FROM PASTOR LINDSAY

Dear people of LMC,

Each year, our congregational meeting falls during the season of Epiphany. In the beloved Epiphany Bible story, the Magi, those mysterious ones from a faraway land, travel to Bethlehem to visit the baby Jesus. They travel for months guided by a bright star shining in the east that drew them to the Holy Family. In Bethlehem, they run right into Jesus, the Word made flesh in a roly-poly child. The Magi bow down and worship the Savior of the World. After they leave their gifts, the story tells, they head home by another road. Something in them has shifted.

The Magi initially started a new journey unsure of where it would lead them. Our church life has changed slightly since the COVID-19 pandemic. Since the pandemic, we've seen turnover in membership and an energetic new burst of families with very young children. Attendance patterns in church have shifted. However, we still began 2023 on a pretty familiar path of church life. We hired Russel Angelico to lead our band. For the first time in several years, we had a full staff. Both Deacon Sarah and Christopher served as formal interns which made for extra staff support, particularly in pastoral care in the first half of the year. Slowly, our music and children's ministries began to gain more stability and we journeyed forward.

After the Magi journeyed for some time, they arrived in Bethlehem where they found they baby Jesus, God incarnate in their midst. Holding that baby, bowing before him, and feeling his weight and warmth in their arms seems to have shifted something in them. In the spring of 2023, an influx of South American migrants began arriving in Chicago. I had grown both concerned and curious about what was happening, and shortly before I left for sabbatical, I reached out to some key church leaders to explore if there was a way to get involved. Eventually, LMC gave posada (or shelter) to four Venezuelan families. As LMC members began to meet these newcomers, Jesus awakened us to something holy. We felt the warmth of the people before us. We felt the weight of another's hand in a handshake. We sat and shared real food together. Meanwhile, we continued to see dozens of migrants throughout the city. We had run into Emmanuel, God-with-us, the Word made flesh, in a powerful and unexpected way, and something in us started shifting.

After the Magi met Jesus, the Savior of the world, they returned home by another way. They didn't return on the familiar path, for they were ever so slightly different. When I

returned from my sabbatical, I felt the positive energy of change in the congregation. We voted to call Deacon Sarah to serve as a Minister of Word and Service. We dug into church life. We have slowly woven our social justice ministry with migrants into our work. Dozens of new community members who may not have regularly attended worship volunteered with and donated to the church. As we go forward, something in us is slightly different. We still value community. We still honor questions and doubt. But we have embraced a new way we serve the people around us. We have embraced a new way of service towards each other.

This change makes sense. In the past few years, our world has felt unsettled and changed. The role of church in people's lives is changing, and the pandemic accelerated this change that had been decades in the making. Changes and shifts are expected and even necessary.

As we look forward, we will continue to deepen our sense of community with one another and strengthen our relationships. We do this through Wednesday night meals, small groups, and service opportunities. We are also curious about how younger generations are connecting to the church and will look to explore ways young people connect with God. Finally, we are committed to our service of the "least of these," particularly those who are most marginalized in our world. We will evaluate and tend to our social justice ministry as it evolves. God's purpose for LMC continues to unfold, and we look towards the future with excitement and anticipation.

Finally, I am deeply grateful to you all for the gift of my summer sabbatical. I didn't anticipate that a period of rest and slowness over the summer would have such a positive impact on me. It did. Thank you! I'm grateful to the way you all supported the work of the church in my absence this summer. Many thanks to the volunteers who provided leadership such as the Church Council and Pastors Kevin Massey and Phil Hirsch in their care for our weekly worship. I'm ever grateful to our faithful and talented staff and contractors for their dedication, creativity, and flexibility. Our staff picked up more work in my absence over the summer, and the congregation is steadier for their faithful service. Thank you to Russell Angelico, Jared Beverly, Christopher Drummond, Melissa Ferguson, Iris Kean, Kal-El Parra, Sandra Sanchez, and Deacon Sarah Swagler.



Our Holy Week worship included both somber reflection and joy as we remembered the old stories of our tradition together with that sacred story of Christ's death and resurrection.


We thoughtfully celebrated unique services such as Pride and Juneteenth.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

hildren are an incredible and vibrant part of LMC's community, and our Sunday School continues to grow. February 2023 saw the return of a Communion Class in which 8 children grades 1-4 learned about why the Eucharist is so important to our faith. In fall 2023, we welcomed new teachers Alison and Jack Blaser to the Pre-K/3- and 4-year-old classroom. This class tends to be our largest with an average of 5–8 children each week with approximately 15-20 children throughout the Sunday School program each week! We were able to get creative with space and moved Sunday School from the 3rd floor to the 2nd floor. In addition, our annual Christmas Pageant saw approximately 40 children participate—including the children from our Venezuelan families!

























