

honor it was to place that star for all to see! The stars on top of Christmas trees are to draw us near to Christ. As the star led the wise men to the infant Jesus, so too



we are drawn to see the savior of the world lying in such a humble estate. A tiny baby is the world's redeemer!

Did you know that there are many references to stars in the Bible? So too in our Advent and Christmas hymns! And we will be looking at four of them in detail. We will begin with the stars that God created and the complexity and density of the midnight sky. We will look up with Abraham to the midnight sky and see in those stars the One who is promised who would "cause all the families of the earth to be blessed." Then the star of David promised, and the star that led the wisemen to the infant Christ. Having met and exceeded the two-thirds fundraising goal, the Growing Together in Grace capital improvement campaign is moving forward. The construction committee, the architect and engineers, PACE, LCEF, and the fundraising committee are all very busy right now with meetings and decisions as the project becomes reality.

As of October 17th, GTIG has raised nearly \$849,000. <u>This is incredible</u>. GTIG will continue to fundraise until the project is fully funded between \$1.25 and \$1.5 million.

The GTIG fundraising committee has been working hard for many months and would like to add some new faces to the team. 

I was asked to write a faith story. "Name a time when your faith was tested or strengthened, a sort of 'faith-in-a-nutshell' overview," was the request. At first, I couldn't think of anything but then it came to me that for all the decades of my life, I have always believed that the Lord has brought me through all things, big and small. However, I have failed to believe that He could bring me through one more day. I suppose it was easy for me to account for what had passed because I could see it and know it. I could believe it because I had lived it. I was no different than Thomas who said, "Unless I see the holes in His hands and touch the wound in His side, I will not believe" (John 20:25). That wasn't faith. The good news is that the Holy Spirit worked to help me realize my error and my prayer became "Lord, I believe; help my unbelief" (Mark 9:24). My oldest grandson had been taken from us by our former daughter-in-law when he was five years old. The loss was devastating and for years, our family didn't know where he was or how he was doing. Nearly two years passed when we were finally able to build a small connection and we started having sporadic phone conversations with

him. Our grandson was able to give us a sense of

where he was and so my husband and I decided

that we had to visit him, see his face, and embrace his being. We couldn't find the exact address on Google maps and the general location was so remote that we were able to reserve only a bed and breakfast for our first night. We literally went as the saying goes, "on a whim and a prayer." The long journey was tortuous. Unable to announce our intentions, we chose to arrive at the appointed time for one of our phone conversations, figuring that we could not be denied a visit if we were consuming the moments already allotted. After three days of travel, we left the Interstate highway and turned onto a two-lane country byway. A few more miles and we lost pavement continuing on a narrow gravel road without recognizing our specific location. We only had the address for the bed and breakfast, not our grandson's home. As we crossed the bridge of a large river, I saw a house through an opening in the trees. It matched the color mentioned by our grandson. In that moment, the door opened, and a woman came out onto the front deck with a young boy behind her. It was our grandson. "There he is," I screamed, and my husband abruptly jerked the car toward the driveway and up to the house. As my husband rolled down the car window, our grandson came running toward us. He reached in as far as his body would allow and hugged my husband with an expression of glee. My body shook and uncontrolled tears ran down my face. He was alive: our grandson was alive! We were allowed to take him for a bite to eat and the brief visit was strained. But it was a visit, nonetheless. We took him back. said our good-byes and crawled up the road toward our evening rest. For me, rest never came. I was so traumatized that I could not sleep nor could I eat the next morning. "Would this be all there was?" My husband and I had forced ourselves to make this a vacation trip thinking it would keep us from developing unrealistic expectations where our grandson was concerned. When morning finally came, we repacked our belongings and headed for the coast. We were maybe fifty miles down the road when my cell phone rang. It was our grandson's mother. "Do you have room for [grandson] at your hotel?" she asked. The truth didn't matter; the answer was a simple, "of course!" "Stop the car," I yelled at my husband. Having no idea what had just happened, he instantly pulled over, stopped the car, and did his best to soothe my uncontrollable cries. "We get to see him," I said between sobs. "I will never again doubt God's presence in my life, I

promise!" The next four days were both exhilarating and painful. We did our best to make the most of every minute that we had together, but we also knew that it was coming to an end. When we took our grandson back home, he understandably felt betrayed and abandoned for a second time.

