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### **BIBLE STUDY: RUNNING ON SOLID GROUND**

With the convention theme in mind, Bible study leader Deaconess Heidi Goehmann chose "Running on Solid Ground" for the first part of her study on Friday morning. She asked, "How's your race going?" She told everyone to turn to the next person and ask the same question. She illustrated her points by putting on a backpack filled with bricks. She listed several suggestions of "bricks" which could be in our backpacks: sins, mistakes, hurtful words, divorce, unbelief in families, mental health issues, and all changes that occur in our lives. As we read in Hebrews 12:1, we are to set aside every weight. She summed up the morning session saying that hope is our solid ground. As we read in Hebrews 11, we are made strong in weakness. Jesus is our solid ground. He is the bookends of life, the first and the last, the designer and the finisher of everything. She left us with the question, "What nutrients do we need today?" The study will resume Saturday morning.

## START THE RACE, BE SURE TO FINISH

Thursday evening's Opening Worship began with the presentation of the processional cross. Mr. Tim Larson, son of LWML President Debbie Larson, served as crucifer. Following was a great procession of pastors who would later serve Holy Communion to the attendees.

The Rev. Dr. David Maier, President of the LCMS Michigan District, served as proclaimer. He opened by sharing his excitement in our ability to meet in person and for being the first organization to hold a convention in Lexington since the beginning of the pandemic. "To preach to a congregation when there is no one there," he said, "That's tough. But to see all of you here, God be praised, and thank you so much for being here." His sermon called those in attendance, both in person and virtually, to go beyond starting the race — to finish the race, as well. When trials and tribulations stop our journey, we are called to continue to the finish line. He shared the story of the Olympic runner who was injured during his race, but who continued the run even though he finished an hour after the rest of the athletes. Asked why he struggled through the pain to finish, he replied, "My country did not send me to start the race. They sent me to finish the race." Dr. Maier encouraged us to seek God's help to finish our race.

Pastors and Holy Communion assistants were stationed throughout the arena to serve the Lord's Supper. Special music was provided by a pre-recorded virtual choir, a small group of women singers led by LWML Ohio District musicians: music director Shannon Meisner and accompaniast Diane Rohrs on the piano. Joann Zieroth, from the LWML Indiana District, played the flute.

Following the service, convention organist Dr. Jon Eifert, from Michigan, expressed thanks to the convention attendees for the impromptu singing of the additional hymns he played during a pause in the service.

Those in attendance remarked that they felt the presence of our Lord and Savior, Who graced the group with His love and led us by His Spirit.

### **TEENS SHARE EXPERIENCES AS THEY SERVE IN LEXINGTON**

Ten teens between the ages of 13 and 17 gathered on Friday morning to begin their servant activities. New acquaintances were made through a "Skittles" ice breaker. The teens came from around the country: Texas to North Dakota; Long Island to Missouri and Arkansas; the most came from Michigan.

All of the teens found they had shared the experience of virtual school in the past year. However, their interests and goals for the future were diverse. Among them were several hunters, a woman who enjoys fishing, a Boy Scout working on his Eagle project, and a future nurse. Athletes among them played basketball and football; one teen was a state champion in archery. In their hometowns, they have actively helped with various community projects, including mowing lawns and serving as a dance teacher. All enjoyed movies and agreed that Marvel is top-notch!

Starting their day with Bible study, it was easy for them to pick out their biblical heroes. Choosing heroes in their lives today was more difficult, however. The heroes mentioned most often were grandmothers!