MUSIC

CHOIR

mprovising our way through a "new normal" of how to be church, characterized by flexibility and creativity: the choir actually grew in 2023 to around 18 singers, with an average Sunday attendance of around 8 to 10. More importantly—whether a trained singer, or a novice singer with growing abilities and confidence: we enjoyed coming together to make music.



CONGREGATIONAL MUSIC FOR THE 9AM SERVICE

or 2023, worship continued to incorporate an expansive array of musical that included multiple ELCA and ecumenical hymn and service music resources. We also dusted off some of our wonderful Lutheran chorales, rich in rhythmic interest and formative, accessible theology. Worship music was further enhanced by vocal and instrumental soloists, choral motets and part singing of hymns by the choir, and leadership provided by our cantors. "Christmas in September," Holy Week, Christmastide and other combined services during the summer allowed more collaborations between the 9am choir and the singers and musicians of the praise band.







LMC BAND

MC boasts a unique contemporary music program; one where dozens of musicians (yes, dozens—as many as 36) volunteer their talents and lead our 11am services, creating original arrangements out of traditional hymns and acclaimed popular music. Our band members rotate each week based on availability and repertoire and deliver not just "songs" but "arcs" within each service.

During the summer as well as on holidays, the band collaborated with the organ- and choir-led program to produce a fusion of musical expressions, apt for both members and visitors that came to worship.







In 2023, we said goodbye to our longstanding 5-foot baby grand piano, and with heartfelt thanks to our generous donors and coordinators, we welcomed a revitalized 1970 Yamaha C7 grand piano into our building. We also reworked the band corner in the sanctuary, so that every musician can plug in seamlessly. We look forward to growing our technical and creative capabilities with all these tools at our disposal!





Additionally, band director Russell Angelico assisted our paid teen helpers in livestreaming nearly every 9am service all year. This includes online recordings saved to LMC's YouTube page, available for all to reference and enjoy into the future. We see this effort evolving in its scope, so that more worshipers both within and outside our community can engage our online portals to experience what LMC has to offer.

It deserves mentioning that this program, along with LMC's traditional music, brings in new members all the time. Why? Music, and what it offers on a personal level, is a bridge from isolation into community. On this note, LMC's band is a group that welcomes participants of all levels and interests, and we look forward to growing even more, as those that seek to participate in this way join our community. We hosted several block parties in connection with worship, which consistently involve community members. On Easter Sunday, we hosted an outdoor party after church with refreshments and a bounce house.





In June, we celebrated Juneteenth with a block party, complete with vendors from Black-owned businesses, a delicious spread of food, activities for families, and readings.

LMC also brought a group together to participate in the Chicago Pride parade with the Chicago Coalition of Welcoming Churches. On March 4, 2023, LMC completed 19 years as a Reconciling in Christ congregation.

To start off the program year, we hosted a Rally Day party complete with an outdoor worship service, a robust potluck, and even a petting zoo!





In the fall, we again hosted a canned good drive in connection with our Trunk or Treat block party and welcomed a number of community members who came to trick or treat and participate in activities.





The colder months provided opportunities to connect and deepen our relationships. We expanded the Wednesday meals to twice a month and welcomed everyone for soup suppers during both Lent and Advent prior to evening vespers. During the Thanksgiving season, we hosted our annual Pre-Thanksgiving Meal, a fundraiser for the Friendship Center. Later, we packed the Fellowship Hall before our Christmas Pageant with family and friends for a homecooked Venezuelan meal, and many members gave gifts for Concordia Place Wishing Stars.

Throughout the year, our Free Little Pantry on the corner provided a place to share and receive food.

Members' generous donations to LMC helped us support many community ministries, including the Friendship Center, the Night Ministry, the Chicago Metropolitan Synod, ELCA Disaster Relief, and Apna Ghar.

In addition, we opened our beautiful building to visitors for Chicago Open House, and we provided a free place to meet for our local AA group, Versiti blood drives, Boy Scout events, Chicago Babywearing, and Waters Elementary give-gifting organizers.









MIGRANT MINISTRY

ue to political turmoil resulting in socioeconomic and humanitarian collapse, there is a surge of Venezuelan migrants seeking asylum at the U.S./Mexico border. In 2023, over 30,000 migrants found their way to Chicago, a welcoming sanctuary city. Over the course of the last 12 months, migrants have spent weeks sleeping on sidewalks and in the lobbies of the district police stations, relying solely on the contributions and efforts of dedicated community volunteers.

Luther Memorial Church saw the need and answered the call to service and humility. In May of 2023, we took in 17 adults and children. Later that year, we helped to reunite family members and took in an additional five family members.
