Past LWML President Ida Mall encouraged her listeners during her keynote address Friday to "step out and step forward," as joyfully as a proud grandmother as we share Jesus' love with those around us. As Epiphany people, she reminded us to let the light of Christ shine through so that people may be drawn to Jesus and to know Him better. "God has work for us to do," she said, and by the Holy Spirit, we are equipped and ready, in words and actions to serve Him with joy and gladness. Ida provided ideas on how to engage and share with others, including through prayer, a Christian message given with a meal, or monetary tip, serving on a mission trip or as a VBS

or Sunday School teacher, or giving of your time, a smile and hug, or even a kind word. "Be alert! God will give you many chances," Ida chided, as she shared opportunities missed and how sharing Jesus can be a part of daily life. The "Key"— Jesus Christ Above All, engraved on our hearts, and the "Note"— God's Word, describing Why, When, Who and How Jesus is our Savior, are to be shared with everyone.



A Logo for 2017 and Beyond

Participants viewed a video explaining the meaning of our new logo. The heart represents the love and giving nature of God through His children. The drop symbolizes the blood of Christ or a tear of compassion. The cross above all else clearly shows purpose behind all that we do in the LWML.

Our prayer is that this design will get people to take a new look — or even a first look — at LMWL, Lutheran Women in Mission and will give our faithful members a sense that their organization is looking towards the future and ready for 75 more years of mission outreach.

TIMELESS MESSAGE OF THE GOSPEL

For the first of two studies at convention, Deaconess Betty shared colorful LWML history along with Bible study. First, she took us back to the beginning — 1946 — when LWML women were encouraged to make Bible study a focus at home and at conventions. Since then, Bible study has remained a constant at every LWML convention. Deaconess Betty also shared a story from 1967 when Rev. Oswald Hoffman was surprised that the women could break into small groups and discuss Bible passages. She lowered her voice to sound a little more like Dr. Hoffman and quoted him saying, "If the men on the convention floor ever tried to do that, it would result in a fist-fight!" Working in small groups, attendees discussed Paul's conversion experience. Then she encouraged everyone to get "real" and look seriously at what gets in our way of doing what we are called to do. She said, "The key element of Bible study keeps us focused on who we are and what we do. We keep Christ above all as we continue to "Serve the Lord with Gladness." Deaconess Betty closed by encouraging everyone "to find a quiet place ... and write your own personal mission statement."

STANDING IN THE GAP

Sanya Parson, Rebecca's Garden of Hope, energized the assembly with her enthusiasm as she thanked the LWML for the 2013-2015 Mission Grant of \$100,000. She encouraged us to "stand in the gap for those who do not have a voice." Through tutoring and teaching, Rebecca's Garden of Hope stands in the gap for children who may not have come to know Jesus. Since its beginning in 2011, over 200 young people and more than 50 parents have been baptized. LWML is part of that impact: seeing the need, caring for those disconnected from the church, and forwarding God's work.



GENERATIONS PROCLAIM CHRIST

The LWML 75th Anniversary banner was carried by Alice Decker, great-granddaughter of first LWML President Clara Schmitt, during the Friday morning procession. Also in attendance is Clara's great-great grandson! Alice shared, "It was so moving and overwhelming, getting to be part of all these people proclaiming Jesus Christ above all. It's also amazing to reflect on the influence one can have for Christ as years go on. Great-grandma would be so pleased with what God has done."



MISSION GRANTS REPRESENTED BY COUNTRY FLAGS

For 75 years the Lutheran Women's Missionary League has been supporting missions throughout the United States and the world with mission grants. To date, this support has grown to 71 different countries! All praise to God that many know Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior through these efforts. Let us celebrate with thanksgiving God's blessings for over 75 years. Since

the 2007 convention in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, we have been using country flags from Lutheran Hour Ministries (LHM) to represent these countries. However, LHM did not have flags for all the countries where LWML has funded mission grants. LWML has purchased the additional flags so all 71 countries are now represented.



2017 ALBUQUERQUE HOST COMMITTEE BADGE

The badge design for the 2017 LWML Convention is in the shape of a circle representing our unity as Lutheran Women in Mission. Within the circle are featured the beautiful mountains that exist in each of the four LWML hosting districts: Montana, Rocky Mountain, Utah-Idaho, and Wyoming. The mountains represent the place where Christ paid the price for our sins. Also on the badge design is "75th Anniversary," honoring the years LWML has served the Lord.
