternal salvation. And through this worship, the grace of God is made manifest in His saints – for the church and the world. – LCMS Stewardship Ministry




ASSEMBLY

The kids have been growing so much with their reading and writing skills! I love that I get to watch them grow and learn new concepts each day. In religion we have been focusing on the Easter story. The kids know how much Jesus loves them and they are thankful everyday that He died for our sins. Greetings from the 3-4 class!

It is hard to believe that we are already in the final countdown before these students are fourth and fifth graders! We hope that you had a blessed Easter. In March and April, students worked with Miss Kathy to construct, sew and design rag quilts for the Easter Auction. This is the second opportunity to stitch this school year, where students have applied math, leadership, and art skills to these projects. In music, the second graders have been working on identifying treble clef notes and musical notation. We have been working on instrumental music with boomwhackers. Their favorite song to play is "Ode to Joy." The second graders have enjoyed singing some favorite hymns accompanied by the ukulele as well as practicing singing songs and hymns in canons (rounds). Miss Courtney has been working with third and fourth graders on recorders. They have the opportunity to play leveled songs to earn different recorder belts - much like karate - as they master more challenging arrangements. Josh Childers has been serving as a cadet in our classroom throughout the school year, and has used his musical talents to help with choral and instrumental instruction.

In science, the 3-4 students are working with Mrs. Morrison to build rockets. They are applying what they have learned about energy and circuits to this project and are looking forward to launching rockets once they are completed. We will be praying for less wind in order to do that. An exciting addition to our classroom over the last month and a half has been launching "Lunch Bunches." Miss Robyn, Miss Kathy and Miss Jill are leading book discussions with small groups over lunch with interested second, third and fourth graders. Different groups are reading or have read Snow Treasure, I Survived the Children's Blizzard of 1888, Ice Island, and From the Mixed Up Files of Mrs. Basil E. Frankweiler. It has been fun to see how these lunchtime discussions have taken place over the last several weeks. I pray that all of these young leaders continue to foster their love of reading and life-long learning. So far throughout this school year, we have written and received almost 200 postcards from several states and countries. We have also traded state packages with a school in Louisiana.
