

The Life of Martin Luther is one of remarkable extremes, and his contribution to the Reformation and the Protestant Church is without equal. From his language skills and his capacity for the written word to his gutsy questioning of Catholic Church authority and iron-willed resolve to be heard, Luther was bound by faith's conviction and guided by the Holy Spirit. In the face of public abuse and threats on his life, Luther sounded the clarion call that salvation is available to EVERYONE. It is free and universal. It is a gift of God's magnificent grace in Christ. There is justification for the sinner -- not from acts of penance, not by stockpiled good works, not by bogus indulgences -- but simply because God has made a way for our eternal salvation through the substitutionary life and death of His Son Jesus.

Did you know that the pagans of the early church used to call the followers of Jesus atheists?

In the history of Polycarp of Smyrna who was burned at the stake for his Christian faith, he was told to say to the Christians gathered in the arena for martyrdom, "Away with the atheists!" instead Polycarp turned to the crowd and said, "Away with the atheists!" He was then pressed again to deny his faith: "Take the oath and I will let you go, revile Christ." Polycarp said: "For eighty and six years have I been his servant, and he has done me no wrong, and how can I blaspheme my King who saved me?" (Apostolic Fathers, Kirsopp Lake, 1912)

The pagans called the Christians atheists because that had no idols. They had no temples you could visit and go and see their god. Atheist simply means anti, without, or absent, God. It is a negation of something that should be there. But the God of the Christians was nowhere to be found. At least not in a physical, visible way.

The pagans saw that as a mark against the Christians. There are times when we sense that too. God is a god who hides himself so that we might walk by faith and not by sight. (II Cor 5:17) The just shall live by faith! (Rom 1:17) But it sure would be easier to walk by sight.

God does hide himself. He hides himself in his Word and sacraments. He hides himself in Christ. He hides himself in our daily vocations. God works behind the scenes and under the cover of seeming weakness to effect his plan and purpose. Many looked at Jesus and saw only a man despite his miracles. Many look at the water of



baptism, or the bread and wine of communion and

see only ordinary things. But to the eyes of faith these things are precious to us because of God's Word.

"You shall not be put to shame or confounded to all eternity." That means we may have to put up with these things for a time. But not for all time. That is why we walk by faith and not by sight, because our faith in in God's Word and promise.

and sacrament, which we receive and respond to through faith. The inhalation of faith receives these good gifts through no merit of our own. The exhalation of faith responds with prayer and praise.

In July, I had the opportunity to attend the Institute, which was held for four days at Concordia, Chicago. Here are a few highlights from the interest sessions:

LCMS Missions is involved in helping Lutheran churches around the world develop hymnals

with liturgical settings unique to the culture. The speaker shared sound samples of liturgies from around the world: Sanctus from Kenya, Agnus Dei from Ethiopia, Nunc Dimittis from Indonesia.

- In a session on theological symbolism in the music of J.S. Bach, the presenter showed examples of how Bach's carefully crafted music communicates theology not only in the way the music sounds but also in the way he makes cross appear in the placement of music notes on paper.
- Hymn Festivals Lite gave lots of ideas on how to be musically creative in hymns and liturgy whether you have a lot of resources or a few.
- A session on acoustics went into the physics of sound and how that applies in worship spaces.

In addition to great keynote and interest sessions, I enjoyed many worship services and concerts. One of the most inspiring events of the conference was a hymn festival based on hymns of Martin Luther. The hymn "Dear Christians, One and All, Rejoice" was interspersed between hymns and readings to tell the story of our salvation and justification by grace through faith.

Immanuel's 2nd Annual Bus Trip The ARK Encounter & Creation Museum Adventure

Those are just some of the comments people shared from our most recent motor coach trip to Kentucky. The weather was almost perfect, the overnight accommodations in Cincinnati were 5-star, and the days spent at the Creation Museum and The Ark Encounter were almost unbelievable. It was like seeing Biblical history 'come to life' before your very eyes.

One day was spent at each place. Those going on the trip were mostly "seniors" but very young at heart. When purchasing group tickets both places schedule the buses in before the general public. The Creation Museum is experiencing record crowds this year and the Ark replica is a very popular attraction. Both places are "self-guided". We paced ourselves and each attraction took between 7 and 7 ½ hours to complete, including resting and lunch breaks.

Feedback obtained from the group was that they would like a Branson Christmas tour, a return trip to the Ark and Creation Museum; go to the International Festival in Winnipeg, Door County, WI, a North Dakota tour stopping at FrostFire, the Peace Gardens and Medora, plus other adventures. People gave great feedback about this trip to support making future trips that much more enjoyable.

Library Hi-Lights

I recently stopped in the Library;

and on my desk was a book that was falling apart with a note on it. I saw I was the only one to have read this book....30 years ago! I was happy to see someone now had found it and checked it out. I still remember I couldn't put it down and went on to read all this author's books. I took the book home, glued the binding and wonder of wonders, it held. It's still in print so if it falls apart again, I'll reorder it! It's that good!

