



WOLFPACK LEADERSHIP DISCUSSION SCRIPT

Take a look at this picture of a pack of wolves out in the wilderness. You may be asking yourself, what can a pack of wolves teach me about leadership, and more importantly about being a Christian leader?

Well maybe quite a bit.

So – as you look at this picture – who is the leader?

(Give the audience 30 seconds to look and discuss.)

Let me tell you a little bit about this wolf pack.

In today's society we often think of our leaders leading from the front. With Christ and wolves let's look at it differently.

So what does this wolf pack tell us?

In this photo – (click – red oval appears) – the three wolves in the front of the pack – are those who are old &/or sick. The pack lets them walk in the front, so that they can set the pace, so that they are taken care of and not left behind.

In your local group, your Zone, your District – who sets the pace?

The next 5 wolves (click – yellow box appears) are the strongest and the best. In the wolf pack they are tasked to protect the front side of the pack if there is an attack.

The next bunch in the group are the citizens – the membership of the pack.

The 5 behind the citizens (click – green box appears), are also among the strongest & best – they are tasked to protect the back side of the group from an attack. They are again protectors of the group, but from a different perspective.

That leaves the wolf in the back (Click and the blue triangle appears)– she is by herself and is the leader. She ensures that no one is left behind, she keeps the pack unified and on the same path. She is always ready to run in any direction to protect and she serves as the “bodyguard” for the entire group.

Think about how this applies to your LWML groups. Whether that be a district board of directors or your local group. Your local group or society may not have many members, but there may be people who play each of the roles that are a part of the pack.

Discussion:

Closing: Ultimately – any discussion about leadership ends with each of us asking Christ to be our Leader in each and every situation. We do this through prayer, by reading His word and by partaking in His sacraments. And He is our leader — whether it is from the front, from behind, or in the middle – He is our leader. Let us each follow Him.
