On Ash Wednesday, February 14th, we will be entering the season of Lent. This year during this season of reflection and repentance, we will be taking a closer look at the Ten Commandments our Lord has given to us. Not only do these commands of our Father guide our behavior, but, most importantly, they remind us of our deep need for the redemption that Jesus has come to bring to us by His death and resurrection. How great is our need for God's forgiveness! Even more so, how great is our Savior who washes us clean with His own precious blood!



The Lenten Cross

During the season of Lent, we remember the events that led Jesus to His crucifixion. As an aid to our midweek worship meditations together, we will again be using the Lenten Cross this year. Just as

the Advent wreath with its four candles helps us remember the significance of Advent as we await the coming of the Light of the World, so the Lenten Cross with its seven candles helps us remember and understand the season of Lent.



As we light the four candles on the Advent wreath (one each week),

the light increases in anticipation of the glorious Light of Christmas. Conversely, as we extinguish the six candles of the Lenten Cross (one each week), the light decreases in anticipation of the darkness of Good Friday. The Lenten Cross grows darker and darker as the cross of Calvary looms larger and larger for Jesus.

The six purple candles on the Lenten Cross represent the six weeks of Lent. The white Christ Candle is in the center, representing the joy and purity of the life and work of Jesus. Purple is the color that denotes royalty. It also symbolizes repentance and a time of preparation. During our midweek Lenten services, after the Confession of Sins, we will extinguish one candle on the Lenten Cross each week as we remember once again that it was also our sins that Jesus carried to the cross. On Good Friday, the white Christ Candle is extinguished during the Service of Tenebrae, as we ponder the death of Jesus for us and for our salvation.



Ash Wednesday is February 14th

Each year, Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the season of Lent. Lent is a time to reflect on the profound meaning of Jesus' gift of Himself. We are called to a life of repentance during these 40 days. This is a time of reconciliation with God, for the washing away of sin, and the consecration of a life to God, our heavenly Father.

This Ash Wednesday (February 14) at **12:00 noon**, we will have the opportunity to receive the **Imposition of Ashes**. The members of the congregation come forward to the altar to be "marked" on the forehead with an ashen cross. As we are now offering this special worship service here at Immanuel, it is important for us to consider the significance of the ashes and the reason for this ancient custom of the Christian Church.

Ashes symbolize our sinful condition before God. Because we do sin they remind us of the fact that we will die because of our sins. The Lord God said, "Dust you are, and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19). And yet, the ashes also suggest cleansing and renewal. They point to the free gift of forgiveness and eternal life that God gives to us in our Savior Jesus.

Please keep in mind that, should you desire NOT to participate in this meaningful and public act of confession, your repentance, confession, and forgiveness are not threatened if you do not receive ashes. Also, please remember that your repentance and confession are NOT made more acceptable to God if you DO receive the ashes.

My friend, if you believe that you cannot receive the imposition of ashes without being proud of your humble piety, then it would be better for you not to receive them. Do not judge yourself or others by your actions in either receiving ashes or abstaining. Ash Wednesday is not a time to be proud of how humble we are. This is a time for sincere repentance and renewal, for there is One who knows the heart perfectly.

It seems a bit strange to us today to think of really sprinkling ashes on the head or actually wearing sack cloth to deliberately rub and chafe the body. But it was not strange to God's people throughout the ages, all the way back to the Old Testament. "Ash" Wednesday gains its name from the ancient custom of putting ashes on the head in token of repentance and sorrow over sins. This beginning of the Lenten season is the day when our sins are placed forthrightly before our eyes and our hearts are challenged to reckon for the sins that our eyes are called upon to see.

But how can a man reckon for his own sins? Even were he to be perfect from this moment on, he would only be doing what he was supposed to do, and there would be no "atonement" for past sins.

For a man cannot be better than holy, more perfect than perfect, so as to pile up credit to count against past faults. This is just plain foolish talk, isn't it? For who among us can hope to be perfect even from this moment, much less to make up for our past?

Lent, therefore, is designed to help us see ourselves as we really are, but also to see God as HE really is – rich in mercy and grace, sending His Son to sacrifice His life for us on the cross. Lent looks back at our own lives and then looks back further still to the cross of Christ. Then it points us forward; because repentance is not merely sorrow over the past, but a new turn to the future with hope and new resolve to live in the joy of God's will and ways.

In turning us to the future, however, the season of Lent goes far beyond our own future into the future opened to us by Christ's Resurrection. Lent without Easter means nothing. But Lent is designed to give new meaning to Easter. It is meant to help us meet Easter with a joy and a peace that can come only to those who have faced up to sin and its consequences – those who have seen the consequences of their sins placed upon Jesus.

you! You may spoil your supper and the fellowship that happens at the table with a family meal. You may also eat the wrong things...things that are no good for you.

