

Minutes of 2016 Congregational Meetings For Approval

Minutes of the LMC Congregational Meeting 2016

In Attendance: 88

Meeting opened at 10:15am, Feb. 7, 2016 Convene meeting in prayer: Justin Shimko

Quorum acknowledged by Cooper, Dieterich and Peppler.

Jamie Schupp moved to approve minutes: Betten Seconded. Unanimous approval Bates Larson moved to approve agenda: Betten seconded. Unanimous approval. Peppler adjusted order of agenda because of the delay in opening the meeting.

Presidents Report – Peppler delivered the report, highlighting the accomplishments of the church in the past year despite turbulence at the end. She read the Mission and Vision of LMC. Received 37 new members in the last year. Finished Phase 1 of Capital Campaign. Also experienced a lot of loss that has caused turbulence of the congregation: passing of members, loss of pastor and loss of band leader. Peppler read statement regarding the last aspect. Peppler brought up continuity on leadership and discussed the way to ensure leadership and experience remains on Council despite change in term lengths. Downes praised the change in when Council members are elected.

Peppler then reinforced that LMC is continuing to grow, not just in numbers but in spiritual and emotional growth and that LMC will not stop growing. Peppler also introduced the concept of radical hospitality, communication changes, building renovation and the formation of the call team.

Pastor's Comments – Pr. Martha Halls delivered comments on her time at LMC and what she sees coming for the next year.

Capital Campaign Update – Jay Kapp discussed the past year in the Capital Campaign and what will happen in the next year. He said that pledges are at \$530,490 from over 93 families and 153 individuals. He also brought up Tim Klein's gift to the campaign to renovate the gym. The campaign will continue, as well, as it is a three-year initiative.

Investment Team Update – Alphonse Gray delivered remarks on the team, how the year started out great, like most portfolios. He said the end of the year turned downward as the overall market also turned downward. The portfolio is diversified to protect the principle while also enabling some growth. But the portfolio was about flat. Going forward in 2016 will be more difficult with the idea to transfer stocks to safer grounds for the coming year. Gray also said the team will seek help from the ELCA Investment Fund. Wegat Fund is required to keep the principle protected at all times. The plan is to switch the fund from a money market to a CD and investment bonds to see principle actually grow.

Audrey Downes and Mike Dixon introduced the nominees for the team. Kevin Massey and Dan Kapzinski. Marcia Mawe moved to vote by voice the slate of nominees. Toietta Dixon seconded. Voice approval.

Treasurer's report and budget presentation — Ben Dieterich discussed the previous year's spending and revenue. He highlighted the budget was in the black. Dieterich also brought up the bequests from the past year: (Need names). He also presented the proposed budget for the coming year. Highlighted the increase in operating budget and the confidence in the church meeting that increase. Mentioned the capital budget decreased because all major projects of building coming from Capital Campaign or already spent. Christopher Haite questioned if additional expenses are needed for a new pastor. Dieterich said those costs are automatically built in. Susan Barretta asked if property insurance will be increasing every year. Dieterich said

the team will be looking at how to reduce the expense in the coming year. Margaret H. asked if other staff will have benefits outside of the staff. Dieterich said there are benefits for staff.

Approval of the 2016 budget – Joe Jensen moved to approve budget. Bates Larson seconded. Approved by voice acclamation.

Recognizing outgoing council member Linda Khoury – Diane Betten thanked Khoury for her work on the Council, the mission and vision team, capital campaign, WELCA, and the small group leadership.

Christian Kern introduced Jeff Conway as the nominee for the open Council position. Move to approve Conway to council by voice approval by J, seconded by Christopher Haite. Voice approved.

Congregational Treasurer's election – Ben Dieterich nominated to Treasurer by Christopher Haite. Christian Kern seconded. Voice acclamation.

Old Business:

Update on Kitchen construction – Peppler said the design planning and acquisition of appliances, work with ComEd and other necessary moves has commenced. A meeting to detail the update with a final plan for review will be held.

New Business - None.

Point of Order: Dixie Downed reminded the congregation about the chili cook-off.