Our journey home was worse than the original trip. We never had another conversation as our grandson was moved once again and our efforts to communicate with him were in vain. I kept my promise to God and He used that situation to grow my faith. Ten years have passed since that visit with our grandson and the pain of his absence is as much an open wound today as it was when he first left us. But my prayer is different, "Lord, keep him in the faith of his youth. If it is your will that I never see him again in this life, I pray that he will join me in heaven. Allow me to marvel at the greatness of your glory today. In your holy name, I pray-Amen." And all His people said, "Amen!"

Note from the Editor: This means of fellowship among our Immanuel family was instituted in March 2015. "My Faith Story" was a monthly feature for a couple of years, where someone from Immanuel uses his/her creative writing abilities to **share their faith story** with the rest of the congregation. The story should be short, authentic, and personal. The story can be about a point where faith was tested, originated and/or strengthened, or an overview/outline of one's "faith-in-a-nutshell." Thanks to support from faith communities, individuals, and community groups in the Fargo-Moorhead area, the Emergency Food Pantry has served the community since 1972. The Emergency Food Pantry provides a food basket to families who cannot afford to buy groceries. Even though each family can receive up to six baskets from us each year, on average most families request two or three baskets each year.

We have seen an increased number of families asking for food this year and a decrease in food and monetary donations. During the first nine months of 2023, the pantry provided food baskets to over 17,000 unique individuals in the community. One family that we recently supported stands out. We provided a food basket to Monica* who is a widowed mother with three preschool children. Although she is working, she is struggling financially while parenting her growing children with one income. In order to continue providing a week's worth of food to the families, in recent months we purchased more food compared to previous years. For every dollar donated, the pantry can supply three meals to neighbors in need. A donation of \$28.00 will feed a family like Monica's for a week!

Three main ways to support the pantry's mission are donate nonperishable items, donate funds, and volunteer. **Our highest need right now is financial contributions.** We are seeking donations to support the food purchases and service to feed 5,500 families. Kirk Rosin, from St. Andrew, will also be with us to share a new video presentation from his work with Ala, the Ukrainian woman who is running Christian orphanages for the young people there who are in need. A short business meeting will also be in order, and treats served by Parish Workers Circle. Come and join us for an enjoyable morning! If you have Christian Christmas cards to share, we collect and use what's needed for this year and save extras for next year. If you have saved Christian message/picture cards received from past years, please bring or drop off those you no longer want, too, as we will use those to attach a Spanish message inside and send them to the Ysleta Mission in Texas.

Sun, Nov 19th – Our LWML will have a display table at the Time and Talent Fair between services in the Celebration Center. We will need 2-3 people to be at the table during that hour to answer questions and share information about LWML. Please let Patty know if you are able/willing to help with this!

Wed, Dec 13th – LWML serves the Advent meal at 5:00 pm. We will be serving chili and hot dogs, along with veggies and dip, breads/crackers, sour cream, cheese, and of course, desserts! Each Circle is asked to provide 5 doz. sweet treats. The rest of the food items will be purchased by the LWML and prepared at church. A sign-up sheet will be out on the LWML table for helpers for different shifts, making the tasks simple for everyone. Sun, Dec 17th – LWML serves Christmas cookies/bars, hot chocolate, coffee, and water following the 3 pm Sunday School Christmas Service. Each Circle is asked to provide 7 dozen goodies. A sign-up sheet will be on the LWML table for helpers for different shifts. Many hands make light work for everyone!

After we finished our initial Kiswahili language learning, we traveled from Iringa in the southern part of Tanzania where language school was located to Mwanza where we will live in the northern part of the country on Lake Victoria. Along the way, we stopped in Shinyanga to see bishop Nzelu. This last week, we traveled back to Shinyanga to go to the



immigration office, and we were able to see the progress on the seminary buildings. We, along with the

church leadership, are very excited about the progress on the seminary buildings. Currently the plans are to have the first class of students start in January.

In August, we stayed on the Evangelical Lutheran Church compound in Mwanza as we searched for a place to live and made preparations for our boys to begin school.

Thanks be to God for bringing us through our initial Kiswahili language studies. Lord-willing, we will continue language study as we get settled. The boys have Kiswahili classes in school. We hope to find a tutor to help us in our continued language study. Keep us in your prayers these weeks, as we hope to move into a home and get it set up to live and work. Please also pray for our health. It is normal to have a season of transition as our bodies adjust to a new location.
