President Patti: Engage, Encourage, Equip, and Enjoy

Starting with a laugh about standing at such a high podium, President Patti addressed the assembly with her report for the past two years.

"Engage, Encourage, Equip, and Enjoy" has been her personal theme because that's what she sees the LWML doing. "My e-butterfly serves to remind me that God's grace is over everything we do."

President Patti shared some of the ways the LWML has **engaged** the membership and the women of the church: increasing social media, hiring a marketing/communications manager in the office so the LWML message is consistent, designing a new logo, increasing the media presence of LWML, and adding an LWML app. "We tried to increase people's knowledge of LWML and that we are alive and well!"

She highlighted many ways LWML has **encouraged**: educating district presidents, adding news to the *Lutheran Woman's Quarterly*, and starting a blog.

New Bible studies, a new DVD Bible study, small devotional books, a future podcast, and online mission grant videos are just some of the ways the LWML is **equipping** women.

Mission Grant recipients have been equipped by the mite offerings. "All the Mission Grants have been paid," she said. "You have stepped out in faith to increase that funding in the coming two years!" She focused on ways that LWML is seeking cost-saving procedures to continue equipping mission workers.

"I've **enjoyed** the past two years, attending district conventions, riding on the Rose Parade float and representing all of you!"

She has also encouraged women to "enjoy their service, to serve the Lord with gladness, not glumness. We sometimes feel discouraged, especially if we are in a small group in a small congregation. That's why conventions such as this are so encouraging and uplifting."

The President closed by looking ahead. "God would not have kept us going for 75 years if He didn't think we were worth the trouble. I look forward to the future of LWML as we continue to proclaim Jesus Christ above all in all that we do. I invite you to enjoy the future with me!"

EXCITING TIMES TO BE CELEBRATING

Lutheran Hour Ministries President/CEO Kurt Buchholz presented President Patti Ross the Luther Seal from the Lutheran Hour float in the 2017 Rose Parade. The seal was made with cut yellow strawflower, black seaweed, cut red strawflower, powdered white rice, onion seed, blue stasis, and black beans. He said, "It is an exciting time as you are celebrating 75 years and we are celebrating 100 years to look back at what this combined effort has done but more importantly looking forward ... to what God will do through His people in bringing Christ to the nations and the nations to the church.



BUILDING PERSONAL RELATIONSHIPS

Personal relationships are key for reaching Jews in Israel, according to Steve Cohen of Apple of His Eye Ministries. As he spoke to the LWML in convention, he thanked the group for their vote of confidence and asked for prayers for the many Jews who have never considered Jesus as Messiah. It is important to find Israeli Christians and partner with them, provide missionary training, and offer opportunities such as the Special Ministry Program through our seminaries. He also announced that Rev. Dr. Robert and Kristi Roegner will be joining him and his wife, Nancy, in 2019. President Patti presented a \$100,000 check for this 2015-2017 Mission Grant to further God's work among the Jews in Israel.



GOD PLANTS MISSIONARIES AND GROWS FAITH

Rev. Kevin Robson, LCMS Chief Mission Officer, shared recent impacts of Mission Grants. "LWML has been right there ... for 75 years making a profound impact on the lives of multitudes."

Rebecca Schaff shared her work at the Lutheran Chapel, University of Minnesota, with domestic and international students. Students often turn to peers to understand faith. International students often turn to campus ministries to learn English and American culture. "We don't have to worry about if

people will be offended, for God's Word is the truth, and at the end of the day, that's what stands." Rebecca closed by speaking Galatians 1:3–5 in Chinese, then translating into English.

Chenhsi (Li) Hanson spoke about growing up Buddhist and its uncertainty. Had they done enough? She came to be a Christian through Concordia Middle School, ChiaYi, Taiwan. After her Baptism, her sister also came to faith. "Both my sister and I are very thankful that the Gospel's seed that has been sown on the campus to individuals has sprouted and has grown. It has been spread."

SATURDAY LUNCHEONS ENGAGE AND EQUIP!

APPLE OF HIS EYE REACHES HURTING PEOPLE Nancy Cohen is excited for Apple of His Eye Ministries to be the first RSO to host missionaries from the LCMS in Israel. She stressed that "people there are hurting and need our unconditional love" to a full ballroom at their luncheon Saturday. As the Great Commission sends us out into the world, it's our "obligation to the Jews to tell them about Jesus," she said. It's better to offend them by telling them about Jesus, Nancy shared, than to condemn them to hell by not sharing God's love with them. Nancy pleaded for our prayers for the strength to reach out to these people.

LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF (LWR)

In 2016 the LWR shipped \$13.3 million worth of quilts and kits throughout the world. Past LWML Presidents Gloria Edwards and Linda Reiser serve on the Board of Directors of LWR and shared with the lunch attendees the work and efforts of the organization. The LWR helps out in all types of disasters and is there to lend the helping hand.