The book is entitled *The Hiding Place* by Corrie ten Boom with John & Elizabeth Sherrill. The ten Booms lived in Holland and were of the Dutch Reformed faith. Corrie's devoted father read a chapter from the Bible to them every night. Anyone needing help was welcomed into their home...one aunt came for 6 wks. and stayed 40 years. Corrie's father was a master clockmaker and she later learned the trade from him as her sister Betsie was better at keeping house. Dear Betsie could always manage to make the food stretch. When the war broke out in Germany and the Nazi's came looking for Jews, the ten Booms hid them in a special small hidden room they made. But someone they knew told on them. Father, Corrie and Betsie were put in a Holland prison. Father died there. Corrie & her sister Betsie were then sent to Ravensbruck, a German concentration camp. Corrie managed to smuggle a small Bible with her and to hold small Bible readings with the women at night. Betsie wasn't very strong as the severe cold, lack of food, hard labor & beatings took its toll. But she had visions she told Corrie about – visions of helping people after the war and they should forgive and pray for their captors. Betsie's health worsened and she died. Corrie was soon told she was to be released! It wasn't until long after the war she learned her papers to be exterminated had been put in the wrong file! Now she was able to leave! She got on a mail train and made it out of Germany and finally into Holland's border. She found a hospital there and a nice nurse helped her: gave her food, a hot bath, a bed, and she finally slept! When her health returned, she was able to contact her brother who with difficulty found a way back home for her. The 2nd week in May the Allies retook Holland and the Canadian Armies rushed in food they'd been stockpiling and people that had been in hiding came out and home again.

Corrie remembered her promise to Betsie. She went back into Germany and saw the suffering of the many German people wandering amongst the rubble and no homes. She went into churches and told Betsie's story of love and forgiveness and she

was in demand everywhere. Then she was asked to open a home for refugees in a former camp that had just been opened up. She started to say she wasn't qualified, but they still took her to see this abandoned "concentration" camp. First thing she said was, "We'll have to get rid of the barbed wire, buy lots of bright yellow paint and get window boxes for flowers!" A German Lutheran church joined her in opening this camp as a home and place for renewal. It functioned until 1960. The authors Sherrills share that since the closing chapter of this book, Corrie traveled ceaselessly, carrying her message of triumph & living all over the world, especially behind the Iron Curtain. "She is a colorful, amusing speaker with a hold on young audiences. That is but one of her many intriguing personal mysteries". Those living in prisons also listened to her. In this book she tells, for the first time, the full story behind the faith that has touched and stirred and changed so many lives, everywhere. Corrie went "home" at age 91. I'll have her books on easels. Please consider reading one – you'll be blessed, as I was.

Fargo Meals On Wheels Volunteering Opportunities.

As the number of people aged 60 and older continues to grow in our area, so does our meals on Wheels Program. Currently we have 32 routes per day in the Fargo communities.

Attached you will find informational details about Meals On Wheels Delivering which you can share with parishioners and church staff.

Meals on Wheels Volunteering is very flexible with volunteers' schedules. Volunteers can volunteer **once a week, or once a month.** Families & high schoolers can think ahead and volunteer during school breaks while College students can sign up for class volunteer hours. A Vacation from Sin?

Serving the Lord's Church in Spain is very different from what I experienced in northeastern Montana, in a thousand different ways. Dealing with cultural Catholicism and runaway secularism, navigating a dense and opaque bureaucracy that touches every aspect of life, and doing it all in Spanish: these are all new and perplexing challenges for a pastor from the sticks. One of our current challenges is trying to keep Word and Sacrament ministry going as Spain, and especially Sevilla, where we live, grinds to the annual summertime halt. Although the economy is moving away from the standard of most workers taking all of August off, this is still the preferred way for the average Spaniard. And this custom is not without its justifications in Sevilla. Because it is **HOT** here. Days in the 110° range and higher are normal occurrences, sometimes for weeks at a time, from June through September. So getting out of Sevilla and to the beach makes a lot of sense. And who wants to go to Church when you're at the beach? Or the lake? Or up in the mountains, or wherever you go to relax in the summertime? Yes, things are different in Spain. Since we are a small church, losing a few families to vacations at the same time can ruin Sunday worship. But things are also very much the same. The degree of the disappearing act performed by congregations in the U.S. may be different than what we face here, but empty pews during July and August are hardly unique to the Iberian Peninsula. Which would be o.k., if at the same time people took a vacation from Church they also took a vacation from sinning. But we don't, do we? Regardless of the season, anytime the children of God begin to think they don't need to return to their Father's house to be served by His Son, someone needs to warn them: Beware lest your short vacation from receiving God's grace and mercy turn into the Devil's opportunity to fool you into thinking you can do just fine without hearing, and eating and drinking, the Gospel, Beware, And be welcome. Warnings must be given, for the sake of reminding God's people that the ultimate reason we gather together is to receive God's loving forgiveness. As sinners, we need to be dragged back to the services of God's house. But as Saints, as beloved, baptized children of the Heavenly Father, we know that we **get** to go to Church, that there is no better place to be than gathered with brothers and sisters to receive the gifts that Christ gives, freely. In God's Word and in His Sacraments, we

are freed from the sin that plagues us, and we are reminded of the Promise, that someday, in God's perfect timing, we will go on a permanent vacation

from sin, and all the guilt and the painful consequences it brings into our lives. In the Lord's eternal paradise, the sun will not strike you by day, and sin and sorrow and death will be no more. Now that will be the best vacation ever, forever and ever, Amen.