Closing prayer and Doxology – Christine Shaw delivered closing prayer

Congregational meeting of LMC June 26, 2016 Meeting begins at 10:10am

- 1. Peppler opens with prayer
- 2. Acknowledgement of quorum
- 3. Clarify budget procedural items Peppler discussed roof issues in the sanctuary, discussed the need to repair the roof to maintain for 50-75 years. Discussed the place the church is at regarding capital campaign projects.
 - a. Property team discussed roof repairs. Ron meadows discussed the need to avoid band aid work and actually fix the roof.
 - b. Diane Schulte asked if the repair would solve some of the storm flooding problems. Answer was no because it is a different roof and a separate challenge.
 - c. Audrey Downes asked about the price regarding the fix. Proposals came in at \$69k and \$59k. Third proposal dropped because of lack of scope understanding.
 - d. Joe Jensen asked about scaffolding. It is outside of scope.
 - e. Dan Hunt asked about studying a way to divert the drain to handle the storm water overflow. The capital campaign is not finished and clarified that the work outside of kitchen and roof can be done in the campaign if the funds are raised.
 - f. Toietta Dixon asked what is the ask. Peppler responded for \$69k to fix the roof.
 - Peppler explained the predicament council has been discussing about where the funds would come from. Property team advocated for using capital campaign funds. Council was split on the method.
 - ii. Melissa Busch asked what the financial reserves are for. Ben Dieterich answered.
 - iii. Pr Martha Halls asked what the long term reserves are for.
 - iv. Chris Haite asked if we can transfer funds down the road.
 - v. Jesse Lava asked what would be knocked off the goal list if the roof is capital campaign.
 - g. Kern moved to release funds of \$69k from capital campaign for roof repairs. Toietta Dixon seconded. Jensen amended 10 percent added. Kern agreed. Ayes had it on voice vote.
- 4. Peppler introduced building use and child safety policies
- 5. Kapp and Heather Vandenburg discussed building use policy.
 - a. Downes, Jensen and Busch asked about clarification on the building use policy. Kapp announced detailed discussions will be held in August for both policies.
- 6. Shimko presented child safety policy.

Annual Report of Luther Memorial Church Pastor's Report



The guys in my family got ties for Christmas. That is not unusual, they all like wearing ties. What is interesting, is that the tie company sent little red tags with each purchase. The tag said: *Work hard and be excellent to each other*.

Accomplishing projects, especially in partnership with others and having fun while doing the work is satisfying. The difficulty comes when the work or project becomes a competition or a battle ground and the project becomes more important than the people involved. Projects in the church (and everywhere else!) are never more important than the people God puts in our lives.

LMC has been working on numerous projects in the last year. Some of those projects have been in the works for years while others have just begun as God calls this community of faith to new places. Either way, it's hard to be patient because we want the work to be done. We want the chaos to go away and we want life to return to normal. What we may not realize or refuse to admit, is that there really is no "normal." There has always been and there will always be, some big new project, burning issue, challenging idea, or changing economic or social situation facing the church. There will always be work for us to do that will involve getting messy, making hard choices, being challenged and changed by new ideas or people, and living with uncertainty and chaos. Perhaps what we need to hope and pray for in the midst of this work is that God will help us to work hard and be excellent to each other.

As fine as that motto is, it isn't good news. It won't bring peace. It won't repair broken relationships. It won't heal broken hearts. It won't soften hardened hearts. It won't take back ugly or false words spoken in anger and impatience. It won't change who we are. Only God can do that in Christ. "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation" 2 Corinthians 5:17-18 (NRSV). We are a new creation in Christ! We get another opportunity to work hard, be excellent to each other and forgive each other as Christ has forgiven us. It is actually quite a privilege to get messy, make hard choices, be challenged and changed, to live with uncertainty and chaos in this community of faith.

Here are some things that we have been working on together that may not have been mentioned in other reports. Some of them have been accomplished, some may still be a bit chaotic, messy, and challenging, but we are learning and growing together:

1. Eucharistic Ministers meet every other month to share concerns and support each other. Their ministry is to bring Holy Communion and friendship to those members of our congregation who are not able to get to worship. Diane Betten, Diane Schulte, Audrey Downs, Dixie Downs, Laurie Nelson, Margarete Gergen, Linda Miranda, Jan Arnett, Linda Khoury are presently serving as Eucharistic Ministers.

- **2. Reformation 500** a planning team Linda Khoury, Wayne Busch, Kelly Weiss, Bill Phelps, Deaconess Claire Schoepp and others will brainstorm ideas about how LMC will celebrate this milestone in 2017. Your ideas may be submitted to any of these team members.
- **3. Window's Sunday November 13, 2016** Dieter Schulte, Karl Raack, John Albrecht and Heather Vanderberg worked on a celebration that gave thanks to God for 50 years of worship under the stained glass windows in the sanctuary, honored artist Richard R. Caemmerer, the more senior members of LMC and Pastor Emeritus David Miller celebrating 60 years of ordination. Members of LMC are encouraged to take a Windows book. If multiple copies are desired, please talk to Dieter Schulte about a small donation.
- 4. Conversation about how to support Briana and Gigi and discuss feelings and concerns about Briana's arrest were held this fall. The group (25 + people) has decided to meet regularly to learn about prison ministry, support each other, find ways to support Briana and her family, address issues related to helping survivors of sexual abuse, talking to our children about abuse and devising a plan that can be activated when members or staff of LMC face crisis situations (please see #5 below).
- **5. S.O.S. Plan this name may be changed -** Jenny Araujo, Rob Klein and Rebecca Heneghan are the beginnings of this team. This plan will help the congregation show genuine care and concern for people in crisis as part of our everyday call as the baptized people of God. Supporting does not mean accepting responsibility or liability. It does mean exhibiting compassion and providing support. This plan will be part of a larger plan for responding to a disaster. If you are interested in serving on the disaster plan team, contact members listed above. There is a detailed resource from the ELCA that will be used to guide this larger plan and process.

Finally, I hope you will join me in showing appreciation for and saying "thank you" to your staff. Below you will find a few reasons to do so, besides the fact that they are actually doing their jobs. In the past year, every member of the staff has:

- spoken of their work at LMC as something that they feel called to do
- worked more hours than they get paid for
- filled in for other staff members when needed
- asked if help was needed before leaving for the day
- asked for help when they need it
- expressed love and appreciation for the congregation
- apologized when appropriate
- responded to criticism and unkindness with grace
- gone out of their way to do (many!) things that are not on their job descriptions
- politely let people know what is not their job thus keeping good boundaries
- trusted each other enough to be vulnerable
- laughed at themselves and with others
- changed personal plans to be at LMC for something important
- expressed concern about individuals in the congregation
- taken time for rest, refreshment and learning
- worked to improve communication with leadership and the congregation
- worked hard to do their job well

- eagerly shared their thoughts and ideas
- lived the good news of Jesus through their words and compassionate actions

Administration Report



Putting a year of church administration into a single report reminds me a bit of what it was like to be a stay-at-home mom and field the question, "What did you do all day?" Each day is full to the absolute brim and, yet, it can be hard to put each day into concrete terms. Looking back over 2016, this report is a small snapshot of the administration of LMC.

LMC By the Numbers

As the primary record-keeper for LMC, the office maintains the written church register as well as the Shepherd's Staff church management database. We have participated in several webinar training sessions in 2016 to optimize our use of the Membership functions in Shepherd's Staff for record-keeping in addition to tracking contributions and financials (tasks handled by bookkeeper Amy Karp). Some numbers:

Building Use

This year saw the adoption of a consistent, streamlined Building Use Policy. Under the new policy, we offer our space to outside community groups and nonprofits at a very low rate. As such, our building is active throughout the week. The building is also available at low rates to members for private functions.

2017 will present a challenge as we accommodate construction throughout many of the highly-used areas of our building, but we are actively planning ways to offer alternative spaces and minimize disruptions so that our building can continue to be a blessing to our wider community.

Weekly Communications

Following on the communications audit conducted in 2015, we started some large-scale communications initiatives including, most notably, a branding project and a complete overhaul of our

LMC website. More details on those projects can be found in the Communications Team report in this packet. This report focuses on regular, weekly LMC communications.

Electronic Newsletters

- What's Up Wednesday is the weekly update from our Child, Youth, and Family Team published on Wednesdays. It highlights our Child, Youth, and Family Ministry programs, news of interest to families, and One Stop Wednesday Activities.
 - The design of this newsletter was completely overhauled this summer with an aim towards being more visually appealing as well as eliminating repeat information.
- **News and Notes** is our church-wide newsletter. Published on Fridays, News and Notes highlights activities and information within our own church as well as news from the ELCA and community organizations of interest. Tweaks this year include:
 - Addition of links to upcoming scripture for Sunday Services
 - Creation of a Child, Youth, and Family section that highlights one or two family-focused events and links to the current What's Up Wednesday newsletter for more program info.
 - Creation of a Community News and Partner Organization section to better highlight non-LMC programs of interest.
- Look for updates to the look and feel of both newsletters as part of our branding process.