EVERYONE IS A MISSIONARY

Rev. Kevin Robson, LCMS Chief Mission Officer, described about the mission work that has been going on here and abroad. Robson shared a video of the LCMS disaster response team in Perryville, MO. The team used the disaster response trailer provided by the LWML through a 2015–2017 mission grant. "It is a joy to help people in times of crisis," stated a member of the team. Robson noted that, "everyone is a missionary where God has planted us." Missionaries Rebecca Schaff and Rev. Carl Hanson also shared stories from the mission field.

DONNA PYLE: EQUIPPING TO SHARE

In spite of the sound system malfunctions, Donna Pyle engaged the 500+ audience as she shared her passion for studying and teaching God's Word. "We need to know **whose** we are — and who we are — to be ready to enter the mission field."

Bridges

"Crossing cultures by building bridges" is the message The Lutheran Hour speaker Rev. Dr. Gregory Seltz shared. He encouraged us to "be ourselves in Christ for others" that we may bring Christ's message of salvation to our neighbors far and near. Will you build a bridge?

VICAR TIM NORTON LCMS INDIAN MINISTRIES

The Navajo nation is one of the largest and most challenging mission fields in the United States. The majority of residents are non-Christian. There are no native leaders such as deacons or pastors. Mistrust of the "white man's religion," unique language barriers, poverty, hunger, abuse, and generational trauma are all challenges to receiving the message of the Gospel. The church provides a much-needed safe place for comfort, spiritually, and physically. The small town of Navajo, New Mexico, where Vicar Norton works, is on the largest Indian reservation in the United States. Vicar Norton and his family plan to stay when he is ordained at the end of August at Shepherd of the Hills, Navajo, New Mexico.

2017-2019 Grants Selected!

When the voting assembly was faced with a vote about the two Mission Grants that were tied, LWML Past President Jan Wendorf stepped up to the microphone and encouraged the assembly to consider increasing the mission goal to fully fund both. "We prayed before we voted. We asked for God's direction. I don't think it's any surprise that we have a tie at the end. I feel that God wants us to step forward and make

BIBLE STUDY #2: WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?

"What does God want the LWML to be doing in the next 75 years? What does God want each of us to be doing tomorrow?" asked Deaconess Betty Knapp at the start of Saturday's Bible study.

"From the very beginning, the word 'missionary' has been in our name!"

"Leaders left no doubt that the focus of the LWML was the word 'missionary' and not speeches, resolutions, or other aspects of faith and life." She highlighted seven women involved in outreach, including Mary Banta, known as Chinatown's Angel of Mercy and Martha Boss, a medical missionary to China and Hong Kong.

"But we aren't all called to serve on foreign soil as missionaries. For 99% percent of us, our response to God's call to go and serve won't be recorded in a book. Yet our response to God's call is not any less important. In fact, it is equally important. Because there are people whose lives intersect with ours, whose only experience with hearing the saving message of the Gospel may come through us."

In closing, she shared how the themes from each of the 37 conventions have told the LWML story, truly reflecting God's purpose in our lives.

INTERPRETER TO THE DEAF: THE SILENT GOSPEL

Former pastor for the deaf, and current missionary to Macau China, Rev. David S. Bush, along with freelance interpreter Lynda Nix, brought the liturgy to life for our hearing impaired LWML members at opening worship.

Nix was Bush's pupil 29 years ago and Bush, despite his busy schedule, was thrilled to sign for the convention when Nix asked him to partner with her.

Both interpreters stress the importance of having Lutherantrained interpreters for our churches since some theological jargon is difficult to interpret. As a result, some uniquely Lutheran concepts can be lost. For instance, when a service opens, the Lutheran interpreter refers to God by pointing up. Once the elements are consecrated, God is referred to by pointing to the bread and wine because Christ is truly present there.

Nix stated, "We are not just signing words, but communicating concepts. We have a blank canvas and paint a picture."

LWML Sets 2017-2019 Mission Goal at \$2.075 Million

ST. LOUIS, June 26, 2017 — The Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) welcomed 3,471 people with 850 as first timers to the LWML Convention in Albuquerque, New Mexico, June 22–25, 2017, under the theme "Jesus Christ Above All". The convention theme was based on Philippians 2:9.

Delegates to the 37th Biennial Convention of the LWML adopted a \$2,075,000 mission goal for the 2017-2019 biennium. This goal, by the grace of God, will fund 22 mission grants as men and women respond in prayer and offerings during the next two years. LWML chose to support the following mission grants, pledging their support with prayers and mites (offerings) given over the next biennium:
