- **P:** <u>The Fourth Petition of the Lord's Prayer</u> Give us this day our daily bread. What does this mean?
- C: God certainly gives daily bread to everyone without our prayers, even to all evil people, but we pray in this petition that God would lead us to realize this and to receive our daily bread with thanksgiving.
- **P:** What is meant by daily bread?
- C: Daily bread includes everything that has to do with the support and needs of the body, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, land, animals, money, goods, a devout husband or wife, devout children, devout workers, devout and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, self-control, good reputation, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like.

Welcome to Worship! Today's readings all have the idea of knowing or being known in them. In the Old Testament reading, even though "Samuel did not know the LORD," the LORD knows Samuel and introduces Himself to Samuel. In the Gospel, Jesus' intimate knowledge of Nathanael prompts the disciple to ask Jesus, "How did you know me?" In the Epistle, Paul asks the questions of God's people, "Do you not know that your bodies are members of Christ?" and "Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you?"

In the Bible, the concept of knowing indicates an intimate knowledge of a person. Knowing God is more than knowing things about him. Knowing God includes experiencing his presence and power. To know God is to be loved by him. This morning, Jesus invites all of us to know Him better with the words, "Come and see!"
