# The Soul of Christmas

Young Mary expressed the soul of Christmas through a prophetic poem to be recounted down through the ages and to be heard by all generations spoken when she entered the house of Elizabeth her relative and professed it in this way as recorded in Luke 1:46-47 she cried out loud by the Spirit "My soul glorifies the Lord and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior!" In that moment Mary had come to realize that God was to bring great mercy and redemption to "Abraham and his descendants forever" (v.55) through this Holy child now growing in her womb. She burst with joy at the thought of God himself being their Savior. It also caused the child in Elizabeth's womb to leap for joy at the sound of Mary's voice and she was filled with the Holy Spirit in that moment. This other child in Elizabeth's womb was John the Baptist - who would be one of the kingdom's greatest Champions. This is the heart and soul of Christmas for Christians when we



celebrate this year and each year going all the way back to that starry night in Bethlehem where Christ was born - the town of Mary's ancestor King David. Do we burst with joy at the thought of Christ our Savior? And because of it - Have we become champions of His kingdom like John did?

The Angel Gabriel had said to Mary on that special day of revelation "Do not be afraid Mary, for you have found

favor with God, and you will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus. He will be great and will be called the son of the Most High. The LORD God will give him the throne of his father David and he will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and his kingdom will never end." (V.30-33) Christ and his eternal kingdom was coming to earth through the birth of God's own son and Mary's soul deep down inside was rejoicing in this coming redemption to the house of Jacob and to all those who would discover the same faith of Abraham and become his descendants and heirs of this promise even though not by blood line. As the scriptures makes clear 4:16-17 in Romans "Therefore the promise comes by faith, so that it may be by grace and may be guaranteed to all Abraham's offspring, not only to those who are of the law (Jews) but also to those who are of the faith of Abraham (Gentiles) - he is the father of us all as it is written: "I will make you the father of many nations." ~ This beautiful and powerful Jesus. promise is for everyone who will believe in Jesus Christ this Christmas and receive this precious gift personally from God the Father – the gift of his only son born to the virgin Mary to be our Savior who provided forgiveness of sin at the cross where he died and gave hope for an eternal future where death will no longer exist because he walked out of that grave alive three days later! #### **Blue Jeans for The Homeless**



"A DAY IN A LIFE OF A HOMELESS MAN"

Driving to Chicago I hummed to the sound of White Christmas. On this day I have more than a hundred big bags of Holiday Gifts for our homeless friends. In the bag were coats, blankets, sweaters, socks, food, hygiene products and essentials to live in a cold and waterless environment.

It was a quiet morning at the Lower Wacker Drive. Nate whose pad is near the entrance of the apartment high-rise woke up at once when he heard my van park in front of him. Nate has been living on the street for more than five years. He has a unique living condition. He never wears a shirt or jacket even during the coldest day in the city.

A few feet from Nate was Jerry who resides near the entrance of the parking garage. His beddings were organized and well kept. He is a runner and he frequents the library on Sundays. I suspect his profession was in the legal field before he became homeless.

Searching for the homeless at the Upper Wacker Drive I saw a man on my sideview mirror running and trying to catch up with me. He was John who lives near the Navy Pier in a hidden place. He is a veteran and a mentally challenged person. He talks to himself, maybe a schizophrenic.

Moving along to the North Side and passing by Weiss Memorial Hospital I saw a woman living inside the bus stop dome. Her name is Terry. According to her she used to live in the church. She was thankful for the hot soup and the Christmas Bag.

Under the Wilson Bridge there was Josh who was a very commanding fellow. He is 6'5" tall and has a booming voice. He wears size 38x34 blue jeans. Although he is homeless, his demeanor is well. I suspect he has an outside help, maybe from his family who visits him occasionally.

At the sidewalk under the Lawrence Bridge is a man name Tom. I've known Tom since I started visiting the homeless many years past. He has a capability to lead the homeless and they respect him. Many times, he protected me from aggressive people who lash out on me if they couldn't have what they want. One day there was person charging towards me and Tom barricaded the man with his body and received the impact.

Sometime the people that we served are unpredictable but deep in their hearts they need us. It is very hard to live outside, exposed to everyday weather condition. Not to mention some passers by who ridicule and insult them. After our lunch break, we proceeded to Belmont Viaduct and only two people were around among fifteen tents located in this area. All tents received a Christmas Big Bag. In this site lives Maria and her husband who are working at Target Department Store.

At the Fullerton Viaduct two individuals distributed the bags to the doorstep of nine tents. At the Tent City I met a new residence Tamadia who needs a new tent in preparation

for the winter. Aside from the tent she also needs a portable heater.

At the Canalport Viaduct I saw a man who was staring at me. I think he is not well. He could barely stand and is lying on a makeshift bed with a thin blanket on a very cold day. He told me that he needs a tent. I gave him a cup of hot soup, food and jeans.

As one of our recipients said, "You made me a Christian". Many of our homeless friends think that being kind and respectful to them is religious. If you can't help, please pray for them. If you can help, please visit: bluejeansforthehomeless.org Have a


