



From Pastor Lindsay

Dear people of LMC,

Last fall, 65 church members responded to the congregational invitation to begin a discussion around our mission statement and values. We met one evening to discuss: Who are we as a congregation? What do we care about? Where are we headed?

There is a part in the story of Noah and the flood where, after 40 days of rain, the ark drifts until finally it grinds to a halt on the top of a mountain. There it sits, awkwardly stuck. Over time, the waters recede, and eventually all the people and animals make their way out. While I'm sure all creatures were glad to be with their feet planted back on the earth, instead of the familiar world they left, before them is a vast, muddy landscape of unfamiliar territory, and they have to figure out what to do. They step out of the ark.

LMC is making our way out into a world that feels different. The difference is due to many factors. Obviously, COVID changed things. But the change reaches beyond COVID. Over the last 15 years, LMC has watched the neighborhood change, and the church has been home to 5 pastors and a number of varied staff. Members have left and joined. And beyond this, our world is changing. For many families, it feels like life is speeding up. Society is edgy and unsettled. Houses of faith, including churches, hold a less prominent place in our communities today compared to past decades. COVID accelerated a change that was years in the making and many people have left or are drifting away from the church. sometimes permanently. It's disorienting and even upsetting for some. It's also energizing and hopeful for others because we've stepped out of that ark into a new and different landscape full of possibilities.

In our fall conversations around mission and values, several themes bubbled up that we will dig into in the upcoming year. The throughlines around our emerging values won't be a surprise to anyone. As a congregation, we cherish relationships, we also care about participating in a church that is relevant to our daily lives, which means we are curious. We are also faithful, humble enough not to completely understand this mystery of God but brave enough to trust God's promise. We will continue to be a place where people encounter God, particularly people who are seeking and unsure. We will also be a church where people are challenged to grow and are transformed, for this is how God transforms our world.

We begin 2023 with an energetic council, motivated staff and our hearts hopeful. We know God's mysterious spirit surrounds, guides and sustains us. Be on the lookout for opportunities to connect for discussion around our emerging core values and imagining what could be.

On my good days and bad, I find God in you all and am thankful. In a year that was personally challenging for me and my family for several reasons, I give thanks for your encouragement, participation, accompaniment and

imagination. I'm thankful to our church council for their presence, support and skill at catching the curveballs that this unusual season has thrown. I'm ever grateful to our faithful and talented staff and contractors for their dedication, creativity and flexibility particularly Jared Beverly, Christopher Drummond, Melissa Ferguson, Bernadette Haugen, Iris Kean, Nichole Martinez, Liza Micelli, Russell Angelico, Kal-El Parra, Sandra Sanchez, and Sarah Swagler.

Many thanks to our team of dedicated, resilient cantors, singers, and musicians who offered their ministry of music to lead congregational song in online and in-person worship during a year touched by the pandemic and constant change.

Congregational Music for the 9am Service

For 2022, worship continued to incorporate an expansive array of musical resources that represented a generous swath of human experience. Thus, in addition to the red hymnal, *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, we sang new texts from the ELCA hymnal *All Creation Sings*, spirituals and gospel music from the ELCA African-American hymnal *This Far by Faith*, chants from the communities of Taizé and Iona, as well as psalmody and hymnody from our ecumenical and interreligious partners.



LMC Band

The LMC Band continues to bring an eclectic mix of pop, contemplative, hymns, and even some rock into our worship.

In August, the LMC band said goodbye to Liza Micelli as she left for grad school. Throughout the fall, the band was volunteer led with some occasional support from professional musicians.

In December, LMC hired Russell Angelico to lead the band and the ministry finished the 2022 year with renewed energy and enthusiasm for the year to come!

Meeting in Person



It turns out that experiencing God's presence in community and in our relationships has been good for us.