We live in such an "on demand" culture with fast food and choices that abound to please the imagination. But at what point are we no longer making "choices", but simply being ruled by the plethora of "options" that are out there? The Christians in the city of Corinth were hearing the argument that all things are lawful. In Christian freedom we can make our own choices. But Paul counters, "Yes! But not all things are helpful." Just because you *can* do it doesn't mean you *should* do it. Also, do not be dominated by your appetites. Do not be mastered by your desires. Learn self-control. And think about the long-term consequences of your choices.

Even within a marriage, where intimacy between the partners of that marriage is "lawful", it doesn't mean it can happen at any time or in any place. You still make choices with consideration for others and in view of the long-term consequences. We will not be ruled by our passions of the moment! Paul says, "The body is not meant for sexual immorality, but for the Lord, and the Lord for the body." Yes, it is your body in the sense it is yours to take care of and yours with its own unique personality and even a distinctive gait! But the apostle concludes: "You are not your own, you were bought with a price. Therefore glorify God in your body." (I Cor 6:19b-20)



I like the analogy of the fireplace. Our sexual energy is like a fire that burns brightly and warm. But it needs to burn in a proper place and at a proper time. Burning the

logs on the living room floor will bring the house down and fill it with smoke. But burning them in the fireplace will put the smoke up the chimney and warm the hearth and bring light to the house. God has designed marriage as a lifelong union between a man and a woman. (Gen 1:27; 2:24; Mk 10:6-8) That's the fireplace! In this context, the appetite for intimacy and sexual union are fully realized. Thus, children are protected from being born apart from a life-long union between a mom and a dad...and the man and the woman are both protected from a relationship that has no intention of long-term support and commitment.

God's design is a good design. It is meant, not to withhold pleasure or take away choices, but to protect God's creation from harm. It keeps families safe and warm! It enhances the power and beauty of God's intention that a man and a woman share their bodies with one another in a life-long commitment. Hunger is good! A desire for something isn't wrong in and of itself. Appetites can and should be satisfied, but all in their proper time and in their proper place.

You are not your own. You were bought at a price. That price is the blood of Jesus who died on the cross for your sins. Though you are free from your sins and the curse of the law of God, nevertheless you are not free to do whatever you please. Freedom and responsibility go hand in hand.



Library Hi-Lights The Girl from the Train by

Irma Joubert.

Six-year old Gretl Schmidt, along with her Jewish family

& other Jews, is on a train bound for Auschwitz. Polish Jakob Kowalski is planting a bomb on the tracks awaiting a trainload of German soldiers. But this unscheduled train comes and stalls for a bit at the top of the tracks. Gretl Schmidt & her sister are pushed off by her mother and slide down the slopes into trees and brush...and the train blows up.

Gretl is the only survivor. Though spared from the concentration camp, the orphaned German Jew finds herself lost in a country hostile to her people. Gretl's father, a German soldier, was killed in the war. Her mother was a Jew, but Gretl has blond hair & blue eyes like her father, so looks German. When Jakob discovers her, guilt and fatherly compassion prompt him to take her in. For three years, the young man and little girl form a

bond over the secrets they must hide from his Catholic family. His family has him send her to the school run by nuns. There she learns to read, write & becomes Catholic.

She can't stay with Jakob forever, as his family is too poor to feed her. So Jakob sends Gretl to South Africa, where German war orphans are promised bright futures with adoptive Protestant families---so long as Gretl's Jewish roots, Catholic education, and connections to communist Poland are never discovered.

Gretl is adopted by a wonderful South African family. They are wealthy farmers. They fall in love with her right away... her blue eyes, and blond curly hair. They assume she's Protestant. This family has one teen-aged son that welcomes her as a little sister, too. She's very intelligent and learns how to speak Africaans & English. Gretl dearly loves her new family and they form a warm family bond. She later is given a very good education.

But, Jakob & Gretl will likely never see each other again. The events they have both survived and their belief that the human spirit can triumph over the savages of war have formed a bond of love that no circumstances can overcome. But Jakob has to flee the Polish resistance and comes to Africa; and yes, he and Gretl do meet. I'll let you read what happens next. You won't be able to put this book down!

About the author: International bestselling author **Irma Joubert** lives and works in South Africa and writes in her native Afrikaans. A teacher for 35 years, Irma began to write after her retirement. She is the author of eight novels and is a regular fixture on bestseller lists in both South Africa and the Netherlands. This is her first novel to be translated into English.