Bulletin and Worship Announcements

Did you know that we print 100 worship bulletins per 9:00 a.m. service; 75 bulletins per 11:00 a.m. service, and ~175 bulletins for a combined service? There is a minimum of one page of announcements for each bulletin and that announcement page is revised and updated every week (the announcements for the 9 and 11 services are identical when space permits). Pastor Martha makes 2-5 verbal announcements per worship service. That means:

- We published at least one unique page of news and event announcements in ~9,450 bulletins
- Pastor Martha made ~360 verbal announcements highlighting news and programs of interest

Facebook

- In 2016, we published 416 posts on the Luther Memorial Church of Chicago page. That's an average of 8 posts per week.
- We converted the Members of Luther Memorial Church to a closed group to allow members to share private information (e.g. contact information or personal details) more securely. To be added to this group, you must be approved by an administrator. Criteria for membership in the group is membership at LMC.

- Financial Peace University: Twice in 2016, Dan Kopczynski led this 9-week series that helps participants learn how to get rid of debt, manage money, and spend and save wisely God's way.



Adult Enrichment Survey

In the fall of 2016, 33 individuals responded to an electronic and paper survey seeking information about the congregation's interest in Adult Enrichment. Some respondents have been connected with opportunities related to their interests. However, additional opportunities are still in need of creation. More than a third of respondents expressed interest in a small group that would meet on Monday, Tuesday, or Thursday evenings on a short term (4–8 weeks), short term with option to continue, or seasonal basis. Nearly two-thirds of respondents expressed some interest in Bible study, adult education, or small groups that meet on Sundays between services. A few respondents expressed interest in an early morning weekday group. Specific topics of interest included marriage/relationships, aging, forgiveness, current events, LGBTQ+, women's spirituality, parenting, living like Jesus, writings of Bonhoeffer, and Bible study generally.

Looking Ahead

Sunday Series: Beginning Sunday morning, January 29, 2017, you are invited to participate in "Faith, Sexism and Justice: Conversations Toward a Social Statement." Led by diverse members of the LMC community, the study uses seven modules to explore questions surrounding issues of faith and justice as they relate to sexism. Some questions include: Why do we need to talk about women and justice together? Why do images and words for God matter? This is both an opportunity to learn and to have your voice heard as the ELCA works toward a Social Statement.

Lent 2017: Resources and devotional materials will be made available, and small groups will be formed based upon interest.

LMC Devotional Book: Plans are underway to create the next LMC devotional book to guide us when we enter Ordinary Time following Pentecost. A call for authors will go out at the beginning of Lent and volunteers will be sought to lead summer discussion groups, including a virtual group, if feasible.


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Child and Family Ministries Report

Update:

In 2016, the Communications Team focused on ways to enhance and streamline communications and outreach to LMC members and the surrounding community. Building on the insights and recommendations provided as an output of the communications audit conducted by Kairos and Associates in late 2015, the communications team concentrated on two main initiatives:

- 1) Updating the Luther Memorial Church Brand
- 2) Updating the LMC website

To address the branding initiative, the communications team conducted an RFP over the summer and reviewed proposals from three design agencies. Scout Design, an agency located in Ravenswood was chosen based on their portfolio & design strength, proximity to LMC and overall professionalism.

In the late fall, Scout Design presented three distinct brand identities and designs for review. The communications team, with approval from the council, chose a design that leverages the façade of LMC as its inspiration. It evokes and a modern, urban, approachable and welcoming spiritual community.

The website project proved to be a bit more complicated. In the fall, LMC suffered a catastrophic crash of our website which resulted in the loss of all of our website information. The crash occurred at the same time that we were exploring options for updating our website and associated technology. The team was faced with two choices, rebuild on our existing technology or embark in a new direction that would better serve the congregation and our communications needs into the future. The decision was made to move forward with a new website built on a new platform.

The communications team, with input from the technology team, reviewed a number of cloud based solutions and decided to move forward with a Concordia Technologies Church360 Unite, a cloud-based website platform. The solution offers a number advantages that will allow LMC to better manage and update our website. It also integrates directly with Shepard Staff, our CRM system.

We are currently in the process of rolling out the new website and new brand identity. You should see some exciting changes in the coming weeks.

2016 LMC Investment Team Report

The returns of the Wegat fund and the main endowment portfolio were positive in 2016 as the stock and bond markets had gains during the year. The endowment portfolio currently is diversified between stocks, bonds and low-cost mutual funds.

The Wegat fund totaled \$142,000 at year-end and remains in a savings account. In early 2017, the plan is to move the Wegat Fund to a bond ladder portfolio via our Vanguard account as the goal is to grow the fund and use the interest gained over the course of each year for church mission. The endowment portfolio totals approximately \$189,602.47 as of year-end. The investment team plans on transferring \$125,000 to the ELCA Foundation in January 2017, which is a prudently managed portfolio offered through a church wide affiliated organization that assigns assets across a number of well-known institutional money managers.

Highlights of 2016 include:

- Establishing an investment policy statement that offers a broad guide to how the assets in the portfolios are managed and how decisions are made by the investment team.
- We are able to accept donations of stock through our current Vanguard account and have received 3 transactions in 2016 that were sold and transferred to cash at the Bridgeview Bank account and applied to the Capital Campaign and LMC Operating Fund.
- Welcomed Kevin Massey and Dan Kopczynksi to the investment team!

Goals for 2017


- Create a prudently managed bond ladder portfolio for the Wegat Fund, investing in investment-grade bonds.

Property and Build Team Report

The combined property, kitchen renovation and capital build teams have been busy working with architect Paul Tebben and consultant Dan Ruzic to of Chicago Project Management to design and gather bids for capital improvements and renovation of our old building.

- "As is" building plans and preliminary drawings of an elevator location were completed to ensure that as we move forward in renovating our building we are planning long term so that we will not have to undo newly renovated areas as we work towards our goal of installing an elevator.
- New light fixtures and electrical wiring was completed on the main stairway in the education wing.
- In June, the congregation approved money to repair the roof above the sanctuary. Those repairs along with repair of some deteriorated masonry on the parapets were completed in December.
- New 100 AMP Commercial Sub Panel for the west building were installed by the back door eliminating multiple non-code compliant junction boxes.
- Two new ejector pumps were installed on the main pit and new control panel installed.
- Kitchen designs were completed and Mizener Construction was selected as the general contractor for the renovation. Demolition will begin the first week of February with an estimated project completion by May.

In the coming year, the following projects are on the docket for completion, the team is dubbing "Big, Messy Summer of 2017" as a time when much renovation will be taking place.

- Asbestos removal and new flooring on the third-floor Sunday School space
- New flooring in the basement rooms
- Installation of drop ceiling throughout basement hall, nursery and large meeting room
- Renovation of fellowship hall
- Tuck pointing on the west wall of the education building
- Continued replacement of electrical panels and upgrade of wiring

Annual Report of Luther Memorial Church Stewardship Team Report



In 2016, the Stewardship Team focused on the following efforts:

Bequest Recognition:

Bequest Recognition Sunday was held on All Saints Sunday, November 6. 2016. This event recognized bequests and larger "in memory" gifts received by LMC since 2008. A bulletin insert was created with the bios of 9 families and individuals who generously remembered LMC, and a special liturgy was included during Sunday service. The intent is to hold such recognition events on a more regular basis going forward.

Annual Pledge Campaign:

The Annual pledge campaign was held in November, culminating in Pledge Sunday on November 13, 2016. The Stewardship Team developed updated pledge cards and an appeal letter that was sent to all member households. Stewardship members shared mission moments during Sunday services and a combination of reminder phone calls and emails were completed on the Friday and Saturday before Pledge Sunday. As of December 9, 2016, \$173,731 has been pledged to LMC for 2017 from 47 households.

Miracle Sunday:

The Stewardship Team coordinated and implemented "Miracle Sunday" on Sunday, December 11, 2016. In particular, LMC members were asked to consider an additional gift to help address the projected year-end budget gap of approximately \$28,000. LMC received a dollar-for-dollar matching gift of up to \$15,000 from an anonymous donor. The Stewardship Team promoted Miracle Sunday through News & Notes, Sunday worship bulletins, and worship announcements. As of this writing, 67 households gave \$25,277 — when combined with the match, the current Miracle Sunday total is \$40,277. A heart-felt "thank you" to everyone that contributed to making this "Miracle" happen.

Gifts of Time and Talent:

The Stewardship Team held **Volunteer Recognition** Sunday on April 10, 2016 in conjunction with National Volunteer Week (coordinated by team member Rachel Lauber). As a part of such celebration, LMC members were asked to stand in recognition of the many ways they give their time and talent at LMC, in our community, and across Chicago, the country and the world. LMC members wore name tags during Sunday services listing their volunteer roles/activities at LMC. The Stewardship Team hosted a volunteer recognition reception during fellowship hour. Volunteer team leads were informed and given the opportunity to also thank their volunteers in some way during the week.

- Sunday School teachers were thanked in May, 2016, with corsages, Starbucks gift cards, and thank-you cards handmade by students.
- The Stewardship Team has been actively discussing ways to help new members feel more connected to LMC and to make it easier for new members to get involved at LMC. As part of such effort, Team member Bates Larson developed a new member packet, which was distributed

during the Spring 2016 Great Conversation that included information on Luther Memorial, contact information for volunteer program/ministry leads, etc.

Recognition: If anyone was inadvertently omitted from any of the efforts described below, the Stewardship Team sincerely apologizes. Please let us know so that any oversight can be corrected in the future.

- Hand-written thank-you notes were sent to everyone who gave in 2015 and didn't get a Thank You note with respect to a separate pledge/donation made to the Capital Campaign;
- A typed letter was sent out with tax receipts to everyone who had done any of the following in 2015: i) pledged and/or gave to LMC in 2015; ii) made a Capital Campaign pledge or gift (confirming the pledged amount with a reminder to set-up online giving, if necessary); and iii) volunteered at or through LMC in 2015;
- Mid-year update letters were sent to all households in July. Such letters set forth year to date giving (both pledged and unpledged); the amount of one's 2016 pledge if applicable and the total amount of capital campaign giving (both pledged and unpledged) if applicable.

The Stewardship team also prepared a 2015 Narrative Budge update for the Congregational Meeting held in January, 2016.

2017: In addition to continuing many of the efforts described above, the Stewardship Team is also focused on several new initiatives in 2017.

- <u>Volunteer Management</u>: The Team (led by Bates Larson and Melissa Busch) has been coordinating with Heather Vanderberg in an effort to develop a framework for better identification, use and management of volunteers. The goal is to update member data in Shepherd's Staff (a database used by LMC to manage membership) in an effort to develop tools to better recruit and manage volunteers.
- <u>Year-Round Stewardship</u>: This is an exciting new initiative. Using a model and framework from ELCA (*Stewards of God's Love*), the Stewardship Team has developed a plan for year-round stewardship, which will begin in January 2017 as follows:

Q1 (Jan., Feb., March): Stewards of the Story (led by Justin Bush and Brian Myers)

Q2 (Apr., May, June): Stewards of Time (led by Tim Klein and Bates Larson)

Q3 (July, Aug., Sep.): Stewards of Local and Global Communities (led by Rachel Lauber and Kevin Massey)

Q4 (Oct., Nov., Dec.): Annual Financial Response (led by Melissa Busch and Jay Kapp)

Youth and Young Adult Ministries Report



Youth Group:

- High School Youth Group has been conversationally focused on the issues that the youth are facing and living in, while being guided by Don Erickson and Dave Goss to see and be signs of God in those issues
- Attendance has been variable but strong for both High School and Combined Youth Group
 - High School attendance varies from 4-8 youth per Wednesday night with friends of our high schoolers attending often
 - Combined Youth Group nights are very strong with 12-18 youth attending on Wednesday night that we have together each month
- Dave Goss has been a volunteer in the Youth Group for Wednesday nights and Sunday morning, aiding with conversation and encouragement.
- Trampoline Park Night for Middle and High School on 10/7/16 saw 9 youth attending with the help of several parents for transportation
- Ultimate Lock-in for Middle and High School on 11/4/16 saw 8 youth attending with the help of Christine Shaw for transportation
- Youth Group Christmas Party for Middle and High School on 12/21/16 saw 18 youth attending for a White Elephant Christmas Exchange and a Christmas Card project.

Sunday Morning Equip:

- SME has been struggling in attendance, which makes the training difficult to provide. The High School youth, save for a few select, are not accustomed to coming to Sunday service and staying for programming. This has caused only 1-2 High School youth to be present for SME and it has not been uncommon to not have any present on Sundays.
- Going into the New Year, Don's focus will be more about encouraging the High School youth to attend service on Sundays and participating before or after the services. If they are receptive to attending, we will continue the SME program where it has left off.
- Going forward being flexible to the response of the youth will allow the Director of Youth and Family Ministries to evaluate and adjust programming to concentrate efforts on building the program and being as effective as possible.

Young Adult:

• The young adult group has met once every month, each time for a shared meal and conversation about each other's lives. Going forward, we are planning to have an event combined with the Youth Group and focus on meditation in the Spring.

Looking forward:

- High School Service Trip is July 16-21, 2017 at Camp Amnicon's River Clean-up Trip in Northern Wisconsin. More information about this trip is available in the Youth and Family Update.
