WORSHIP

Engaging worship deepens our relationship with God and prepares us to go into the world to share the love of Jesus.

SUNDAY WORSHIP

Worship in 2019 saw the use of several different themes and sermon series that asked us to look at how God is at work in our lives and how we can live into the promise of Jesus. During Lent, we asked what things in our lives we could cultivate and what things we should let go. In tandem with the theme of Faith and Family Week, through summer we explored how we could live a compassionate life before asking ourselves in the fall, "What do disciples do?" Finally, through Advent and Christmas we asked, "What can't wait?" God didn't wait to give us his perfect love. What are we waiting for?

OTHER WORSHIP HIGHLIGHTS

This year, our youth planned and led Epiphany, Ash Wednesday, and Pentecost worship. We slowed down mid-week with Lenten and Advent Vespers. Holy Week Worship included a table service on Maundy Thursday as well as Good Friday and Easter Vigil services while Christmas Eve was a packed house with many friends and neighbors joining us to celebrate Christ's birth.







MUSIC MINISTRIES

Music is an integral part of our worship. Whether you attend the traditional service or the contemporary service, LMC's music ministries celebrate the diversity of our community, providing an opportunity to explore and express our faith through music.

A YEAR OF GROWTH

LMC Music Ministries celebrated increased participation throughout 2019, welcoming new members across all ensembles and adding volunteer cantors to our Sunday worship. We also added a new ensemble: The Walkers, LMC's youth band, began rehearsals in September and played/sang in worship this fall.

MUSIC FESTIVAL SUNDAY

LMC musicians came together on May 17 to lead a special worship celebrating the "Fruit of Our Spirit." We will continue this new tradition in 2020 to give thanks for our musical gifts.





SINGING SMALL GROUP

Not only does the LMC praise band lead our contemporary service with meaningful, inspiring music, they also support one another in much the same way as a traditional small group. Whether they are coming together in grief after the unexpected passing of band member Vaughn Walker or cooking up Italian favorites for a One Stop Wednesday dinner, the praise band truly functions as family.

In addition to singing in worship on the first Sunday of every month, the Children's Choir really likes to have fun. Some of their 2019 adventures include dressing up for an impromptu Halloween party and learning about all the cool features on the LMC organ.



OUR CHURCH HOME

Our building has undergone quite a transformation in the past five years. While the improvements resulting from our very successful capital campaign are winding down, there is much still to be done. We are lucky to be able to share our space with our neighbors during the week and for special events.

EVER REFORMING OUR BUILDING

2019 saw both aesthetic and structural improvements to our building. Perhaps most visible, the wood paneling and improved lighting in the Wilson Ave. red door lobby are the first steps in the path to upgrading that space. Less visible, but no less important, masonry work on the north wall of the Sanctuary building was completed to address leaks and preserve the Sanctuary for years to come. As Pastor Lindsay noted in her message opening this report, members of the Property Team dropped everything to coordinate and oversee on-going repairs to our lift over a two-week period right before Christmas and, ultimately, constructed a temporary ramp into the Sanctuary when those repairs failed. We are now in the process of establishing a fund seeded by several generous gifts to ensure the smooth operation of the lift for years to come.

OPFN DOORS

Over a beautiful weekend in October, we opened LMC's doors as part of Open House Chicago. Through this program, we were able to share our space with people from all walks of life regardless of whether or not they were looking for a church home. Over fifty LMC members came together to welcome visitors from across Chicagoland. Our talented musicians gave concerts each day and volunteers from Women's Ministries nourished our guests while raising money to feed our neighbors in need.

CHILD, YOUTH, AND FAMILY

The Child, Youth, and Family Team fosters spiritual growth from birth through college, supporting both young people and their parents. Some 2019 highlights from the team:

We celebrate the growth of a book club specifically for families with little ones. It is a joy to see people get to know one another better while digging into the challenges and joys of parenting in faith guided by such classics as "Is That Poop on My Arm?" We are most grateful for those who host these gatherings, those who babysit on site so that the adults can have meaningful conversation, and those who complete the not-small task of making it out of the house on a Saturday morning with children under three!











In it's second year, LMC Faith & Family Week brought together grandparents, parents, and kids of a large variety of ages to put Faith in Action. We did a lot. For example, we learned about (and tasted!) Fair Trade Chocolate with the help of Ten Thousand Villages from Evanston. We made sleep mats for persons experiencing homelessness. We handed out free water in Lincoln Square on one of the hottest days of the year. As we sat and handed out bottle after bottle that sweltering evening, we learned a little about what it means to be God's hands and feet in this world in a practical way.



LMC youth made two trips to Lutherdale in 2019. First, the seventh and eighth graders enjoyed a wet and wild Confirmation Camp during Lutherdale's Water Week. Then, both confirmation and high school youth returned in the fall for the synod-wide youth retreat, "(un)lawful: unpacking the Ten Commandments." It's not often you get down on the ground for an activity with the Bishop!

REACHING OUT

In a recent sermon, Pastor Lindsay reminded us that "as people of God, we are called to one another, to alleviate one another's pain . . . to hope for one another . . . and to be the hands and feet and heart of Jesus to one another." Here are just a few ways we answer that call.

CELEBRATING DIVERSITY

This year we observed Reconciling in Christ Sunday in conjunction with Pride Weekend in June. We began the day chalking the sidewalk with messages of love and acceptance and worshiped with a special blessing and sending for those attending the day's Pride Parade where we marched with the Chicago Coalition of Welcoming Churches. The weekend prior, LMC's Faith and Justice Team organized an outing to PrideFest.









The Faith and Justice Team was busy this summer. In addition to organizing LMC's outing to PrideFest, the team planned and executed LMC's first ever Juneteenth Celebration. With food, music, and crafts, we shared cultures and celebrated the emancipation of over 3.9 million black people in this country.







PEACE WITH JUSTICE

LMC continued the monthly vigil for peace in the Middle East as part of the ELCA's Peace Not Walls Project. In conjunction with the Peace Vigil, we hosted Dr. Muther Isaac, pastor of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Bethlehem who spoke about the Palestinian Christian perspective of the Israel/Palestine conflict.

REACHING OUT

RAISING AWARENESS

LMC's Women's Ministries were instrumental in calling our attention to marginalized peoples in 2019. In partnership with the Faith and Justice Team, Women's Ministries brought leadership from The Dreamcatcher Foundation to LMC in April to speak on human trafficking. Later that spring, Women's Ministries organized the annual Rachel's Day Sunday focusing this year on children and teens impacted by gun violence.

ST. PAULS HOUSE

This fall and winter we twice partnered with St. Pauls House to bring holiday spirit to their senior residents. Around Halloween, a group of young families Reverse Trick or Treated with the St. Pauls residents bringing them sweet treats and completing a craft. We returned at Christmas for our annual caroling event.



OUTSIDE GIVING

Each year, we raise money and gifts in kind for a wide variety of organizations beyond our regular offering. Some of our 2019 projects included:
